





Looking Forward

This May will mark the 24th anniversary of American Wetlands Month, a time when EPA and its partners in federal, state, tribal, local, non-profit, and private sector organizations celebrate the vital importance of wetlands to the Nation's ecological, economic, and social health. It is also a great opportunity to discover



and teach others about the important role that wetlands play in our environment and the significant benefits they provide — improved water quality, increased water storage and supply, reduced flood and storm surge risk, and critical habitat for plants, fish, and wildlife.

Beginning in the early planning stages of Broadlands, efforts were made to preserve the natural wetlands by working around them to create areas for homes, schools, recreation, offices, and shopping. The result was a land plan with green spaces throughout the community. A commitment to preserving and enhancing the natural environment is at the heart of Broadlands philosophy. Unfortunately it seems that our wetlands are sometimes misunderstood.

What is a wetland?

A wetland is an area that is covered by shallow water or has waterlogged soils for long periods during the growing season in most years. Prolonged saturation with water leads to chemical changes in wetland soils, which in turn affect the kinds of plants that can grow. Therefore, wetland vegetation often looks quite different from that of surrounding non-wetland areas. Although wetlands are often wet, a wetland might not be wet year-round. Some of the most important wetlands are only seasonally wet. Wetlands are the link between the land and the water. They are transition zones where the flow of water, the cycling of nutrients, and the energy of the sun meet to produce a unique ecosystem characterized by hydrology, soils, and vegetation, making these areas very important features of a watershed. Using a watershed-based approach to wetland protection ensures that the whole system, including land, air, and water resources, is protected. The United States loses about 60,000 acres of wetlands each year. The very runoff that wetlands help to clean can overload and contaminate these fragile ecosystems. In addition, nonnative species of plants and animals and global climate change contribute to wetland loss and degradation. See wetlands page 6

How do wetlands benefit nature?

Often called "nurseries of life," wetlands provide habitat for thousands of species of aquatic and terrestrial plants and animals. Although wetlands are best known for being home to water lilies, turtles, frogs, muskrats, salamanders, and snakes, they also provide important habitat for waterfowl, fish, and mammals. Migrating birds use wetlands to rest and feed during their crosscontinental journeys and as nesting sites when they are at home. As a result, wetland loss has a serious impact on these species. Habitat degradation since the 1970s has been a leading cause of species extinction. Wetlands do more than provide habitat for plants and animals in the watershed. When rivers overflow, wetlands help to absorb and slow floodwaters. This ability to control floods can alleviate property damage and loss and can even save lives. Wetlands also absorb excess nutrients, sediment, and other pollutants before they reach rivers, lakes, and other waterbodies.

How do wetlands benefit people?

Wetlands benefit people in many ways that may not be obvious. They improve the quality of our water by filtering sediments and removing contaminants. They serve as spawning sites and nursery areas for fish and other aquatic life. They also support downstream aquatic systems, including commercial and sport fisheries, by producing food and organic material that is flushed out of the wetlands and into streams during high flows. They reduce flood damage to crops and human settlements downstream by storing flood water and releasing it slowly, like a giant sponge. They protect shorelines from erosion due to waves and currents. Additionally, they provide recreational opportunities, such as hunting, fishing, boating, and wildlife watching.

How can you recognize a wetland? The term "wetland" encompasses a variety of conditions and degrees of wetness. Some wetlands are very easy to recognize because the water sits on the land's surface for much of the year. Other wetlands exist due to saturation of the soil by groundwater and can be difficult to identify. One clue that a tract of land may contain wetlands is its topography or position in the landscape. Wetlands occur in areas where water naturally flows or accumulates, such as in the floodplains of streams and rivers, along smaller creeks and washes, in low spots or depressions in flat or rolling landscapes, around seeps and springs, along the fringes of ponds and lakes, and in coastal areas affected by tides. Even in fairly obvious wetland situations, it may be difficult to determine where the wetland ends and the upland begins. Wetlands are delineated by carefully examining a site for the presence of wetland indicators. Three categories of wetland indicators exist: vegetation, soil, and hydrology.

What does this all mean to me?

Broadlands Association and our contractors work very hard to protect our existing wetlands. What may appear to be a nuisance or unattractive to you may in fact be a wetlands preserve or wetlands impact area. You may want (or want the HOA) to alter the wetlands on some ways, but these areas are heavily regulated by the Army Corps of Engineers and limits are placed on what can and cannot be done to alter these areas. The following outlines what can and cannot be done in a preserved wetlands area at Broadlands.

Permitted Activities:

- Trimming (by hand only) of dead or diseased vegetation
- Planting of native species typically adapted to living in wetland areas

Typical trees include

Red Maple, Pin Oak, Willow Oak, Green Ash, Sycamore, Sweet Gum

Typical shrubs include:

Black Willow, Arrowwood, Silky Dogwood, Brookside Alder, Winterberry, Highbush Blueberry

Prohibited Activities:

- Removing vegetation by the roots
- Ditching, filling, grading or other land disturbing activities
- Installation of permanent structures such as dog runs, dog kennels, picnic tables, swing sets, mulch piles, or asphalt or concrete paths

Wetlands in Broadlands occur along streams and ponds, as well as in low lying wooded areas. Many of our trails, homes, and tot lots are adjacent to wetlands or wetlands impact areas. Many of these areas either hold water year round or fill with water after heavy rains, doing what they are supposed to do by preventing flooding, hosting wildlife, and filtering sediment. Many of them are adjacent to stormwater management facilities, which we do maintain and can be generally identified by rip rap (rocks used to armor streambeds and other stormwater management structures against scour and water or ice erosion) or metal or concrete culverts. Hopefully you now have a greater appreciation of wetlands and how we have incorporated Broadlands into the natural environment and the next time vou see stagnant water or a swampy area you think may need better drainage, you may be looking at a wetlands area.

