The Broadlands Association is not responsible for removing snow or treating state or county maintained (VDOT) roadways. The Association is only responsible for clearing snow from paved parking areas in townhome neighborhoods and HOA maintained roads in the community. ## STAY SAFE... DON'T SKATE ON THE COMMUNITY PONDS!

The surface of the pond may appear to be frozen, but our winters are not cold enough to guarantee that the ice is thick enough to support anyone's weight, even a child or pet's.

Parents, please tell your children that it is extremely dangerous, even deadly, to walk or skate on the ponds in the community. And, keep pets off ponds as well!

## NATURE CENTER RULES & PRACTICES



There are general rules and regulations in place to make sure that your visit to the Broadlands Nature Center is a pleasant and safe experience. The animals that call the Nature Center home are sensitive to loud noises and sudden movement. We have had injured and frightened animals at times due to some choices of guests. Additionally, the Nature Center shares

space with the Broadlands Association office and provides services to residents both in person and over the phone which require a quiet office atmosphere. Additionally, a pleasant work environment is necessary for the staff to continue to carry out the day-to-day operations of the association.

## For the Nature Center to remain open to the public, the following policies have been adopted:

- The primary purpose of the Broadlands Nature Center is as an educational classroom. We offer a wide variety of programming in order to educate visitors of all ages. If you would like to request a program or a time for a class that you would like to see offered, please contact the Naturalist. (Naturalist@BroadlandsHOA.com)
- Visitors are encouraged to participate in the scheduled group activities planned by the Naturalist. There are flyers around the Nature Center advertising these, and you may sign up to be a part of our once-a-week mailing outlining upcoming events and opportunities. The Broadlands Community Newsletter also lists many of these events.
- If you are a group: playgroup, meeting as a group of friends with multiple families, homeschool group, preschool group, or other entity that would be considered a group—you must have scheduled your visit with the Naturalist two—days in advance. (This change in policy was required due to destructive behavior that jeopardized the quality of life for the animals and the continued existence of the Nature Center).
- Individual families coming at the same time as other individual families and forming a group are, by definition, an
  intentional group and must have a scheduled visiting time. We apologize for the inconvenience and want you to feel
  welcomed and come often to the Nature Center while at the same time maintaining a safe home for many life forms.
   Please contact the Naturalist to schedule a time at Naturalist@BroadlandsHOA.com.
- Individuals and individual families who are not participating in a scheduled activity do not need to make a reservation, but must sign in the log book upon entering the Nature Center.
- No running—particularly not over the magical wooden bridge. This may cause our bunny to have a panic attack.
- For the benefit of other visitors, animals, and staff, please maintain respectful noise levels at all times. No screaming, screeching, or other loud noises to disturb the animals or fellow humans.
- Because we are not a triage-ready rehabilitation facility, nature center staff cannot accept injured, orphaned or abandoned wildlife. If you have an animal that you seek to aid please contact the Blue Ridge Wildlife Center at (540)837-9000.
- For your safety and the safety of the animals, do not enter the animal habitats, touch or remove any of the animals. If you are interested in performing weekly animal care, please pick up a "Youth Naturalist" packet and we will oversee your training so that you can have this fully informed opportunity to pet and care for all animals at the Nature Center.
- No pets please—leashed, carried, or otherwise.
- Picnicking is not permitted inside the nature center—imaginably torturous to the perhaps hungry animals stuck in glass terrariums! But picnicking is encouraged outdoors in the pavilion and lawn areas. Except for water or sports bottles, all food and drinks must remain outdoors. Obviously, dispose of litter in proper receptacles. Remove smelly litter (including diapers) to outdoor receptacles.

Failure to abide by the policies outlined will result in dismissal from the facility. Please remember that this is a place of education, a home to animals, and a professional workplace. To ensure this space can be all of these things we will have to ask you to leave if the policies are not followed. The Broadlands Nature Center is a unique place. Please help us keep it clean and quiet by abiding by the rules in order to ensure its continued existence!

## SAVE YOURSELF TIME, MONEY AND AGGRAVATION

Before you make any modification, change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Don't be misled by well meaning friends, neighbors or contractors. It is the owner's responsibility to file an application for all exterior work. A county permit does not circumvent this requirement. The process is easy if you apply before work commences.

