

Looking Forward

It's been a busy year already and winter is hardly even over! We are very excited to announce that we will be taking our Annual Meeting elections online for the first time! In order to ease the voting process, we have contracted with The Inspectors of Election to host our 2015 Board election, providing a secure and



efficient way for residents to submit their proxy in order for us to reach a quorum to conduct business and to vote for the candidates. You can take comfort in knowing that your vote will be accurately recorded by an independent third party vendor in an easy-to-submit format. Their website was by far the most user friendly of the ones we demo'd, and I am confident you will discover that this solution brings Broadlands into the technology era. And for those who do not wish to submit their votes electronically, you will still be able to submit the hard copy, which will be independently inputted into the system to ensure that your vote is counted efficiently and accurately.

Other projects the Board has approved include the much needed selective renovation pruning of the Crepe Myrtles throughout the community and cleaning out of the stormwater culverts. The Crepe Myrtles will be pruned in order to promote a healthier growing tree canopy and help develop a stronger root system. Branches that are dead or defective as well as crossing or rubbing against each other and shoots growing into the center of the canopy will be removed in order to give the healthiest branches the best chances of vibrant summer flowering. This work is scheduled for mid March. The stormwater culverts will be cleared of trash and debris, trees, and overgrown grass, vines, and shrubbery within a 10ft radius of the out flow area. This will help water flow properly through the culverts and cut down on buildup during heavy rains.

We will also be servicing the pumps at all three pools in order to extend the life of the pumps. Broken and

damaged chairs were restrapped and tables and umbrellas are being purchased to replace missing and damaged ones. The pool rules have been reviewed and a few significant changes should be noted. Due to insurance restrictions, the minimum age for children to enter the pool without adult supervision must be increased from 11 years to 13 years; therefore, children 12 and under need to be accompanied by an adult caregiver over the age of 18. Please see the website for a complete set of rules.

Another policy change is regarding the rental of the Community Center. We are still working on revamping the contracts for use, but effective March 1, any tenants (non owners) wishing to rent the community center, will be required to pay the \$500 security deposit in cash or cash equivalent. A check will not be accepted for the security deposit portion of the rental. This is because tenants are not members of the association and do not have an account with the HOA. The Community Center is not available for rent by the apartments because the fees paid by the apartments do not cover these types of amenities, only the passive recreational facilities. Once the revision process is complete, the revised policies will be posted to the website.

I look forward to a busy spring and summer with the many enjoyable events we have in the community. Work has already begun on Broadlands Live, Flicks in the Sticks, the big 20 year anniversary celebration, and of course our nature programs are ongoing throughout the year. Hope to see you out there!

Board Meeting Highlights

The following actions were taken by the Board of Directors at their meeting held on February 10, 2015:

- Approved minutes of January 13, 2015 meeting
- Approved the Stick Art Installation proposed by the Wildlife Habitats Committee
- Determined that HOA tenants (non owners) must pay security deposit in cash for Community Center rentals. Apartments cannot rent Community Center
- Discussed whether to require all members to use lidded recycling toters. Determined this is highly encouraged, but not required
- Approved replacement pool furniture (umbrellas and tables) for those damaged or missing
- Approved The Inspectors of Election for the 2015 Annual Meeting
- Approved the pool pump repair proposals from NV Pools
- Approved Crepe Myrtle pruning proposal from HLS
- Approved culvert cleanout proposal from HLS
- Approved 2015 Pool Rules
- Denied changing yard waste and/ or recycling day of pickup proposal from Patriot
- Reviewed the December financial statements
- Assessed violation charges to six owner accounts for trash cans in view and exterior light inoperable
- Assessed violation charges to two owner accounts



Please Tie Down Your Trash on Windy Days

Please be sure to bind newspapers with twine or place loose papers in paper bags before setting out at your curb. Weigh down your bottles, plastics and cans by placing heavier recyclables on top. Ensure that the lid of your trash can is tightly secured. Put smaller lightweight bags of trash together in a larger heavyweight bag. Don't put trash out early and PLEASE no loose "peanuts" or other packing materials. Lastly, if the trash does blow over, or you see a bin out of place, please pick it up even if it isn't yours. Your HOA assessment provides for curbside trash removal. There is no budgeted amount for litter removal. The Association relies on homeowners to keep their neighborhoods free of litter and their assessments reasonable.