So get out there and enjoy the surrounding nature!

This meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 15 2015 at the Broadlands Clubhouse, located at 43360 Rickenbacker Square. The doors open at 6:30 PM for the purpose of registering a quorum. The agenda begins at 7:00 PM.As part of the meeting, an election will be held to select three (3) members to three-year terms ending in May 2018.

Even if you plan to attend, you are strongly encouraged to submit your online proxy so that a quorum may be obtained. You can change your proxy online at any time before the meeting, or you can rescind it and vote at the meeting via paper ballot.

Need a More Secure Recycling Bin?

Residents who currently have the smaller, open recycling bin through Patriot may swap out for the larger, lidded recycling toter at no additional cost. Please contact Patriot Disposal at 703-257-7100 to make this request. You are encouraged to keep a record of the serial number of your toter(s) should you need to identify it in the future.

Save Yourself Time, Money and Aggravation

Before you make any modification, change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Don't be misled by well meaning friends, neighbors or contractors. It is the owner's responsibility to file an application for all exterior work. A county permit does not circumvent this requirement. The process is easy if you apply before work commences.

What can happen if you don't submit an application? You may be ordered to cease and desist, which might cause your contractor to charge additional money for delays in completion. You may have to appear before the Board of Directors at a violation hearing. You may be assessed a fee of up to \$900, which will be added to your account and to which late fees, attorney fees, and court costs can be charged if payment is not made. You may be taken to General District Court for a judge to hear the case and determine the penalty. You may lose your recreational and voting privileges. You might have difficulty selling your home if violations are noted in the resale package which you provide to your buyer.

Please consult the Design Guidelines on the website for detailed information. Submit a complete application package in order to obtain approval prior to beginning any work. The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality throughout the community, to promote sensitivity for the natural environment and to encourage consistency of design while allowing flexibility for achieving design solutions. May Covenants Corner

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors inspect the homes in the community for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in view to parking issues and unapproved modifications to leftover holiday decor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular violations that occur with high frequency.

During the month of May as the turf and plants become active, the Inspectors will be focusing on lawn maintenance. Lot owners and residents are required to mow, weed, and prune the front and back of their lots on a regular basis, with detailed guidelines outlined in the Procedures and Standards Relating to Yard and Lawn Maintenance (see For Homeowners>Rules and Regulations on the website). This resolution was adopted by the Board of Directors for the benefit and protection of all owners in order to ensure that all lot owners maintain their yards and lawns in a neat and orderly condition.

Lawn maintenance violations include: turf in excess of 6 inches; excessive weeds, overgrown or unsightly shrubbery or other plant growth; yards with litter, trash, debris or other objects; other unsightly conditions.

If these conditions are noted, a Warning and Hearing Opportunity letter will be issued to the property owner, providing ten days to correct the issue. If the violation is not corrected within ten days and a Hearing is not requested, the HOA or its contractor will enter the lot and correct the violation, and the resulting repair costs as well as an administrative fee will be charged back to the owners' account.

If you have questions regarding this process, or if you receive one of these letters and are unable to correct in the time allotted, you may contact the covenants inspectors at covenants@broadlandshoa.com to request a reasonable extension to rectify the issue.

Modifications Subcommittee Using New Software

Once the Subcommittee has reached a decision, the results letter will be delivered via email. If an email address is not provided, the results letter will be mailed.

Floating Wetlands Islands...

Broadlands Partners on Projects for the Health of the Community & Environment By: Sarah Gerstein

In an effort to mediate the negative impact our stormwater pond runoff has on the Chesapeake Bay, three Bio Haven® Floating Islands were constructed, planted, and launched in Burnt Hickory Pond, one of Broadlands' storm water management sites on a sunny morning in mid April. On this glorious spring day, three organizations came together to construct, plant, and launch the three floating islands in our pond.

The Partnership: After over a year of partnership work between the launch, marked the culmination of the efforts of Broadlands Association. Piedmont Environmental Council. and the Loudoun County Department of General Services. Thanks to Gem Bingol with PEC for authoring the grant proposal, the county applied for and received grants from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and Fairfax Water, and our first project has launched!

Habitats Committee, Broadlands resident Shannon Hall, Sarah Ali from Lansdowne and I installed the native plants on the islands and covered them with peat moss, providing them room to thrive and grow through the season. The county was in charge of tethering the island materials together, soaking them, floating them into the pond and dropping their anchors in the designated areas.