What can happen if you don't submit an application? You may be ordered to cease and desist, which might cause your contractor to charge additional money for delays in completion. You may have to appear before the Board of Directors at a violation hearing. You may be assessed a fee of up to \$900, which will be added to your account and to which late fees, attorney fees, and court costs can be charged if payment is not made. You may be taken to General District Court for a judge to hear the case and determine the penalty. You may lose your recreational and voting privileges. You might have difficulty selling your home if violations are noted in the resale package which you provide to your buyer.

Please consult the Design Guidelines on the website for detailed information. Submit a complete application package in order to obtain approval prior to beginning any work. The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality throughout the community, to promote sensitivity for the natural environment and to encourage consistency of design while allowing flexibility for achieving design solutions. ## **COVENANTS CORNER**

## Trash and Recycling in Public View and Fencing Issues

During the month of March, the Inspectors will be focusing on two issues: homes with trash and recycling bins left out in public view on non-collection days and homes with fencing issues. Article 8, Section 8.2 (i) of the Declaration states that trash containers shall not be permitted to remain in public view from the Common Area or another Lot Except on days of trash collection. Containers are not permitted to be stored on the driveway, in front of the garage, or on the side of the house, unless approved screening has been applied for and installed per the Design Guidelines. Containers may be put out at sundown the evening before pickup and should be put out of view by the end of the day of pickup. If a violation is noted for trash cans, the owner will be mailed a letter providing ten days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing an additional seven day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a Hearing Notice is sent and a Hearing will be held in accordance with state law, where charges may be assessed, up to \$50 per occurrence. Repeat offenders may be assessed \$50 per occurrence if the containers are left in view. Article 7, section 7.2 of the Declarations for Broadlands states "Each Owner shall keep such Owner's Lot and all improvements located on the lot in good order, condition and repair." Fencing must be maintained in such a way that it is safe and visually appealing. Fencing that is leaning, has broken, bent, or missing boards, discoloration or mildew, or other damage should be repaired in order to maintain the integrity and visual appearance of the community. If a violation of this nature is noted, the owner will be mailed a letter providing sixty days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing an additional fifteen day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a final notice will be sent, providing seven days to rectify before a Hearing Notice is sent. If you have questions regarding this process, or if you receive one of these letters and are unable to correct in the time allotted, you may contact the covenants inspectors at covenants@broadlandshoa.com to request a reasonable extension to rectify the issue.

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors inspect the homes in the community for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in view to parking issues and unapproved modifications to leftover holiday decor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular violations that occur with high frequency.

## 1. Why are some roads plowed by VDOT and some by the HOA?

The HOA owns and maintains some roads (75 to be exact) within Broadlands, but not all. The ones the HOA does not own belong to the county and are plowed by VDOT. On these public roads, taxes pay for VDOT to plow, so residents living on public roads need to contact VDOT directly if they feel they are not receiving adequate service. Residents living on private HOA owned streets pay an additional assessment to the HOA to fund private road maintenance, including snow and ice services. Residents on VDOT streets do not pay the HOA for private road maintenance. The HOA cannot plow VDOT roads - the HOA would be liable if we damaged the road, hit a car, or created a hazard.

## 2. Why can't VDOT plow the HOA owned road?

The HOA would gladly turn all of the private roads over to them. Unfortunately, the county has very specific requirements for roads - such as minimum width. VDOT will not accept responsibility for roads that do not meet their requirements. The HOA does not choose which roads it owns. This is determined when the developer submits the plan to the county - long before construction begins.

## 3. Why are some streets plowed sooner than others?

The crews are assigned maps by their leader. They work on their assigned streets until they are done. With 75 private streets in Broadlands, some roads will be treated first and some will be done last because the plows cannot be on every street at the same time. The crews normally address the main roads first and then work into the secondary roads. You might see a plow drive past your street without stopping. They may be assigned somewhere else, there may be a vehicle blocking access, too many vehicles parked in the way to get the equipment safely in or out, or there may be too much snow for their equipment to handle. With blizzard-type storms, snow drifts present additional challenges - previously cleared roads can become snow-covered again, pulling crews back for additional passes. Whatever the reason, crews will be back to clear your road as quickly and as safely as possible.

## 4. Why don't the plows clear the road down to bare pavement?

Vehicles driving on snow compact it down, making it more difficult for the plow blade to clear the surface to the pavement – one reason the government, media, and HOA encourage residents to stay home and off the streets during inclement weather. The HOA does not generally use chemicals in subdivisions. Residents should expect streets to have some compacted snow and ice for a few days - until temperatures allow for melting. Crews will treat certain areas with ice-melt - some hills and intersections, curved roadways, etc. where additional traction is needed to allow safe passage. But thaw/freeze cycles may cause these areas to become covered again. Also, please keep in mind that high winds may cause drifting in some areas - a street may have been plowed only to later be covered again by blowing snow. It can also be difficult for plow blades to scrape down to black pavement, depending on the current conditions (how dry/wet the snow is, how fast it is coming down, how hard the wind is blowing, etc.)