Need a More Secure Recycling Bin?

Residents who currently have the smaller, open recycling bin through Patriot may swap out for the larger, lidded recycling toter at no additional cost. Please contact Patriot Disposal at 703-257-7100 to make this request. You are encouraged to keep a record of the serial number of your Toter(s) should you need to identify it in the future.

Modifications Subcommittee Using New Software

The Modifications Subcommittee is using new software to process applications in order to increase efficiency and provide quicker response time to residents regarding the status of their modification applications. Once the Subcommittee has reached a decision, the results letter will be delivered via email. If an email address is not provided, the results letter will be mailed. There have been reports that some emails are being delivered to residents' junk/ spam folder. Therefore, please check your inbox and junk/spam folders for your results letter or contact the HOA office at 703-729-9704. Emails will be sent from *no-reply@smartwebs365.com* should you wish to add this email address to your contact list to ensure prompt delivery.

Upcoming Changes to Community Center Rental Deposits

The security deposit for private parties renting the Community Center is now \$500, as of February 1, 2015 regardless of the number of hours rented. Effective March 1, any tenants (non owners) wishing to rent the community center will be required to pay the \$500 security deposit in cash or cash equivalent. A check will not be accepted for the security deposit portion of the rental.

The security deposit for non-profit groups is now \$100 for all new or renewing contracts, as of February 1, 2015.

The security deposit for for-profit groups remains at \$150.

The Broadlands Association reserves the right to deduct from the security deposit any amount necessary to cover any costs of excessive cleanup, and shall also deduct the costs of repairs or replacements of any property damaged during the use of the Community Center. If the security deposit does not fully cover these costs, the Contract Holder shall be billed for the difference and any future use of the Community Center shall be denied until these costs are paid. Any contract Holder using the Community Center shall be responsible for any and all damages that occur due to their use of the Community Center.

Proxies should either be submitted online via the voting website or will need to be mailed, faxed, or scanned to the Inspectors of Election, LLC. Proxy forms will <u>not</u> be accepted at the HOA Office.

Save Yourself Time, Money and Aggravation

Before you make any modification, change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Don't be misled by well meaning friends, neighbors or contractors. It is the owner's responsibility to file an application for all exterior work. A county permit does not circumvent this requirement. The process is easy if you apply before work commences.

What can happen if you don't submit an application? You may be ordered to cease and desist, which might cause your contractor to charge additional money for delays in completion. You may have to appear before the Board of Directors at a violation hearing. You may be assessed a fee of up to \$900, which will be added to your account and to which late fees, attorney fees, and court costs can be charged if payment is not made. You may be taken to General District Court for a judge to hear the case and determine the penalty. You may lose your recreational and voting privileges. You might have difficulty selling your home if violations are noted in the resale package which you provide to your buyer.

Please consult the Design Guidelines on the website for detailed information. Submit a complete application package in order to obtain approval prior to beginning any work. The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality throughout the community, to promote sensitivity for the natural environment and to encourage consistency of design while allowing flexibility for achieving design solutions. March Covenants Corner

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors inspect the homes in the community for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in view to parking issues and unapproved modifications to leftover holiday decor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular violations that occur with high frequency.

During the month of March, the Inspectors will be focusing on two issues: homes with trash and recycling bins left out in public view on noncollection days and homes with fencing issues. Article 8, Section 8.2 (i) of the Declaration states that trash containers shall not be permitted to remain in public view from the Common Area or another Lot Except on days of trash collection.

Containers are not permitted to be stored on the driveway, in front of the garage, or on the side of the house, unless approved screening has been applied for and installed per the Design Guidelines. Containers may be put out at sundown the evening before pickup and should be put out of view by the end of the day of pickup.