Anchoring: The floating islands are temporarily framed with white ropes and pink tape to prevent the nesting geese in the pond from climbing onto the islands oreating the young, immature and susceptible plant material. We were careful not to disturb the geese that were on site guarding their nest of eggs, but we do not want to encourage this family to sustain themselves on our new plant material. It is expected that the plants will take about a season to grow to maturity, so we should see healthy, lush islands by October. Cinderblocks are being used temporarily for weighing the islands down to ensure the plants get enough water while their roots are still shallow. Once the plants mature by this fall, we are planning to remove the rope frames and the cinderblocks.





You may see that the islands move around a bit in the water. This is the slack in the anchors, about 14 feet in addition to the 12 foot average depth, to allow for the rise in the water we see in seven to ten year floods(record breaking rainstorms). If the water level was to reach the 100 year flood







stage (depths reaching 34 feet), the islands will submerge until the waters subside.

The impact: Floating Islands will create a concentrated wetland effect by removing the excessive nutrients, phosphorous, and nitrogen from the storm water runoff before it makes its way downstream from Goose Creek to the Potomac River, eventually spilling into the Chesapeake Bay. The Bay's land-to-water ratio is 14:1: the largest of any coastal water body in the world. Reducing our impact with this installation benefits the entire community as well as the environment.

I encourage you to visit the site and enjoy the view. Increased and diverse vegetation will bring more butterflies and birds while it's cleaning the water. Don't forget your binoculars and cameras. We will monitor the growth, but these islands should be fairly self-sustaining. The next phase will be to install the biofilters around the outfall structure, which were done during the week of April 13th. Hopefully by the time you read this, our plants will have begun to prosper and take root!

Board of Supervisors Adopts FY 2016 Budget

On April 1st, the Board voted 7-2 to adopt a fiscal plan for FY 2016. Highlights of this \$2.2 billion plan include fully funding the Loudoun County Public Schools' (LCPS) budget request (more below), enhancements in public safety to keep pace with population growth and a continued focus on improving transportation infrastructure. I voted in favor of this plan because I think it balances the need to fund core functions of government with fiscal responsibility. In my opinion, this was the smoothest budget process in the past four years and exemplified the excellent cooperation that exists between the Board of Supervisors, the School Board and the new Superintendent.

To fund this budget, the Board of Supervisors adopted a property tax rate of \$1.135/per hundred in assessed value, which is a two cent reduction from last year's tax rate. On average, this tax rate should keep tax bills flat compared with last year despite the rise in assessments. Additionally, we were able to commit \$10 million of FY 2015 surplus funding, known as fund balance, to assist in fully funding LCPS. This surplus was available due to stronger than expected revenue growth, especially in the commercial sector. It's great to see the Board's economic development strategy paying off in the form of additional revenue to fund priorities like education without needing to raise taxes.

One key factor in the cooperative budget discussions between the School Board and Board of Supervisors this year was the leadership of LCPS's new superintendent, Dr. Eric Williams. Dr. Williams presented a realistic and transparent budget proposal to the School Board which gave the Board of Supervisors great confidence in where exactly LCPS had needs. I hope this transparent and cooperative approach can continue next year. Additionally, the leadership of County Administrator




Tim Hemstreet in running a lean and efficient operation on the county side made working on the budgets of the thirty-one other county agencies very smooth.

Some have said that this current Board of Supervisors has not been supportive of education over the past few years, but that sentiment couldn't be further from the facts and in comparison to prior Boards. Since this Board took office,

we have invested an additional \$215 million in LCPS, a 28% increase. These increases have allowed the cost-perpupil, a metric that takes into account student enrollment growth, to grow from \$11,014 to \$12,705, a 15.4% increase. I'm proud of our record of prioritizing education and that we have been able to accomplish it while lowering the tax rate four years in a row. It's proof that low taxes and quality services are not opposites, but can be achieved with sound management.

In addition to the operating budget, the Board adopted a \$488 million Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to fund capital projects for both general government and public schools for FY 2016. This plan continues the Board's priorities of "catching up" on vital infrastructure like roads and schools that are sorely needed due to the significant growth we have experienced. It is critical going forward we be mindful of land use conversions and up zonings that would significantly deviate from the comprehensive plan in terms of planned housing density as this would stunt our progress in

Her final correspondence attached to the foot of a vampire bat that somehow flew across the Pacific and then the North American continent in less than 3 days said "I'll be back for second Saturday's when my replacement is overwhelmed." Okay, fine, you got me. Jessica's pregnant with her third child



And that's me, her replacement. I'm Erin Fairlight, one of your neighbors here in Broadlands. In some areas that are density centers such as the Ashburn metro station we have more flexibility but in other areas such as the transition zone we need to be extremely cautious as the appropriate infrastructure is not in place. In addition to capital funding in FY 2016, the CIP includes plans for many important projects for the Broad Run District in subsequent years.

