Broadlands or Southern Walk... Where Do I Live???

The Broadlands HOA office frequently receives inquiries from residents regarding their Southern Walk accounts or cable related inquiries. We politely try to explain that we are unable to assist with inquires relating to Southern Walk, and are often met with confused expressions from the homeowners. There are common misunderstandings regarding the role of Broadlands versus Southern Walk, so I'll try to break it down in basic terms.

Broadlands Association, Inc. is comprised of 3,892 units at full build out, which include single family units, townhomes, villas, condominiums, and apartments. The purpose of this association is to provide for the upkeep of all of the Common Areas, which includes three pools, the Nature Center, Community Center, Clubhouse, Stone House, tennis courts, basketball courts, tot lots, bridges and tunnels, nature trails, mutt mitt stations, and private roads and sidewalks. Contracts are in place via Broadlands for maintaining items such as the grounds, ponds, pools, buildings, streets and sidewalks, lighting, trees, financial management, security, and snow plowing. Broadlands produces this monthly newsletter and maintains the www.broadlandshoa.org website. The committees and staff organize all of the events ranging from the Nature Programs to Flicks in the Sticks, Broadlands Live! Concert Series, Earth Day@ Loudoun, Halloween events, Summer Carnival, and Visit With Santa to name a few. The HOA staff at the Nature Center is comprised entirely of employees of Broadlands Association. All of the 3,892 units are members of the Broadlands Association and are required to pay assessments to cover the \$100M+ in assets owned by the association.

Southern Walk at Broadlands Homeowners Association, Inc. consists of 1,112 units located within Broadlands. Per Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation for Southern Walk at Broadlands Homeowners Association, the specific purpose of this association is to provide, or cause to provide for, the installation and maintenance of an exclusive private utility system within the Property. In plainer terms, this means the association was developed in order to oversee the private utility easement with OpenBand to provide phone, cable tv, and internet services to the units in Southern Walk.

"What does all this mean to me?" you might ask. If you own a home in Southern Walk, it means that you are automatically a member of **two separate associations**.

The master association is Broadlands Association, to which you pay a monthly fee of somewhere between \$73 and \$125 in order to maintain all of the common areas, facilities, and events. *Continued on page 10*

Broadlands Association relies heavily on volunteers and nowhere is that more apparent than in the development and implementation of the wonderful community events that we have throughout the year. More than 50 volunteers devote hundreds of hours into planning and hosting events. Programs like Flicks in the Sticks provide a wonderful free movie night which is wholesome fun for the whole family. Broadlands Live! is one of the few free concerts in the region where you can bring your own beverages and not get gouged by vendors charging \$11 for a draft beer. The Events Committee hosts numerous adults and kids events through all seasons, with effort made every year to revamp or improve things. Earth Day keeps getting bigger and better every year, with educational programs and festivities to celebrate Mother Earth.

Why should I volunteer for a committee, you ask? Without the volunteers, we would not be able to put on all of the wonderful programs you have come to expect from us. One of the things that make Broadlands the wonderful place to live is that we have such amazing events and wonderful people working on them. Without volunteers, we would be forced to either pay for the time and talent contributed by our volunteers, which would drive up the cost of attending the events and the HOA fees, or we would have to cut events from our budget and our community.

Whether you are a single person living alone, a couple with no children, a growing family with young kids, or empty nesters, we have events to fit your lifestyle. Concerned that you will be underutilized, you lack the necessary skills, or that you may be asked to work on events that do not capture your interest? Fear not, we have needs for all levels of skill and interest levels. Being a part of the planning committees for the events will ensure that we have activities that you and your loved ones will enjoy year after year. While some of the committee positions require considerable time in planning and organizing, the level of commitment can be up to you. Some committees meet once a month, while others are on a more flexible schedule and may meet quarterly or conduct much of their business via email. Some committees need volunteers to assist with setup or assisting in activities during an event, but do not require routine attendance at committee functions. I am confident that you will find whatever time you have to devote a most rewarding experience.