If a violation is noted for trash cans, the owner will be mailed a letter providing ten days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing an additional seven day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a Hearing Notice is sent and a Hearing will be held in accordance with state law, where charges may be assessed, up to \$50 per occurrence. Repeat offenders may be assessed \$50 per occurrence if the containers are left in view.

Article 7, section 7.2 of the Declarations for Broadlands states "Each Owner shall keep such Owner's Lot and all improvements located on the lot in good order, condition and repair." Fencing must be maintained in such a way that it is safe and visually appealing. Fencing that is leaning, has broken, bent, or missing boards, discoloration or mildew, or other damage should be repaired in order to maintain the integrity and visual appearance of the community.

If a violation of this nature is noted, the owner will be mailed a letter providing sixty days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing an additional fifteen day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a final notice will be sent, providing seven days to rectify before a Hearing Notice is sent.

If you have questions regarding this process, or if you receive one of these letters and are unable to correct in the time allotted, you may contact the covenants inspectors at *covenants@broadlandshoa.com* to request a reasonable extension to rectify the issue.

Loudoun's Land Use and the Rural Economy

Loudoun County has seen incredible growth in our recent history. In the past fifteen years, our population has grown from 169,599 in 2000 to 367,096 in 2015. As I explained in a past article, this quick population expansion has led to stress on our infrastructure and we have been forced to play 'catch up' with roads and schools. While much of this growth was due to land use decisions made decades ago, recent and future development approvals are guided by Loudoun's Comprehensive Plan.

The Comprehensive Plan is the set of policy documents adopted by the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors intended to serve as a guide for development over the next 20 years and is the foundation for amendments to the Zoning and Subdivision ordinances to ensure the county's goals are implemented through the regulatory process. The county's Comprehensive Plan consists of the Revised General Plan and Amendments, specific strategic plans and the Revised Countywide Transportation Plan. The goals of the Revised General Plan include promoting reasonable residential growth, alleviating future traffic congestion, promoting a diverse economy, protecting the rural economy, and preserving environmental and historical features.

The plan envisions a suburban Eastern Loudoun, rural Western Loudoun and a transition area between the two. Additionally, key to the Comprehensive Plan calls for 'Transit Oriented Development' around the future Metrorail stations along the Greenway. Overall, I think Loudoun has a good Comprehensive Plan, but it's probably ready for some tweaks in the upcoming years. Specifically, I think we need to focus new development in mixed-use centers around the Metrorail stations



and other locations in Eastern Loudoun (like what is already happening at One Loudoun), where there will be sufficient transportation infrastructure to handle the growth. Defining these centers will be an important part of any upcoming revisions to the Comprehensive Plan.

One element of land use the Board of Supervisors has worked hard to encourage over the past three years has been rural and agricultural uses. When landowners are given options other than subdividing their property for new housing developments, there is a net benefit to the county's finances. The Board has adopted land use policies to encourage the expansion and success of rural based businesses.

I'm sure many of you are all well aware of the success Loudoun has experienced with the wine industry. In 2014, the County celebrated the opening of eight new wineries, bringing Loudoun's total to forty-two. Wineries are an import industry in Loudoun, with an estimated \$136 million annual economic impact to the County. Last year Wine Enthusiast magazine named Loudoun 'One of the ten best wine travel destinations.' The Board is looking to replicate the same success we have seen with the wine industry with breweries. On January 21st of this year, the Board adopted a zoning amendment that permits farm breweries on agriculturally zoned land. As a result of this amendment, seven new brewery businesses have announced plans to open in Loudoun, including Flying Dog Brewery.

Our growing beer industry is getting a lot of attention. This past fall I joined Governor McAuliffe, Catoctin District Supervisor Geary Higgins and Virginia Secretary of Agriculture Todd Haymore for an exciting economic development announcement for this industry. Lucketts Mill Hop Works will be the largest commercial hops processing facility on the East Coast, investing approximately \$1 million into Loudoun's economy. Loudoun partnered with the Commonwealth of Virginia for an agricultural grant for this project. The future looks bright for the craft beer industry in Loudoun.