Important projects funded in and around the Broad Run District include:

- The Academies of Loudoun \$114 million in FY 2016 for a science, technology, engineering and math magnet high school
- Belmont Ridge Road Widening - Funded between FY 2016 to FY 2018, this will widen Belmont Ridge to four lanes from Brambleton to

Route 7

- Waxpool Road intersection improvements - traffic flow optimization and new turn lanes along Waxpool at Pacific Boulevard, Broderick Drive and Smith Switch Road
- Prentice Drive extension \$63 million in funding is allocated in FY 2019 and FY 2020 to build a new bridge across the Broad Run between Waxpool Road and the Greenway.
- Farmwell Road widening \$7 million is funded in FY 2016 to widen Farmwell Road to six lanes between Ashburn Road and Smith Switch Road.
- Ashburn Recreation and Community Center - \$67 million is funded between FY 2017 and FY 2018. which includes \$14 million in proffer funding. This recreation and


- community center will include an indoor lap pool, leisure pool and fitness center will be located on a proffered site off Belmont Ridge Road near Broadlands.
- Ashburn Senior Center \$7.8 million is funded to build this Senior Center in FY 2017.

From the Habitat Committee...

Plants That Repel Bugs and Pests By Oya Simpson, Wildlife Habitats Committee

There's nothing that ruins summer fun faster than a swarm of mosquitoes, flies or hornets, yet most chemical solutions are hardly appealing. Mosquito repellents are sticky, oily and smelly, and the chemical compound DEET has been found to be toxic for children. Citronella candles work with limited effectiveness. The following plants have volatile oils or strong fragrances that deter pests. The plants can be used not only to scare mosquitoes off the patio, but to deter bugs in the garden, as well. Here is a plant list for your pest-free garden.

- Catnip (Nepetacataria). Catnip, a member of the mint family, contains the essential oil, nepetalactone. A study conducted by the U.S. Department of Forestry Service found that nepetalactone is more effective at deterring mosquitoes than DEET. Plant it in partial shade to full sun. Like all members of the mint family, it can become invasive in cool, moist conditions. Cut it back annually to keep it under control.
- Lime basil (Ocimumamericanum). This edible herb has a slight lime scent that deters mosquitoes and other insects. Grow it in moderately fertile, moist soil in full sun. Pinch back the leaves to encourage compact growth.
- Rose-scented monarda. What if the pleasing scent of roses deterred pests? Rose-scented monarda is a perennial plant that produces the chemical compound, geraniol -pleasing scent to humans, but one that mosquitoes avoid.
- Thyme (Thymus vulgaris). You thought thyme was just for flavor-

ing soup and roasted chicken, but turns out it's an effective mosquito repellent. The oil lasts as long as DEET too.

- Aromatic herbs, including chives, garlic, peppermint, dill, coriander, fennel and mustard deter a variety of pests, from aphids to flea beetles. Plant these herbs throughout your garden in pots.
- Nasturtiums and icicle radishes deter squash bugs on cucurbits. Soak nasturtium seeds in water to soften their seedcoats. Radishes can be planted a few weeks before you plant the squash.
- Fennel, garlic and rosemary are reported to deter slugs and snails.
- Borage, calendula and thyme can stop the rampage of a tomato hornworm.
- Japanese beetles love to eat Mirabilis (4 o'clocks), but the toxic leaves soon do them in. Remember that this plant is toxic to humans and other animals as well, so use care when planting it.
 - Petunias repel many insects, including aphids, leafhoppers, tomato worms and asparagus beetles. Imagine how pretty the vegetable garden would look with a few flowering petunias.

The image of long, straight rows of vegetables, such as those found in Mr. McGregor's garden, has remained with us for many years, but it's hardly the most efficient way to garden. A single crop grown in large amounts in one area is a bit like a neon buffet sign, beckoning the pests that feed on that crop. The garden that mixes



up crops and intermingles them with aromatic herbs and flowers is much more confusing to insects, and much less enticing.

To make the most of pest-deterring plants, spread them throughout the garden. Since some insects overwinter beneath the soil, it's a good idea to rotate crops so they don't grow in the same spot twice. Floating row covers is another organic strategy that bars pests from ever making their way into your luscious garden.

Stick Art Is Coming to Broadlands!

Patrick Dougherty, an ephemeral art creator from North Carolina, has been stick bending all over the world, installing over 200 enormous sculptures. As this article is going to press, his newest installation is being created by a team of 50 volunteers in Reston Town Center.



We will be doing a smaller version of Patrick's earth art with

our sculpture between the Nature Center and Mill Run Elementary School throughout the month of May, each Saturday and Sunday afternoon from 2:00pm - 6:00pm. By using minimal tools and only the trees in our forests we will harvest and then weave something that looks akin to a Hobbit house.

On this style of sculpture Patrick has said: "I think that part of my work's allure is its impermanence, the life cycle that is built into the growth and decay of saplings. My focus has always been the process of building a work and allowing those who pass to enjoy the daily changes or drama of building a sculpture as well as the final product. However, the line between trash and treasure is thin, and the sculptures, like the sticks they are made from, begin to fade after two years. Often the public imagines that a work of art should be made to last, but I believe that a sculpture, like a good flower bed, has its season."

The sculpture will remain between 2-3 years—the life of a stick. Only trees that are covered in brambles or ivy are being extracted and wildflower seed bombs are being thrown onto the soil to strengthen our local ecology and diversity in the forests.

NVCC Opens Enrollment For Viticulture Classes

Northern Virginia Community College this fall will launch a viticulture course aimed at helping to train workers for the region's fast-growing wine industry.