Each individual who gave time or talent to the organization in the last year is deserving of a round of applause from the community. I am honored to host the Annual Volunteer Appreciation Party, an elegant evening celebration which is just a small token of the appreciation for the hard work and hours of those who selflessly give their time.

Read on to get a full list of committees and their responsibilities.

The Broadlands Live Committee organizes the summer concert series held at Hillside Park next to the Stone House. 2014 marks the 11th year of concerts. Funding of the concert series is provided by the Broadlands Association, Inc. as well as sponsors and food vendors. These free concerts are BYOB for adults over 21 years of age, with water, sodas, and food available for purchase. Look for information on the 2014 schedule in the coming months.

The Events Committee hosts an array of community wide events for adults, teens, and children alike, including Casino Night, A Spring Festival, Carnival, Halloween Parties, Visit with Santa, as well as coordinating a trip to the Beer Festival. Discussions for new events include a 4th of July celebration, and a Wine Education Night. New events we are introducing this year are a St. Paddy's Day party, a Teen Night, a Summer Celebration combined with the annual Carnival.

The Wildlife Habitat Committee works to keep Broadlands actively engaged in its Community Wildlife Habitat projects and promote Broadlands' recognition by the National Wildlife Federation as the nation's 25th "Certified Wildlife Habitats Community." The National Wildlife Federation requires the Habitat Team and community members to participate in post-certification activities and submit yearly updates to maintain certification. This committee also organizes the EarthDay@ Loudoun Family Festival as an annual celebration of our certification which is now recognized by the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors as the county's official Earth Day celebration.

The Modifications Subcommittee

is responsible for reviewing all applications for changes to the exterior of your unit as well as reviewing the existing Design Guidelines and making recommendations for changes to the Board of Directors. This committee reviews each application in detail to confirm compliance with our Declaration and Design Guidelines. The committee meets 20 times per year to review applications.

The Technology Committee is responsible for the design and maintenance of the BroadlandsHOA. org website as well as hosting the Flicks in the Sticks outdoor movie series. The Committee is made up of resident volunteers from the Broadlands community and includes web designers, graphic designers, content managers, database administrators, programmers and web hobbyists. Membership is open to anyone that would like to help work on the design and content of the site or help with programs or seminars on computer hardware, software, or usage for residents.

The Tennis Committee acts as the liaison between the Tennis Pro and the association, as well as monitoring the condition of the courts and making recommendations for maintenance and improvements.

The association does not currently have active Neighborhood Watch or Recreation/Pool committees. If your interest is piqued at all, please contact the HOA office to discuss volunteer options that we have available. You may also contact the committees directly. STAY SAFE - Don't Play or Walk on the Community Ponds!

Please remember playing, walking, staking, or any other activities is prohibited on all community ponds. There is no ice in this community that can withstand human weight. Venturing out on an ice covered pond can be very dangerous as ice doesn't freeze uniformly. Ice typically forms thicker on the edges of water where it is shallower and thins toward the middle where it is deeper. Ice isn't considered to be safe to support human weight unless it is at least 6" thick. Factors like snow, water sources, aerators or fountain movement, and objects sticking out from the water can also affect the quality or thickness of the ice. While the surface of the pond may appear to be frozen but there is no guarantee that the ice is thick enough to support anyone's weight, even a child's or a dogs.

Parents, please tell your children that it is extremely dangerous, even deadly, to walk, play, or skate on the ponds in the community. A fall through thin ice can result in drowning or hypothermia, often because the ice surrounding the hole that was fallen through will continue to break away as weight is added, making rescue attempts feeble.

Keep your pets off the ponds as well as they are equally susceptible to falling through and getting seriously hurt of killed.

Let's keep our neighborhood safe!

Help Make Snow Plowing Easier and Faster

When a snow storm has been predicted, especially overnight, the snow plows will be working during the early morning hours. The best way to ensure that the plowing crews can clear the streets better and faster is to park in driveways and parking spaces. In many of the townhouse and private streets sections, a vehicle parked in the street can severly restrict the ability of the plows to do their work. Be a good neighbor by parking in garages, driveways and marked parking spaces.