Part of what makes Loudon special is both suburban development and rural uses all in one community. Maintaining a reasonable Comprehensive Plan and encouraging rural businesses is one way to deal with growth. Additionally, the jobs and tax revenue associated with the rural economy are important contributors to Loudoun's overall economic health. For the Health of Your Trees...

Proper Mulching Techniques - adapted from International Society of Arboriculture pamphlet Contributed by Jeremy W. Baker, ISA Certified Arborist, jbaker@thecareoftrees.com

Benefits of Proper Mulching


- 1. Helps maintain soil moisture. Evaporation is reduced, and the need for watering can be minimized.
- 2. Helps control weeds. A 2"-4" layer of mulch will reduce the germination and growth of weeds.
- 3. Insulation mulch keeps soils warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer.
- 4. Improved quality of soil. Many types of mulch can improve soil aeration and structure and can improve drainage.
- 5. Some types of mulch can improve soil fertility.*
- 6. A layer of mulch can help inhibit some types of plant disease.
- 7. Helps facilitate lawn maintenance and reduces the risk of mechanical damage from weed-whips or lawn mowers.

Trees growing in a natural forest environment have their roots anchored in a rich, well-aerated soil full of essential nutrients. The soil is blanketed by leaves organic materials that replenish nutrients and provide an optimal environment for root growth and mineral uptake. Urban landscapes, however are typically a much harsher environment with poor soils, little organic matter, and large fluctuations in temperature and moisture. Applying a 2"-4" layer of mulch can help mimic a more natural environment and improve plant health. The roots of most trees can extend to a width of 2-3 times the diameter of the canopy of the tree. Additionally, most of the fine, nutrient and moisture absorbing roots are located in the top few inches of the soil. These roots require oxygen and

moisture to survive. A thin layer of mulch, applied as broadly as practical, can improve the soil structure, oxygen levels, temperature, and moisture availability where these roots grow.

Not too much mulch!


As beneficial as mulch is, too much can be harmful. The generally recommended depth is 2"-4". Unfortunately, Virginia landscapes are falling victim to a plague of over-mulching. A new term, 'mulch volcanoes,' has emerged to describe mulch that has been piled up around the base of trees. Most organic mulches must be replenished, but the amount of replenishment required depends upon the rate of mulch decomposition within your landscape. Thoroughly inspect your mulch beds to ensure that you maintain only a 2"-4" level around your trees and shrubs.

Proper Mulching

- 1. Rake the old mulch to break up any matted layers prior to adding new mulch.
- 2. Keep mulch back a minimum of 2" from the trunks of trees and shrubs.
- 3. Use a well aerated and composted organic mulch to help improve soil conditions. Avoid sour-smelling mulch!
- 4. Composted wood chips that contain leaves and bark make great mulch.
- 5. Mulch a 2"-4" layer out to the drip-line of the tree, or farther if practical.

From the Naturalist...

The Broadlands Nature Center, Our Community's Household By: Jessica Bukowinski, Broadlands Naturalist

Taking care of the Broadlands Nature Center sometimes feels like managing a second household. At home, I keep a never ending shopping list on my fridge, while here I keep a similar shopping list on my desk. When I am here at the Nature Center, my kids (or their teachers) call when something is amiss, and when I am at home our volunteers call with questions or concerns. Occasionally all runs smoothly without a single bump, and

I know the answer to every question. I might even think for a moment that I have finally figured it all out, but whether I am here or at home, eventually a new challenge or concern comes up and stumps me. For example, if I find a weird rash on my kids, I consult my mom friends and the internet and then call the pediatrician. When I worry about the animals, I first consult online message boards for reptile enthusiasts and pick the brains of the other ANS naturalists and then I call our vet. We are lucky to have one of the best exotic vet clinics in the nation right here in Northern Virginia, and over the last few weeks I twice bundled up animals and made the drive down to Stahl Exotic Animal Veterinary Services (SEAVS) in Fairfax.