Open enrollment for the courses begins May 5. College Provost Julie Leidig and Horticulture Technology program leader Dave Scheid hope to get 15 to 25 students registered for the Introduction to Viticulture course. "We're excited to be launching the course in the fall, and we hope to build a huge momentum through vigorous promotion so we have a strong enrollment," Leidig said.


Scheid said he has already received interest in the three classes that will be offered for the viticulture program: Introduction to Viticulture; Vineyard Establishment; and Pest and Disease Management. Each class will be for three credits.

The classes represent the next step in the movement to capitalize on Loudoun's growing wine industry—some 44 wineries to date—and to improve the quality of wine produced in the county. Bringing trained viticulturists and enologists to the wine production effort will bring its own rewards, including jobs, proponents say.

Loudoun Agricultural Development Officer Kellie S. Boles attended a program kick-off meeting last week and said she was pleased with the progress. "I think it's exactly how we envisioned it going forward," she said.

The program has roots in an effort by the county government and the Town of Purcellville to explore the feasibility of establishing a viticulture and enology education center in Loudoun. Virginia See Viticulture Classes on page 36

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
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About Your Pet...

Walk this Way - As Safely As You Can By: Shannon M. Pecora, MA of Stream Valley Veterinary Hospital



Family fitness, we think it's a big deal! One of the easiest family-friendly fitness activities is, of course, walking. And you can even include your dog or cat, ferret, or other pet who has been medically cleared and taught to walk on a leash! In terms of skill and exertion levels, walking is generally simple, low-key, and safe. In communities such as ours. however, it is important to minimize risks involving younger children and busy roadways; children often just don't have the physical strength to truly control a dog on a leash. With even one small distraction, a dog can break away from a child, running out into a roadway, approaching an unfriendly pet, or getting lost.

There are many less dangerous ways to get your kids involved with walking the family dog so that everyone can benefit from the fitness and human-animal bond. Go ahead and let your child "help you with the leash"; keep your usual control of the leash, but maintain enough length at the end, behind your hand, so that your child can lightly hold

on there. That way, if Fido pulls a bit too hard, you'll have control and bear the brunt of the tugging.


Aside from leash-handling, there are other responsibilities that are perfect for a child's participation. For example, it's a great idea to teach your dog to automatically wait or even sit at busy street corners, giving you time to look both ways and/or wait for the crosswalk signal to change. Your child's task can be to hold the training treats or hand you the clicker as you approach the corner. This also gives you the opportunity to demonstrate positive reinforcement training, setting your child up for a lifetime of positive bonds with pets. In warmer weather, another kid friendly task could be filling a water bottle and carrying a portable water bowl. Your child will enjoy the satisfaction of keeping your dog refreshed and happy, and your dog will learn to associate your child with kindness and good care. And who could forget doggie doody duty? Someone needs to make sure that you set out with enough pick-up bags, and when they're old enough, children can do the....dirty work...themselves. Remember the hand sanitizer!

Other important safety considerations include keeping proper identification tags on your pet and having your veterinarian place a microchip. A pet microchip is about the size of a small grain of rice, and it is implanted between your pet's shoulder blades. It gets registered to you with your contact information. Most animal control agencies and veterinary offices carry scanners; they simply wave the scanning device over the pet's back to detect the registration info if the pet does indeed have a microchip. They'll contact the microchip company who can help them contact you and arrange for your reunion! Your information can generally be updated online, so if you move, you can associate the microchip with your current address and phone number.

If you, as an adult, struggle with keeping control of your dog on a leash, obedience classes can help you and your pet learn the proper techniques for walking as a team. You can also try specialized harnesses, such as the Gentle Leader. that help you direct your pet's head, rather than allowing him or her to use the strength of neck or chest to pull on you.

Check with your own doctor and your pet's veterinarian before you begin any exercise routine. You'll want your whole family to avoid injury! And, our last tip is perhaps the best one, get out there and have fun!

Dog walks don't have to be just obligatory potty breaks. Look forward to them as quality time to enjoy with your whole family!

Baja Baby Scallops Ceviche

1 pound, 5 ounces bay scallops
3/4 cup lime juice (about 8 limes)
1/3 cup minced red onion
1/3 cup seeded and diced tomato
1/2 cup peeled, seeded and diced
cucumber

1 seeded and diced jalapeño Scant 1 cup diced cilantro 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil Salt and freshly ground black pepper

In a medium bowl, marinate the scallops in the lime juice for 30 minutes, covered and refrigerated, tossing every 10 minutes. Strain and save the lime juice. Stir in the onion, tomato, cucumber, jalapeño and cilantro. Stir in the olive oil and season to taste with salt and pepper, and add back lime juice to taste as desired. Serve immediately. 2 thyme sprigs

ENCHILADAS

8 white corn tortillas (7 in.)