Save Yourself Time, Money and Aggravation

Before you make any modification, change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Don't be misled by well meaning friends, neighbors or contractors. It is the homeowner's responsibility to file an application with the Modifications Subcommittee for all exterior work. A county permit does not circumvent this requirement.

What can happen if you don't submit an application? You may be ordered to cease and desist, which might cause your contractor to charge additional money for delays in completion. You may have to appear before the Board of Directors at a Covenants violation hearing. You may be assessed a fee by the Homeowners Association of up to \$900, which will be added to your account and to which late fees, attorney fees, and court costs can be charged if payment is not made in a timely manner. You may be taken to General District Court in order for a judge to hear the case and determine the penalty. You may lose your recreational and voting privileges. You might have difficulty selling your home if violations are noted in the resale package which the Commonwealth of Virginia requires you to provide to your buyer.

Please consult the Design Guidelines at http://www. broadlandshoa.org/for-homeowners/design-guidelines/ for detailed information. Submit a complete application package in a timely manner to the Modifications Subcommittee in order to obtain approval prior to beginning any work. The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality throughout the community, to promote sensitivity for the natural environment and to encourage consistency of design while allowing flexibility for achieving design solutions. Winter is Here, Please be Prepared

Both Virginia and Loudoun County Codes require that the occupant, whether an owner or a tenant, remove all snow and ice from any walkway adjoining any part of their property within 6 hours after the snowfall has ceased.

If the snow or ice fell during the night, it must be removed by Noon the following day. If the storm occurs on Sunday, the accumulation must be removed by Noon on Monday.

Failure to comply with the Code can result in a fine of \$250.00 imposed by the county. Complaints should be reported to the County Department of Building and Development, (703) 777-0635.

Please be a good neighbor and a good citizen. Clear your walkways and keep Broadlands a safe environment for all our residents. If you know someone physically unable to keep their walkway clear, please consider giving them a helping hand.

The sub association is Southern Walk, whose sole responsibility is to provide services via the OpenBand agreement. The monthly fee for 2014 is \$175.Southern Walk does not oversee any of the common areas, facilities, contractors, or employees for Broadlands. Southern Walk is governed by a completely separate Board of Directors. Coincidentally, both associations have contracted with FirstService Residential for their financial management, so you need to send two separate checks with two separate account numbers in order to make your monthly assessment payments.

Please contact the Broadlands HOA office at the Nature Center for any issues concerning the facilities, staff, questions about exterior improvements, or general neighborhood inquiries. OpenBand related questions should be directed to FirstService Residential or to the Southern Walk Board of Directors, whose contact information may be found in this newsletter. If you contact FirstService Residential, be sure to inform the call center which association you are calling about so that they can point you in the right direction. If your question is regarding OpenBand or Southern Walk fees, be sure to tell them you are calling about Southern Walk. If your question is in regards to your Broadlands account, inform them that you are calling regarding Broadlands. Providing only your address may cause the Customer Service Representative to give you information for the wrong association. I hope this helps clear up some of the confusion, but if you still have questions, the Broadlands HOA staff is happy to explain.

Rules of the Road - Parking Reminders

We would like to take this opportunity to remind residents of some of the parking rules and regulations governing our community. New residents may be unfamiliar with some of our policies, and the more seasoned residents may benefit from the reminder. A complete version of the parking regulations is available on the website at www.broadlandshoa. org under For Residents>Rules and Regulations.

Following are general restrictions on the parking and storage of vehicles. These rules are applicable to common areas, common area parking lots, private streets, and roadways. For VDOT maintained roads, specific restrictions can be found in the Loudoun County Codified Ordinances.

Prohibited Vehicles

The following are examples of the types of vehicles that are prohibited in open view of residential property (including vehicles parked in an open garage), on residential streets, and on any open space or other common area in the association, except for authorized association owned or contracted vehicles.