During recent visits to the Nature Center, you may have noticed that our corn snake, Sunny's, bump has been growing larger. This is something that our vet monitors at Sunny's annual visit. In 2014 we got a closer look with an x-ray. During Sunny's exam last week the vet confirmed that despite its increase in size the lump is not causing him pain and that he can continue his important work as an ambassador for his species. Sunny is one of the animals that kids love to meet! There is something empowering about meeting a snake.

Another thing that you or your kids may have noticed is in the opposite corner of the Nature Center. Our female red eared slider (turtle),



Swimmy, has been shedding the top layers of the scutes on her shell since before the start of the New Year. This is something that happens to some, but not all, turtle species as they and their shells grow. The layers that come off feel like fingernails. Our male turtle, Franklin, went through the same process last summer. Because Swimmy is an older turtle with a history of shell troubles, I have been watching her very closely and I had the vet check to ensure that the process was not taking so long that it might encourage infection underneath those loose top layers of scute. She passed her exam with flying colors and continues to shed those layers of scute as she basks under her light by her pond here at the Nature Center.

Our pair of female doves took the opportunity to carpool with the others and went in for their annual exam. While their health looks fine,

> it is important to screen birds for certain diseases that could make our visitors and volunteers sick so they had some routine tests.

I am proud of how the Broadlands community cares about our Nature Center critters. I love it when visitors are concerned enough to notice and point these things out to me and to ask about the welfare of our animal friends. As Broadlands residents, you can consider the Nature Center and the animals in it yours to visit and to love. Meanwhile, you can leave your Naturalist to deal with managing all the

details while you focus on your own households. Keep on caring and keep on asking questions!





About Your Pet...

Farm Feline or City Kitty? By: Shannon M. Pecora, MA of Stream Valley Veterinary Hospital

The suburban life is generally an indoor one for domestic cats. However, beautiful Northern Virginia, including our own Loudoun County, encompasses everything from the bustling urban to the bucolic rural. Therefore, one NoVA kitty may rarely venture beyond his condo's foyer while just a few miles away a NoVA barn cat regularly patrols the stables and barnyard. And it would not be surprising if these two felines were born in the same litter!

These distinctive lifestyles merit their

own personalized approaches to veterinary care. An apartment is usually a much more controlled environment than a farm - though that should not give you a false sense of complacency if your cat stays indoors. Just be sure to clearly communicate with your veterinary staff, particularly if there are any changes: have you given your cat access to a newlyadded screened porch, welcomed a dog into your family, or moved from a townhouse to a farm?

So what difference does any of this make? Well, of course, the exposure risk for illnesses such as rabies increases greatly with a more adventurous, outdoor (or indoor/ outdoor) lifestyle. Preventive medicine includes baseline examinations, vaccinations, and recommendations to keep your pet safe based on risk potential. So first, let's consider some highly likely recommendations for an indoor-only cat. Regular exams track health trends and can help catch illnesses in early stages. Annual rabies and distemper vaccines really are a must, even if you think your cat will never come in contact with another animal. These viruses are incredibly contagious and dangerous, and they can be spread in everyday situations: a bat mistakenly flies into your attic, your cat escapes through the front door and has a few minutes in your yard before you catch her, or a friend with an infected pet visits and plays with your cat without properly encounter those biting parasites right where they live! And it's not just wild animals who present a threat; other outdoor cats can be dangerous, too, especially during mating periods or fights over territory. That means you should have your cat tested each year for FIV (also referred to as feline AIDS) and feline leukemia. There is also an annual vaccine that can help protect your cat from feline leukemia.

Though we generally recommend that all cats be spayed or neutered, outdoor cats obviously will have more opportunity to mate, which can increase the unwanted pet population. A microchip and proper rabies and ID tags will make it clear that your kitty belongs with your family. And don't forget to talk to your vet about ways to check in with your cat so you know that she hasn't become a victim of a fight, fall, or busy highway (incidentally, all great incentives for keeping a cat inside!).