## 5. Why don't the plows clear the entire width of the street, from curb to curb?

Plows are often a misunderstood piece of equipment. If you've ever driven a full sized pickup on a crowded street like many of the ones in our community, which can be a challenge on its own, consider what it's like to add a plow blade sticking 4 feet out in front of your vehicle. Even a "small" plow truck can be in excess of 22' long. Operating a large vehicle, manipulating a plow blade from side to side and up and down, and frequently shifting gears is pretty challenging.

Plow blades can push snow off to the side, but they cannot pick it up. When significant accumulation occurs, the drivers will do everything possible to clear the widest lanes, but they may not be curb to curb. Bear in mind that these trucks can slide on ice and snow covered roads too, so plow drivers exercise extreme caution near parked vehicles, causing owners to have to shovel more to get vehicles out to the road. Please park your vehicles off the roads and off to the sides of parking lots whenever possible. Abandoned vehicles can also add to the issue.

The contractor widened the roads as much as reasonably possible, but in some of the densely populated areas, even days later, there was nowhere to push the snow. Additionally, if the snow mounds had been pushed again, it would have led to blocked driveways yet again. Thankfully, the area received some warm and sunny days in the two weeks following the storm, which created opportune conditions for snow melt.

## 6. Will there be a Special Assessment to pay for snow services as we had in the past?

The HOA will need to wait until the winter season is over and all invoices have been reviewed to determine if there is enough funding budgeted for snow removal this year. This includes snow services, turf and tree/shrub repairs, and other damages that may have occurred due to the incredible amount of snow. The Board will review the budget and expenditures and will do everything reasonable to avoid a special assessment - while maintaining their fiduciary responsibility to the Association and the residents.

## 7. Why don't we use reserves to pay the snow removal bills?

The reserve funds are required to be held for future repairs and replacements of community property and cannot be used for snow removal. Those funds are on hold in reserve to pay for major expenses such as resurfacing HOA roads, re-roofing the community center or replacing pool machinery, not for operating expenses like snow services.

## 8. The fees for HOA owned streets are higher than for residents on VDOT streets. How much of the monthly assessment goes to snow plowing?

For 2016, the budget for snow removal for townhomes is \$50,236. That's \$41.48 per townhome per year (or \$3.46 per month for each of the 1,211 townhomes in the Association). The budget for snow removal for Single Family homes on private streets (SFPS) is \$27,613. That's \$74.43 per SFPS home per year (or \$3.97 per month for each of the 371 SFPS in the Association). The balance of the monthly private street assessment is for private road maintenance, for the repair and repaving of those roads, aprons, curb and gutter, and sidewalks.

## 9. Why don't we budget more for snow removal and increase our service?

It's impossible to predict the weather months (or even days) in advance, and snow is a huge variable from year to year. When formulating the budget, the Board uses an average cost of snow removal for past years. Inflated amounts can lead to unnecessary increases in assessments, or a surplus of income in the budget. The Association is required to maintain a balanced budget. A surplus of funds could create a tax liability for the Association - an unnecessary cost to residents. The Board makes every effort to keep assessments stable while keeping services as high as possible.

#### 10. How does our snow contract work?

The Association's contract is based on "time and materials" and is at a fair and reasonable cost for these services in our area. Each snow event is different and unpredictable, but we are billed only for the time the contractor worked. The Association is fortunate to have a contractor that is solely dedicated to Broadlands and willing to work around the clock. Many associations have crews that are assigned to multiple properties, and their community may not be a priority for that contractor. If you've ever driven down Demott Drive, you've probably seen some of the equipment stored in the Summerbrooke pool parking lot. All of this equipment is stored on site all winter and is dedicated to Broadlands. Additional equipment that is utilized by the contractor for other jobs year round is brought for snow events in order to fully support our needs.