- 1. Recreational vehicles. For this purpose, "recreational vehicle" is defined as follows:
 - Any boat or boat trailer, jet skis, rafts or inflatables and the like.
 - Any motor home or camper, camper slip-on where the camper back is 12 inches or higher than the roofline of the cab of the truck.
 - Any mobile home, trailer or fifth-wheel trailer.
 - Any pop-up camper/tent, trailer or other similar recreation.
 - Any other vehicle not defined above which could not normally or regularly be used for daily transportation, including non-operative automobile collections or other automotive equipment not licensed for use on the highways of Virginia.
- 2. Commercial vehicles. For this purpose, "commercial vehicle" is defined as follows:
 - Any vehicle that is defined in a State Code or County Ordinance as commercial. The county definition includes:(1) any vehicle with a registered gross weight of 12,000 pounds or more; (2) any vehicle in which food or beverages are stored or sold; (3) any vehicle used for transporting landscaping or lawn-care equipment; (4) any vehicle licensed for use as a contract carrier or limousine; (5) any vehicle more than 21 feet in length or more than eight feet in height or with a width of 102 inches or more, or with a gross weight of 12,000 or more pounds; (6) any trailer; or (7) any vehicle of any size that is being used in the transportation of hazardous materials; or (8) any vehicle with three or more axles.
 - Any vehicle with exterior racks, compartments or the like.
 - Any private or public school or church bus.

*Passenger vehicles, pick-up trucks not exceeding ½ ton, or passenger vans used for commercial purposes and having the name of the business written on the front doors in an area **not exceeding two square feet** are **permitted**.

- 3. Junk or derelict vehicles. A junk or derelict vehicle is described as follows:
 - A vehicle which does not display valid state license plates/registration.
 - A vehicle which does not display current state inspection sticker.
 - A vehicle missing any necessary parts, such as, but not limited to, tires, wheels, engines, door, truck, hood, wrecked or smashed body parts, etc. that are necessary for the operation of the vehicle on public or private streets.
 - A vehicle with flat tires.
- 4. Motorized vehicles, other than Association or Association contracted vehicles are not permitted on the trails or Common Areas within the community.

Continued from page 11 Parking Regulations

The following regulations exist with regards to the parking of vehicles.

- 1. Vehicles shall not obstruct the safe, free-flow of moving vehicular traffic or other vehicles or pedestrians into or out of parking spaces on Public Streets, or Private Roads.
- 2. No vehicle shall be parked in violation of any posted sign.
- **3.** All vehicles shall be parked wholly within space lines, as applicable.
- 4. No vehicle shall be parked on any grassy or landscaped area.
- 5. Vehicles may not be parked within 10 feet on either side of a mailbox.
- 6. No vehicle may be parked in a manner which blocks any portion of a sidewalk. Even partial obstruction of the sidewalk is considered obstruction and is prohibited.
- **7.** No vehicle may be parked in a fire lane. Even partial obstruction of the fire lane is considered obstruction and is prohibited.

Enforcement

Any vehicle that is parked in violation of the applicable state and local laws or in violation of the parking regulations is subject to ticketing, towing or other enforcement as provided by applicable State and County law or the parking resolution. The Loudoun County Sheriffs Department has full authority to patrol, ticket, and tow on both public and private roads within Broadlands for all violations.

Additionally, any vehicle parked on private roadways and parking lots maintained by Broadlands Association, Inc. in violation of these rules may be issued a Violation Notice by the Association or the authorized towing contractor. If the violation is not remedied, the vehicle may be towed at the sole expense and liability of the owner. Violation notices may be posted

on the vehicle if the vehicle is parked in a common area or mailed to the lot owner if a vehicle is parked on a homeowner lot.

Any vehicle parked in a fire lane or which blocks the sidewalk may be towed **without warning**. A vehicle will be considered to have been parked in a fire lane when any portion of the vehicle overhangs or blocks any portion of a fire lane. A vehicle will be considered to be blocking a sidewalk when any portion of the vehicle overhangs or blocks any portion of a sidewalk.