2 cups thinly sliced cooked chicken breasts

8 ounces queso fresco*, crumbled

4 ounces Oaxaca cheese*, pulled into shreds

MAKE SAUCE: Preheat broiler with rack on rung closest to heat. Set tomatillos on a foil-lined rimmed baking sheet. Broil, turning once, until blackened, 10 minutes. Purée in a blender. Measure 3/4 cup and set aside. Set oven to 350°. Heat oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat, then add shallot and cook until translucent, 2 to 3 minutes. Add thyme, salt, and pepper and cook until shallot starts to brown, 1 minute. Add wine and reduce until almost gone, 2 minutes. Stir in cream, tomatillo purée, and sugar. Cook over medium-high heat, stirring often, about 5 minutes, then reduce heat and simmer until sauce thickly coats a metal spoon, 3 to 5 more minutes. Set aside. MAKE ENCHILADAS: Heat 2 large frying pans over medium-high heat. In first pan, pour 1/4 in. oil and heat until shimmering. Working with 1 tortilla at a time, cook in dry pan, turning once, until softened, 10 to 20 seconds, then in oil, turning once, until puffy and softened but not crisp, 10 to 15 seconds. Arrange in a single layer on paper towels. Lay tortillas flat on a work surface. Arrange chicken and queso fresco down the centers. Roll closed and set, seams down, in a 9x13-in. baking dish (with no sauce on the bottom). Pour sauce over enchiladas; top with Oaxaca cheese. Bake until cheese melts and sauce is bubbling, 20 minutes. Garnish with queso fresco, cilantro, onion, and a drizzle of crema. Add chorizo if you like and serve with salsa. Serves: 4 Myrecipes.com

Pool Season Begins May 23rd... Do You Know Where Your Pool Passes Are?

It's time to start digging around in the bottom of your pool bag or in the drawer with the swimsuits for your Broadlands Photo ID Pool Passes. Everyone aged 5 and older will need one to gain admission to the pools. If you are 18 or older, you must provide proof of residency in order to obtain a pool pass.

IF YOU ARE AN OWNER AND HAVE THE POOL PASSES YOU USED LAST YEAR, YOU DO NOT NEED TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION. Passes will be electronically reactivated. If you cannot locate your passes, reprints can be issued free of charge prior to the opening of the pool on May 23rd, 2015. After May 23rd, replacement cards will cost \$5.00 each. If you want a new picture for your replacement pass, the cost is \$7.00, regardless of when the pass is issued.

Updating Passes: If you have a child whose pool pass has not been updated in the last five (5) years or so, please bring him/her by the Nature Center to get an updated pass and a new picture taken. Any individual who has turned 18 since the last pool season will need a new adult card. Please remember to bring proof of residency if you are updating your pass to an adult card.

New Owners: You must fill out an owner application, return it to the HOA office at the Nature Center and have your photos taken. Owner applications can be found online at broadlandshoa.org under pool information, and are available at the Nature Center or in our Newsletter. Pool passes are issued to each individual aged 5 and older living in the household. A household consists of all persons living in the dwelling, including college students, other non-resident children spending the swim season in Broadlands and live-in care providers or others showing proof of residency in the form of a valid driver's license or other government issued ID or utility bill.

Children 5 yrs or older: Children who have turned 5 yrs old since last summer, or will be 5 yrs old by June 1, 2015, must have a pool pass for the upcoming pool season. An owner application must be filled out and a picture taken so a pass can be issued. Owner applications can be found online at broadlandshoa.org under pool information, and are available at the Nature Center or in the Newsletter. Please return completed owner applications to the HOA office at the Nature Center to add your child (ren) to your family data base. NEW THIS YEAR: Children under 5 yrs old may obtain a pool pass in order to bring in guests to the pool. This change will allow our 5 and under members the opportunities to have an older guest accompany them when other family members are not available.

Long Term Guest Passes: Long Term Guess Passes are offered for \$100 for the 2015 season. They should be noted as a long term guests on the owner's application. The fee must be paid at the time their photo is taken and the pass is issued. The owner must accompany the long term guest to the photo session and show proof of identity and address.

Guest passes: 10 resident guest passes are allocated to each residence. Additional guest passes, good for 10 visits may be purchased for \$20. Members are limited to bringing 3 guests per member per visit to the pool. Guest passes are added to the electronic account of each residence and no physical passes will be issued. Guests must be accompanied by a pool pass holder to gain admittance to the pool facility. Rules regarding the use of guest passes can be found online at broadlandshoa.org.

BEGINNING APRIL 6, 2015, PICTURES WILL BE TAKEN AT THE NATURE CENTER FROM 9:00 A.M. TO 5:00 P.M. MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY ON A FIRST COME FIRST SERVED BASIS.

Prior to having a photo taken, all adults 18 and older must show a photo ID with proof residency at a Broadlands Association residential address. Photos will not be taken if acceptable proof of identity and address are not available.