An outdoor lifestyle is not ideal for every kitty, and your veterinary staff can talk with you about pros and cons tailored specifically to your pet. Even if your cat stays inside your home, it's not akin to living in a bubble, so there are precautions to take no matter what. Country cat or city kitty? Because these lifestyle decisions should be considered carefully, talk to your vet and have the pros help you weigh your options!

washing his hands first. We also want to check fecal (or stool) samples at least annually. Did you know that potting soil can contain intestinal parasites? Keep your pets and your kids away! And of course, fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes thrive in our climatecontrolled homes, so keep up those preventive products year-round!

Now, imagine an outdoor cat who could try to hunt down a bat, who will dig through potentially-infested outdoor soil, and who will certainly

In the Garden

March, the Month to Get Gardening! By Jill Johnson, Loudoun County VCE Master Gardener

Daffodils and crocus are coming up and March looks promising even though the weather doesn't always cooperate. Saint Patrick's Day on the 17th is a traditional date to plant peas but last year on that date we had one of the heaviest snows of the winter, so you never know. At any rate, garden soil needs to be crumbly and workable before you plant peas, not wet and frigid. Peas will germinate as soon as the soil warms to 50 degrees. I will plant my favorite heirloom Mammoth Melting Sugar snow peas again this year, and will do a better job of providing adequate trellising to support the 6 foot plus vines.

The seminar features four renowned speakers who will instruct, inspire and get your gardening juices flowing! I'll pick the first nice day this month to get serious about garden clean-up. I didn't cut back my perennials in the fall, so that's on my to-do list, as well as cutting down ornamental grasses, and cleaning up dead leaves from hellebores and epimediums. You can divide perennials now if the ground is dry enough. Just think, free plants if you do the work. Yank those nasty perennial weeds like garlic mustard and henbit and the annuals like chickweed, bittercress and deadnettle.

Take Time Out For You

By now most of us know that childhood obesity is becoming a nationwide epidemic. The percentage of obese children and adolescents has increased dramatically over the last 30 years, doubling in children ages 6-11 and quadrupling in adolescents 12-19. The statistics for obese children are frightening as many of these children end up with medical complications that in the past were reserved for obese adults such as: high blood pressure, high cholesterol, adult on-set diabetes and musculoskeletal diseases. The future for obese children doesn't look great but we can begin to change the landscape and it starts at home.

Most parents are aware that modeling plays a huge role in the development of our children. Children watch what we do and listen to what we say, even if it doesn't seem like they are paying attention, they are taking note of everything that goes on. As parents, we hope that as our children grow they will adopt all of our positive behaviors (i.e. I eat healthy: they will grow up to eat healthful food, I exercise: they will see the benefit and do the same). Modeling played a huge part in my life as one of my earliest memories was watching my Mom workout to Jane Fonda videos.

What if we took it a step further and instead of just modeling these positive behaviors, we *included* our children in these activities that we so value. I don't mean to take away your sanity time at the gym or propose that you never get a run in on your own. But what if instead you added a little activity to your day that could include your children? This is a win-win because you get to burn a few extra calories and your children get to join in the fun and feel the difference that activity makes.

Tips for Family Fitness Fun:

1. Remember to keep it fun exercise shouldn't feel like work for a kid, you want to keep it light and playful.

2. Start simple and take a family bike ride or if you are going for a run have an older child ride a bike alongside you.

3. At the gym, warm up by shooting hoops with your child before you workout.

4. Have a dance party at home. Crank up the radio and get silly. You can take turns being the operator and play freeze dance too.

5. Have an animal parade. Each child can take a turn choosing a different animal to act out. You can add to this and play tag as each animal talk about burning calories!

6. Hit the playground together and take turns creating an obstacle course.7. Into yoga? Children are natural yogis; show your kids a few of your favorite poses, you can even ask them to create their own.

8. Older children can be included in gym workouts. Steer clear of machines: think medicine balls, bosu balance trainers, light free weights and body weight exercises.

The first tip bears repeating: keep it fun. Family fitness time can be an amazing tool not only to show your kids your commitment to health but also as a time to connect. The most meaningful talks happen when I am throwing the football with my oldest



son. His mind is free and he opens up about his day and about his friends and school. Keep your activity time light. This isn't a time to judge or correct but a time to engage and have fun.