## 11. How do we know we are receiving the best and most qualified plowing service?

Winter storm Jonas was an unprecedented event for our area, dropping 3' of snow in 36 hours. Contractors throughout the area could not keep up with the sheer volume of snow. Many of the crews in Loudoun were sidelined for a few hours on Saturday due to whiteout conditions - for the safety of the crews and property. Contractors throughout the county did the best they could under the circumstances. Our contractor had passable roads within

3 days of the end of the storm - moving thousands of tons of snow during that time. Many communities in our area were not as fortunate and did not see even one plow until Tuesday. Every company in the area was dealing with the situation and few would have been able to handle a community of this size any better than SSIC. They provided Broadlands with ten plow trucks, three tractors, a bobcat, front end loader, and a crew of 32 people dedicated to clearing our roads and sidewalks as quickly as possible and work continued for 11 days.

## 12. Do crews take breaks? How long do they work between breaks?

Many of the drivers worked long hours - often 24 to 36 hours at a time without the opportunity to go home and sleep in a real bed. The goal during a storm of this magnitude was for each driver to have a 6 hour break every 24 hours. Sometimes they needed breaks more often in order to nap, eat, use the restroom, or touch base with loved ones. They were very thankful for the hot coffee, cookies and appreciative comments from residents. It's understandable and recommended that they would need to take a break once in a while in order to reenergize and safely continue their work. They worked day and night, driving slippery roads, dodging parked cars and avoiding hazards to clear the roads. All so that emergency responders could reach residents in the event of a life threatening emergency.

## 13. Can the plows push the snow in such a way as to avoid blocking my driveway?

A plow blade is designed to push snow to the side; it will not pick it up and deposit it elsewhere. As the plow moves along the road, snow is piled up along the side whether that side has a curb, a driveway or a guardrail. In order to clear a lane quickly, the plows will push snow off to the sides. They try to come back after all is said and done and dig out driveways or sidewalks that have been blocked. It can be very frustrating to dig out the driveway only to have the plow leave a new pile. Residents on VDOT roads as well as HOA roads had plows deposit snow in their driveway – some several times. VDOT recommends digging out an area 10 to 15 feet to the right of your driveway (viewed from the street), giving the excess snow a place to go, which may help to minimize the plow pile at the end of your driveway. Obviously this is difficult to do in some of the densely populated areas where driveways are side by side.

## 14. Was there a fuel shortage during the storm which delayed the plows from operating?

Several Ashburn area gas stations ran out of gasoline and/or diesel early in the storm, so crews went to Leesburg, Chantilly and Sterling for fuel and quickly returned to Broadlands to resume work.

## 15. Did the state commandeer any of the equipment during the storm for medical emergencies? Will our HOA have to pay for that?

While the HOA would have preferred to have the contractor's full complement of equipment working in Broadlands throughout the storm, the state has the authority to require assistance during a state of emergency and a few times, some of the heavy equipment dedicated to Broadlands was called upon to assist in medical emergencies. The HOA was not billed for these times. Fortunately for those in need, there was equipment to assist with medical emergencies and this didn't significantly disrupt the contractor's operations.

## 16. Who is responsible for clearing around the fire hydrants?

On HOA owned streets, our contractor marked all of the hydrants using wooden stakes with blue tape on them. This way they could return after the snow subsided and the roads were clear to dig them out to make them accessible for fire trucks. On VDOT streets, it is the residents' responsibility to mark and dig out the hydrants.

## 17. Where should I put the snow from my driveway/sidewalk/parking space if not in the street?

The HOA and VDOT ask that you do everything possible to avoid shoveling snow into the street as it creates road blocks for your neighbors and adds to the snow volume that the already strained plows have to move out of the way. Try to pile the snow in your yard or find some common area open space (turf, not roadway) to place the snow. The HOA received a number of complaints from residents that their neighbors had shoveled themselves out but placed the snow in such a way that it blocked a road or someone else's access to their vehicle or driveway.

## 18. When and by whom will the turf damage be repaired? Who will pay for it be fixed?

At the end of the snow season, the association will contract with our landscaping contractor to perform repairs to the turf. Turf damage was unavoidable in many areas due to the sheer amount of snow. Plows did some damage along the streets and tractors digging out sidewalks also did some damage. They tried to avoid it, but in many cases it was simply inevitable.