Acceptable photo IDs include:

- Driver's License
- · School, Military ID
- Current Passport

If your ID does not show a Broadlands Association address, the following additional documents will be accepted as proof of residency:

- Utility bill issued within the last 60 days
- Settlement Papers or Deed
- Current Virginia Voter Registration Card

NEWOWNER ABSENTEE STATEMENT FORM and TENANT POOL APPLICATION

Owners: If an owner wishes to transfer their pool rights to their tenant, the owner must fill out the "Absentee Owner Statement - Facilities Use Agreement for Tenants" form. This is a new form for owners to transfer rights to their tenants for all of the Broadlands facilities including the three Broadlands pools, the Fitness Center and the privilege to rent the Community Center. Owners are required to complete this form prior to tenants acquiring privileges to Broadlands facilities. The completed "Absentee Owner Statement – Facilities Use Agreement for Tenants" will be valid for the duration of the Tenants lease unless the owner suspends privileges to the tenant, or the tenant fails to abide by the rules of each or any facility. Use of Broadlands facilities is subject to owners and tenants remaining in good standing with Broadlands Association. Use of Broadlands facilities and issuance of pool passes, key fobs or Community Center rental privileges will only be issued to either an owner or a tenant. In **NO** instance will privileges be granted to both. Upon lease expiration and/or renewal, it is the owners and/or tenants responsibility to notify Broadlands Association of termination or continuance of the rental of the Broadlands property.

Tenants: If an owner wishes to transfer their pool rights over to their tenant, then the owner must complete the "Absentee Owner Statement – Facilities Use Agreement for Tenants" form. Tenants must then complete and sign the "2015 Pool Membership - Tenant Application" form for membership. In this instance, passes will only be issued to the tenants, not the owners. Tenants may use previously issued passes, but these will not be activated until the owner provides a completed "Absentee Owner Statement – Facilities Use Agreement for Tenants" form authorizing the tenants to use the pools for the 2015 pool season. The forms can be found on page 32 & 33 in this newsletter, online at broadlandshoa.org under pool information, and are available at the Nature Center.

- NO DISPOSABLE DIAPERS. Children not yet toilet trained must wear plastic pants or "Swimmies" (swim diaper) under their bathing suit
- Children under 13 years of age must be accompanied and supervised by an adult 18 years of age or over
- Children under 16 years must pass the Swim test to use the diving board and slide
- Guests must be accompanied by members with pool ID. Each member is limited to bringing 3 guests per visit. Members must use guest passes for each guest aged 5 and older.
- Pool members are responsible for the conduct of their guests
- Adults are responsible for the safety and conduct of all children in their care
- Pool membership may be temporarily suspended or revoked for failing to comply with the pool rules
- Members and their guests using the pools do so at their own risk
- No lifeguards are on duty at the wading pools

Tech conducted the study. After the findings were released in December, advocates agreed to tackle the viticulture education offering first.

"We emphasized over and over to Virginia Tech, we want to start with a model to build up over time. Once the classes are established, and viticulture is well under way, we'll move into enology," Boles said. The ultimate goal is to create a wine center, but that's a far-off goal.

Last week, Scheid explained the VEN 100 Introductory to Viticulture course is intended to provide students with a clear understanding of the many factors involved in growing grapes. The course will introduce grapes, their history, distribution, classification and areas of production to students, along with an overview of grape uses and products made from them. The course will include site selection and coverage of the environmental factors that affect grapes and their quality.

The VEN 110 Vineyard Establishment course will take students through a review of sites, soils and other factors affecting the planting of grapes. It includes vineyard design, grape varieties and the planting of new vines, including initial training, choosing of varieties and control of weeds and pests.

The third course, VEN 140 Viticulture Pest and Disease Management, provides students with an understanding of the insects, diseases and pests that affect grape production. It evaluates different methods of controlling disease and pests, including natural and chemical measures, and provides field experience in disease and pest management.

"The key for us is to build a population, to show what employment opportunities there are for students. We need a big push now to get a strong enrollment," Leidig said. Students interested in the course can obtain more information

and apply for enrollment online at www.nvcc.edu, Scheid said.

The course will be listed under the Ven prefix, so those interested should scroll to the end of the Loudoun course list to see the class information.

Picture this: you are taking a group exercise class along with 50 of your closest sweaty friends. You are feeling pretty awesome, your hair looks good, you are rocking out the Spring color trend, your favorite song just came on and you remembered your water bottle today. You are feeling like a million bucks! Until...the instructor moves on to push-ups. NOOOOO! You debate whether or not you are going to bail on this track. Maybe you will tell your buddy you need to excuse yourself and hit the ladies room-you better think quick, everyone is assuming that darn prone position.

Ok, this may all be a little bit over dramatic, but we all have an exercise or two that totally freaks us out. For many people the push-up is one of those: sick to the stomach, makes you think of PE in Junior High, kind of exercises. I am here to tell you that the push-up should not be feared! In fact, the push-up is an amazing exercise and, that instead of dreading it; maybe it is an exercise to conquer. After all, nothing feels better than totally rocking a set of push-ups with perfect form.

Why should you push-up?

Push-ups are a great exercise for so many reasons but at the most basic level push-ups rock because all you need is your body to do them. No matter where you travel or what equipment a facility has, you will always have your body in tow. Best of all, push-ups are free! You don't need any equipment, gym, or DVD program to do a push-up. To perform a push-up your body must recruit muscles from all over the body to

lift and lower so you enjoy benefits such as strengthening and toning the chest, triceps and shoulders as well as engaging and defining muscle of the core.

Even though push-ups are one of the most fantastic exercises the sad fact is that as a society we stink at push-ups! Have you ever looked around during a group exercise class? Oh Momma! There can be some crazy things going on, and by the way guys: it isn't just the ladies. In addition to questionable form, there are so many people who are afraid to make the leap from kneeling push-up to the real deal. So this month, let's hit the floor together and make the move from the knees to the toes!