Scrumptious Cupcakes For Your Valentine

Chocolate Spice Cupcakes

Yield: 12 Cupcakes For the Cupcakes:

5 tablespoons unsalted butter, room temperature, plus more for tin 3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 cup unsweetened Dutch-process cocoa powder, plus more for tin 1/4 teaspoon freshly

grated nutmeg 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 cup packed dark brown sugar 2/3 cup boiling water 1 large egg, room temperature 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour 2/3 cup unsulfured molasses 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon ground ginger For the Chocolate Ganache Glaze Yield: 1 ¼ cup 1 tablespoon light corn syrup

Yield: 22 to 24 cupcakes



6 ounces semisweet chocolate, finely chopped 2/3 cup heavy cream

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brush a muffin tin with butter; dust with cocoa powder, tapping out excess. Stir baking soda into the boiling water. In another bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa, salt, ground ginger, cinnamon, and nutmeg. With an electric mixer on medium-high speed, cream butter and brown sugar until pale and fluffy. Beat in the egg. Add molasses and baking-soda mixture, and beat until combined. Reduce speed to low. Add flour mixture, and beat until well combined (batter will look lumpy). Divide batter evenly among prepared cups, filling halfway. Bake, rotating tin halfway through, until a cake tester inserted in centers comes out clean, about 20 minutes. Transfer tin to a wire rack to cool 15 minutes; invert cupcakes onto rack and let cool completely. Make the Ganache Glaze: Place chocolate in a medium heatproof bowl. Bring cream and corn syrup just to a simmer in a small saucepan over medium-high heat; pour mixture over chocolate. Let stand, without stirring, until chocolate begins to melt. Using a flexible spatula, gently stir chocolate and cream until totally combined; begin near the center of the bowl and gradually work your way toward the edge, pulling in as much chocolate as possible, until the mixture is smooth and glossy. (If any chocolate pieces remain, strain mixture through a fine sieve and discard solids.) To finish, place baking sheet under wire rack; then spoon glaze over cupcakes. Glazed cupcakes can be refrigerated up to 3 days; bring to room temperature and garnish with candied ginger before serving.

a medium saucepan set over medium heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the mixture is smooth, and the butter is completely melted. Transfer the mixture to the bowl of an electric mixer and beat on medium-low speed until the mixture is cool, about 5 minutes. Add the eggs one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Add the vanilla and then cocoa mixture, beating until smooth. Reduce the mixer speed to low, and add the flour mixture in three additions, alternating with the sour cream, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Mix each addition until just incorporated. Divide the batter evenly between the prepared liners, filling each about two-thirds full. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 18 to 20 minutes, rotating the pans halfway through baking. Let cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Make the Frosting: Beat together the butter and cream cheese on medium-high speed for 5 minutes. Pour in the salted caramel and beat until combined. Reduce the speed to medium-low and slowly add the powdered sugar, a little at a time, until it has all been incorporated. Increase the speed to medium -high and beat for an additional two to three minutes, until light and fluffy. To finish, pipe frosting onto the top of each cupcake (or use an offset spatula to spread the frosting), drizzle with some additional salted caramel sauce, and sprinkle with a pinch of fleur de sel. Is Wildlife Being Affected by the Polar Vortex? By: Alexandra VIk, Broadlands ANS Naturalist

The "polar vortex" is bringing an icy Arctic chill to the United States, making it miserable for most people to be outside. But how are animals coping with these extreme conditions? Many animals are adapted to thrive in these cold weather temperatures. Wildlife has very resourceful ways of surviving the winter and conserving energy including hibernation, inactivity, or migrating to warmer climates. Others have thick layers of fat or lush fur that helps them stay warm. Animals become very creative when their survival is on the line.



There are some species, though, that are not prepared for these extreme temperatures. Although researchers say it's still too early to tell how this polar vortex will affect wildlife, there are a few that are more vulnerable.