## 19. Why does the HOA mark the main roads with the orange snow stakes? Why doesn't it mark the private roads?

A few years ago, the HOA invested in the snow markers in order to identify the edges of the roads on the main roads (Claiborne/Waxpool/Truro Parish/Broadlands Blvd). Although these are VDOT roads, the association has an easement to maintain the turf on the medians and right of ways on these roads. Therefore, the HOA has to pay for turf repairs when they happen. These stakes assist the plows for two reasons. For one thing, the equipment that keeps these main roads clear are larger commercial grade trucks that sit several feet higher off the ground than a regular pickup truck. That makes it that much harder to see the edges of the road. Additionally, when VDOT installed the curb on these roads, they rounded the edges in order to save concrete. This does not define the edge of the road in the same way that a square concrete curb does, and it's much easier for the plows to jump the curb and shave off large sections of turf in doing so. On the HOA roads, the plow equipment is generally smaller so the drivers can see a bit easier. Also, most, if not all of the HOA roads have square curbs, making it slightly harder for the plow to jump the curb and damage the turf. While the HOA has observed turf damage on main roads following the blizzard, the damage is significantly lower than it would be had the stakes been absent and a white snow blanket encompassed the entire road and median/sides.

## 20. How does the HOA keep residents informed about snow operations during a winter weather event of this magnitude?

The HOA staff made every effort to keep the lines of communication open during the blizzard. It pushed out electronic updates via the Broadlands Blast, front page of the website, and on the forums. Staff also reviewed the office voice mail and returned messages daily, as well as monitored and responded to emails to the info@broadlandshoa. com email and to the General Manager. Additionally, the snow plow crew chief could be contacted directly by residents via a cell phone owned by the association. Although there were times the phone was not answered due to being on another call with another resident or being busy plowing, missed calls were returned during breaks. The voice message system was deactivated because they did not have the ability to safely retrieve and write down messages while operating the equipment.

## 21. I have a question/complaint/concern. Who can I talk to?

Residents can contact the HOA management at 703-729-9704. In addition, there is the opportunity to provide comments to the Board of Directors at the monthly meeting. The meetings are held at the Clubhouse at 6:00 pm on the second Tuesday of each month.

## Hi Broadlands,

Thank you so much for all your feedback to our office so far, we appreciate your support on the Greenway Alternative and for improving snow removal practices for the County and VDOT.

## Post-Blizzard Meeting

With your concerns in mind, our office organized a meeting on Thursday, February 4, which included members from all major Broad Run HOAs, VDOT, County staff, and the School Board. We discussed what Loudoun County can do better in the event of another blizzard. During our meeting, we heard legitimate concerns about sidewalks, plowing, and communication issues our communities encountered.

We began discussions on creative solutions to some of the problems we faced such as "Snow Mountains" that are plowed on the corners of intersections that make driving difficult due to huge blind spots and other safety issues for students who could not reach their bus stops or schools. I am advocating for more local resident accountability from VDOT.

I will continue to work to ensure in the event of another blizzard that our citizens will be safe and that our roads and sidewalks are clear. If you have any suggestions, please feel free to contact me anytime.

## Silver Line Comprehensive Plan Amendment (CPAM)

During the Loudoun Board of Supervisors Meeting on January 21, the Board forwarded the Silver Line CPAM to the Transportation and Land Use Committee (TLUC) to discuss development of a small area plan,



centered around the metro stations. As a member of TLUC, I am very much looking forward to working on the Silver Line CPAM to create a product that makes our metro stops unique – not like Fairfax or Arlington. One thing our office is working on is to attract a major university to the Silver Line; this campus would put our metro stops on the map, not just as the end of a line, but as a destination.

County Staff has developed a market analysis and best practices to address future development at the silver line stops and the final recommendations were:

- 1. Maintain current Plan Policy and Zoning at the Loudoun Gateway Station Area to promote jobgenerating, airport-compatible uses.
- 2. Consider a catalytic anchor use at the Loudoun Gateway Station Area, if the office market remains stagnant.
- 3. Work with MWAA to encourage airport-compatible development at the Loudoun Gateway Station Area.
- 4. Continue to pursue commercial development at the Ashburn Station Area.

5. Consider interim uses at the Station Areas to activate them, provide income for property owners, and generate tax revenues.

Through public outreach we found that nearly 90% of participants strongly agreed that the study area should include more walkable, mixed-use centers -- similar to One Loudoun.

Loudoun County also reached out to a third-party consultant to receive their input on how they see the future of our metro stops. In their studies, they found that it was important to incorporate open green space, allow for data centers to be built in strategic areas, and identify sites for new schools and facilities.

Development at the future metro stations will be a community effort, and we are trying to discover the best outcome for the future of Loudoun County.