1. Start in high plank



2. Lower body to ground.





3. Pick up heels.



4. Push-up from knees



5. Return to high plank position and

Performing push-ups this way creates an "on ramp" to bridge the gap from kneeling push-ups to push-ups on the toes. This variation also allows you to get a good full range of motion and teaches proper form. Once you begin to get comfortable with this variation or if you can get to 15 repetitions then begin to transition in push-ups from your toes. Remember, you can always start on the toes and finish a set as outlined above until you are ready for full push-ups for an entire set. Good luck!

Our Top Ten Things to Do for Your Garden in May

- 1. Celebrate May's arrival with a visit to your favorite local plant nursery. It's time to plant! Hold off on putting in tender perennials until just past Mother's Day, because Loudoun's last frost date is May 15.
- 2. Don't plant invasive English ivy. If English ivy is already climbing your trees, our Master Garden Tree Stewards strongly recommend removing it before it kills your tree. For detailed information about ivy and its removal see:http://loudouncountymastergardeners.org/programs/ tree-stewards/english-ivy/.
- 3. Let the foliage remain on your spring flowering bulbs no matter how unsightly. Remove it only when the leaves have turned brown and are easily pulled off. The foliage is manufacturing food for the bulb and which is vital for next year's flowers!
- 4. Add more native plants to your garden. Check out plantnovanatives.org to learn why we should plant natives and which ones are best for our area.
- 5. Request a visit from the Master Gardeners Healthy Virginia Lawns team. They will take a soil sample of your lawn and determine just how much fertilizer and lime you really need to use (There is a \$20 fee for this service). Download a request form at: http:// loudouncountymastergardeners.org/programs/healthyvirginia-lawns/
- 6. Learn how to properly prune your shrubs and trees and don't allow branches to be hacked or "topped". Trees are often topped in our neighborhood landscapes, which eventually kills the tree. Virginia Tech has a "Guide to Successful Pruning: Stop Topping Trees!" athttp://pubs. ext.vt.edu/430/430-458/430-458.html.
- 7. Start your summer vegetable garden. JoinMaster Gardeners at the Demonstration Garden at Ida Lee Park in Leesburg for "Saturdays in the Garden". On May 2 the free presentation will be "Transitioning from a Spring to Summer Vegetable Garden." As a bonus, you'll see the Demonstration Garden in all its May glory.
- 8. Don't make mulch volcanos. Apply mulch only 2-3 inches high and keep it 4-6 inches away from the trucks of trees and shrubs. Try leaf mulch instead of shredded bark mulch. It's a beneficial soil conditioner and adds humus, nitrogen and other nutrients to the soil.
- 9. Find out how to create an environmentally friendly landscape that will attract birds, butterflies, frogs and other wildlife. Attend the free lecture given by Audubon Society of Northern Virginia past president Terrence Liercke, May 7, 7pm at the Loudoun Extension Office, 32 Catoctin Circle, Wells Fargo Bank Building in Leesburg.
- 10. Sit back and enjoy your garden on Mother's Day and Memorial Day weekend!

Signs and Symptoms of Anxiety and ADHD By: Tracey Powell, LPC - therapyworks.com


Rates of anxiety and ADHD are going up in our fast-paced, information-overloaded society - especially among our children and teenagers. Signs and symptoms can look like:

- Often worrying "what if" something really terrible happens.
- Googling physical symptoms and convincing yourself you have a terrible illness.
- Feeling nauseous, dizzy, sweaty, cold, or like you can't breathe at the thought of going to work/school/being alone, etc.
- Losing your temper easily.
- Often saying nothing for fear of saying something dumb or uninteresting.
- Feeling compelled to do things a particular way, count things, check things, or else you won't feel "right".
- Feeling so overwhelmed with all your tasks you get nothing accomplished and then call yourself lazy.

If you or someone you love is experiencing patterns like these, the good news is they're among the most treatable symptoms in mental health. Sometimes making a few small changes in how you take care of yourself works to quiet the worry train. Here's a few favorite strategies for feeling more calm and organized:

- Ditch self-criticism. Allow yourself to feel good about who you are becoming and what you have accomplished.
- Practice slow, deep breathing for a few minutes several times a day. Use a breathing app like Breathe2Relax or peaceful imagery if it helps.
- Take a few minutes to think of your top priorities for the day. Before turning on any media, slowly stretch, be still, or listen to music while you think about what you
- Write those priorities down, preferably in a paper planner you keep handy. If you have a lot on your agenda, keep expectations real, and see #1.
- Keep checks of email and social media to a minimum. Being "always available" or overly concerned about what others are doing robs you of the time you need to pursue your interests and goals.

If after trying some of these tips you still feel really worried and stressed, think about scheduling a consultation. You wouldn't expect yourself to fix a flaw in your golf swing on your own, right? You'd see an instructor who would probably use video analysis to help you figure out and correct the error. In the same way a trained counselor can help you slow things down and make positive changes. A little time investment can get you quickly on your way to that free and confident swing you deserve.

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

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