Virginia opossums do not have a furry protective layer of fat or fur to protect their ears or tail making them susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia. Sometimes you can see that their tails or ears are misshapen, these are signs of frostbite. To escape the cold, opossums will den for a few days, but they do not hibernate. They still have to feed to survive. Sometimes they feed during the daylight hours to take advantage of warmer weather, but when a polar vortex is happening, this won't make much of a difference! In the spring, expect to see a lot of misshaped tail and ear opossums.

Carolina Wrens are also being affected by this polar vortex. They are non migratory birds that stay local year round even though they do not handle the cold weather well. Many often perish in the colder months. According to the Backyard Bird Count report, it takes ten or more years for the wrens to return to numbers after a cold weather die-off. The polar vortex will most likely wipe out many of these birds.

Non-native reptiles are probably the most affected by these extreme temperatures. Sadly, some people release their pets like pythons or iguanas into the wild when they are no longer wanted as pets. Many conservationists see the dying off of invasive species as a good thing since they tend to take over the native species environment. In Florida, during one of their deep freezes there were reports of iguanas dropping from trees and pythons dying by the thousands. Although, we do not see iguanas falling from trees here in Virginia, there are many non-native species suffering through these temperatures. Depending on who you are you can see the dying off of invasive species as a good or bad thing.

Look outside to see if you are noticing any impacts on the wild creatures in your neighborhood! Some wildlife scientists take note of this event to use for future research.

Last month we talked about the Tabata Bootcamp "Take 3 Method" of eating. In case you missed it, the Take 3 Method is a quick and simple way to change your eating habits and change how you think about food, hopefully leading you to a healthier relationship with your kitchen and food in general. To recap, the Take 3 Method is three questions to ask yourself before you eat anything, and I mean anything.

The three fundamental questions are:

- 1. Am I hungry?
- 2. Is it smart?
- 3. How much do I need?

Last month I gave a quick overview of how to make the Take 3 Method work for you. This month we will get a little deeper into step 1: Am I Hungry?

This first question seems almost silly to ask doesn't it? I mean, if vou weren't hunary why would you be pillaging and pilfering your poor unsuspecting pantry? We all know the answer to that one; we often eat when we aren't hungry. We eat when we aren't hungry for a multitude of reasons, we eat when we are sad or happy, we eat when we are bored or at a party, we eat when temptation is in front of us, sometimes we eat when we are thirsty (we will get to this one). Well shoot, it seems like we could have a reason to eat all of the time, yet our

bodies do not need calories all of the time. This is why we ask, am I hungry?

Am I hungry? It takes a second or two to say but it can greatly change your health outlook. Imagine if just one time a day you stopped yourself from mindless eating by answering that question with a 'no'. How many calories could you save in one day? In one week? In one year? As most things in life though, this can be easier said than done. Here are a few key points to help further explain our first question.

- This question is to help us listen to our body and take out emotional decisions
- Don't deprive yourself when your body is telling you it is hungry. That can set you up for failure later. Find the balance between being hungry, satisfied and full. Try to operate in the middle.
- Don't eat until you are full or stuffed.
- When you ask the question before eating something and say "no" and move on, congratulate yourself! You have just taken the first step to becoming more conscious about eating.

Lastly, let's say that you just said "no" and closed that pantry door. What now? Your mind may still be saying it wants something to satisfy that urge. First, grab a glass of water, water is good for you for so many reasons but did you know that our hunger and thirst cues are the same? Maybe your



body was not trying to tell you that you were hungry at all, but maybe it needs hydration. Sometimes that won't cut it and you still feel that urge to grab something more. If so, make a cup of tea; tea has so many great benefits and holding the cup will occupy your hands and keep food out of them. If you are still struggling to stay away from the cabinet, but you know you aren't hungry change your scene by going for a walk. Just do something else to get your mind off food. The first few times you say "no" will be the hardest, but the more times you do the easier it will get!

So come on, ask yourself, *Am I Hungry*?