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




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

## CAST IRON SKILLET BRUSSELS SPROUTS BACON PIZZA

Your favorite pizza dough divided in half for thirds

6 slices thick cut bacon, chopped

1 shallot, sliced

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/2 lb. brussels sprouts, stems removed and thinly sliced

1/4 tsp pepper

1/8 tsp salt

4 oz. provolone cheese, freshly grated

4 oz. fontina cheese, freshly grated

2 Tbsp finely grated Parmesan cheese

Fry bacon in regular skillet until crispy. Remove all but 2 tablespoons of bacon grease from the skillet. Reduce heat to medium low and add shallot. Cook for 5 minutes until soft, then add garlic, sliced brussels, salt and pepper, stirring well to coat. Cook for 6-8 minutes, tossing occasionally. Remove from heat and set aside. Place one dough on a well floured surface and roll out round, about the size of your cast iron skillet. Place an oven rack directly under your broiler and preheat to the highest setting. Additionally, place your cast iron skillet on the stovetop burner, turning the heat on high. Heat the skillet for 10 minutes. While the skillet is heating, place the toppings on the dough. Add about half of the fontina and provolone cheeses, then cover with the brussels sprouts mixture and the bacon. Top with the remaining fontina, provolone and parmesan. Carefully slide the pizza into the skillet, dough side down. After about 30 seconds, turn off the burner, and place right under the broiler. Broil for 1 minute, rotate 180 degrees, broiling for only 1 more minute. Remove immediately and place on the stovetop. Let cool slightly for about 5 minutes, then use a large spatula to remove the pizza. Slice and serve. Howsweeteats.com

## **REESE'S PEANUT BUTTER CUP PRETZEL COOKIES**

1 1/2 cups flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp kosher salt

1/4 tsp baking soda

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{1}}$  stick unsalted butter, at room temperature

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 cup powdered sugar

2 large egg yolks

1 large egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

8 oz Reese's peanut butter cups, coarsely chopped (about 11 full sized ones)

1/3 cup coarsely chopped pretzels fleur de sel or other flaky sea salt

Place racks in upper and lower thirds of oven. Preheat oven to 375F. In a large bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, kosher salt, and baking soda. Set aside. Beat butter with brown sugar, sugar, and powdered sugar for 3-4 minutes, until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, egg, and vanilla and beat for an additional 4-5 minutes, scraping down the sides as needed. With mixer on low, add dry ingredients, beating just until combined. Use a spatula to fold in pretzels and chopped Reese's peanut butter cups. Spoon rounded tablespoonfuls of cookie dough onto 2 baking sheets lined with parchment paper. Leave 1 inch between cookies. Sprinkle cookies with sea salt. Bake cookies for 10-12 minutes, rotating pans halfway through, just until golden brown on the edges. Allow cookies to cool slightly on baking sheets before transferring to wire racks to cool completely. *Thesweetlife.com* 

## IN THE GARDEN

Native Bees - The Unsung Heroes in the Garden Photo and Article By Nancy Caldwell, VCE Loudoun County Master Gardener

You've probably heard all about the plight of the honeybee. Colony collapse disorder and the threat posed by pesticides and other factors have all been well documented. But did you know the honeybee is actually a newcomer brought to this country by European settlers? In fact, there are more than 4,000 native species of bees that are just as critical to our food web and crop production. Unfortunately, just like other pollinators, native bees are under stress from a shrinking habitat and dwindling food supply.


source for bees, purple coneflower, asters and goldenrod are just a few examples.

monarch butterfly as well as a nectar

Next, think about nest sites. Protect nests that you see, and think about creating a bee sanctuary. It may seem scary to think of encouraging bees on your property, but almost all native bees are passive by nature and won't sting unless squashed or pinched.

Finally, reconsider how and when

you apply pesticides, which can be very harmful to bees and their offspring. Ιf y o u must use pesticides, a v o i d spraying plants in



bloom and time application to the evening when bees are less active. Try to maintain a buffer zone between sprayed areas and nearby natural habitat, and be mindful of wind conditions that might cause pesticide drift.

If you'd like to learn more about how to support our native bees, pick up the Xerxes Society's guide "Attracting Native Pollinators," or visit their website at xerces.org.

Why, you may ask, are bees so important? "One in every three mouthfuls of food we eat and drink can be traced back to a

pollinator,



including most of the most vitaminrich and nutritious foods... And that pollinator is usually a bee," says entomologist and pollinatorconservation specialist Kelly Gill. We gardeners can help support native bees, says Gill, by learning more about their needs and acting more hospitably, and we don't have to be beekeepers to do it.

First, think about adding more flowering plants to your landscape, preferably natives, and try to make sure something is blooming all season long. Butterfly milkweed, which is a host plant for the



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
