A Note From Your General Manager, Sarah Gerstein

Summer is well under way and, Northern Virginia has experienced our share of extreme heat and storms. Let's just hope



we don't see another earthquake like last year!

Despite the inclement weather, I hope that you have had a chance to enjoy all that your community has to offer, including splashing around at one of the pools, attending Broadlands Live and Flicks in the Sticks, enjoying the outdoor scenery and wildlife on the trails, or visiting the animals at the Nature Center. We have been working on sprucing up the pools and resurfacing portions of the trails and plan to continue to beautify the community this fall with improvements such as repainting of the fire lanes and landscape enhancements.



The Derecho storm in late June caused problems with downed trees throughout the area. The following morning, the

association dispatched crews from Heritage Landscape Services and The Care of Trees to remove the trees blocking roadways, to clear the trails and to address owner concerns over the subsequent days.

The association continues to take a proactive approach to identifying and trimming or removing potential hazards as needed throughout the year. To that end, we remind owners of their responsibility to trim trees located adjacent to sidewalks. Trees should be trimmed a minimum of eight feet off the sidewalk, and should be trimmed back so as not to block stop signs and street signs.

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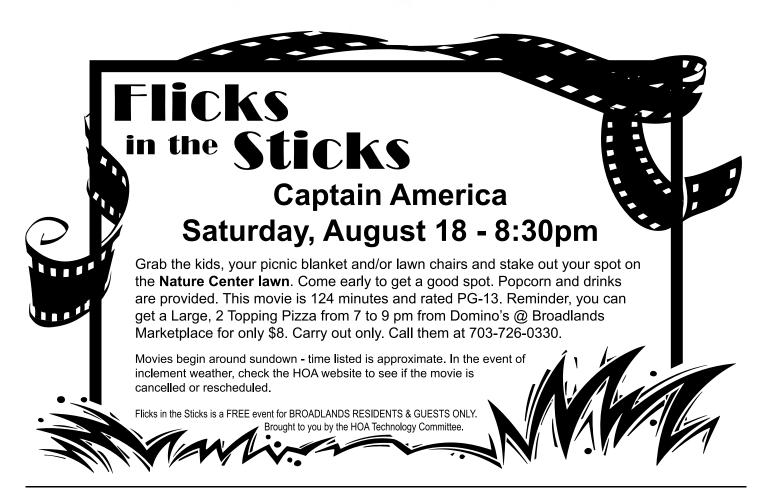

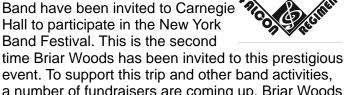

The Total Guide: Renovating Your Kitchen Provided By: Zach Richard of Total Mortgage

The kitchen is the centerpiece of your home. It tends to be the most used and most trafficked room in the house. It also has a major impact in determining the resale value of your home. The kitchen will be one of the first things that prospective buyers will see. Outdated appliances, color schemes, and floor plans will be a major turn-off to buyers. A properly renovated kitchen will provide a high return on your investment and make the home more enjoyable while you live in it.

Where To Start

If you're considering renovating your kitchen, there are some basic questions that you need to address:

- How are you going to utilize the space? The layout of your kitchen needs to compliment your lifestyle.
 Are you going to host company in your kitchen? Do you plan to eat most of your meals there? How
 many people need to be able to use the kitchen at once? These are all factors you need to consider
 when planning your remodel.
- Is it worth remodeling? A lot of this will be determined by how long you plan to stay in the house. If your intention is to move in the near-term, you may choose to go with a more superficial remodel. A facelift will make your house more attractive to potential buyers while saving you money up-front. If you are going to be in the house long-term, you may wish to undertake a complete overhaul.
- What is your taste? Consider your favorite color schemes, how you'd like to customize your cabinets, and which kind of countertops you'd like to use. Your kitchen should reflect the way you live. Use magazines to evaluate different styles and combine them to make it your own. Once you've decided on the style, stay true to it; you don't want multiple ideas and styles that clash with one another. Make sure everything works together. Remember that you will probably sell this house one day and your kitchen needs to appeal to people other than yourself.

Renovating takes a lot of planning so make sure you have the whole project mapped out and budgeted properly. Know exactly how you want your kitchen renovated. If you don't carefully plan the project, you may end up spending far more than you originally intended.

Aesthetics & Logistics

- The layout of your kitchen is largely determined by the placement of water (and potentially gas) lines.
 Rerunning plumbing will be extremely costly, so it is often best to work around the current placement of your sink, dishwasher, stove, and refrigerator. If at all possible, choose an open floor plan to make the space appear larger and more inviting.
- Consider window placement. Window placement and the amount of light in your kitchen will have
 a dramatic impact on the feel of the room. Windows can make a room seem larger and more
 comforting. You want the kitchen to be a pleasing place to spend your time. Proper window
 placement can make even the smallest kitchen seem more spacious.
- Consider your budget. Most people don't have an unlimited budget for a remodel, so you need
 to decide where you will spend and where you will save. A careful cost-benefit analysis can help
 you determine how much you should be spending on different kitchen components (appliances,
 countertops, cabinets, fixtures, flooring, etc.).
- When preparing to remodel your kitchen, decide what you can do on your own and what you will trust someone else to do. Choosing the right contractor is an important decision and you should take your time making it. Remember that this person is going to be in your home for a long time, and you will have to live with their work. Trust is paramount.

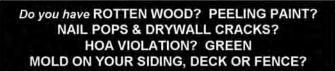
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Broadlands Association Board of Directors Meetings

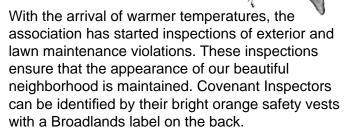

The Way to Your Pet's Heart By: Shannon M. Pecora, MA Stream Valley Veterinary Hospital

There are many ways to show affection and build bonds with our pets, specifically dogs. We take walks, snuggle, play games, learn commands and tricks, or share a good old-fashioned belly rub. We also like to offer our dogs treats as a reward for good behavior, and it's often just fun to watch them get so excited to munch on a favorite cookie. However, whether we like to admit it or not, this so-called "cupboard love" has the potential to do more harm than good when it comes to such things as our pets' waistlines, joint health, and cardiovascular strength.



Your veterinarian can help you determine if your dog's weight has become a health concern, and if so, treat adjustment might be one of the easiest, positive lifestyle changes to make. For instance, if you normally offer your dog jerky or biscuit treats from a pet supply store, check the nutrition information and compare it to your dog's regular food. You may find the calorie content in the treats is quite high. Low calorie options abound these days, so as long as your dog's taste buds and tummy can tolerate the switch, you can try one of these more weight-friendly options.

Additionally, many dogs are just as appreciative at meal time as they are at treat time. This means that their standard kibble pieces can serve as positive reinforcement rewards or as a fun between-meal snack. All you have to do is portion out some of the daily feeding amount and set it aside for use as treats throughout the day. For example, if your dog receives 1 cup of food twice a day, you can adjust to ¾ cup twice a day, leaving you half a cup of kibble that your dog can enjoy piecemeal at any time.

In terms of "people food," there are options that can help you feel like you truly are sharing with your pet **without** offering table scraps indiscriminately. Too *many table foods such as chocolate, onions, sugar substitutes, grapes, and more are dangerous for dogs*. Even if a food isn't necessarily labeled toxic, it can cause vomiting, diarrhea, or worse because dogs' sensitive digestive systems cannot handle a widely-varied diet. However, if you check with

your dog's vet, you may be given the green light to give baby carrots or green beans as treats, making lunch or dinner feel more inclusive for the family pet. As a matter of fact, plenty of dogs enjoy licking or chewing ice cubes, so simple frozen water just might be your dog's favorite treat!

No matter what turns out to be the best route to a healthy weight for your dog, you should make sure that your entire family or household is on board. To keep everyone in the know, set out the day's portion of treats on the kitchen counter. Everyone can see and have access to it, and once the container is empty, all will know that's it for the day. Maybe having a written chart will help. Each family member is allowed to offer three pieces of kibble or one baby carrot per day, and each has to note when those treats are given. This way you can track what your dog gets and when, and no one feels left out. This can be particularly helpful when you have younger kids who want the chance to participate.

Undeniably, dogs appear happy when we give them "yummies" but a dog who is overweight, is arthritic, has diarrhea, or is suffering through pancreatitis is not a happy pet. Cupboard love is not true love, but appropriate treats can serve as part of our expressions of affection every day.



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Kritters for Kids

What is like a squirrel but faster, smaller and has stripes? Have you guessed? It's a Chipmunk!

This time of year is a fun time to watch the squirrels and chipmunks

scampering around. Chipmunks hibernate underground waiting for the abundance of food that will soon be available. Faster

than their parents, baby chipmunks are emerging from their dens and running fast and furiously up and down trees, across lawns and down streets.

Almost all chipmunk species live in North America and range in size from 7.2 inches to 11 inches. You can find them foraging for food on the ground, under bushes, rocks and logs where they look for food like worms, insects, fungi (mushrooms), nuts, berries, grains and seeds. They store grains and nuts in underground caches to eat during the winter and will wake up intermittently to eat them.

If you put out a dish of food, you might be able to watch them. See if you can spy on one and find out where he lives and what he eats this summer. Be careful not to laugh too loudly or you might scare him away!

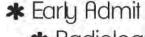

From the Naturalist....

The topic for this month's article came to mind because of a present that was left in my front garden. It was scat....coyote scat. A concern for me since coyotes are not native to the state of Virginia,



but an animal that I am familiar with since I am from California.

Coyotes are medium-sized predators originally from the grasslands and prairies where they were relatively safe from the wolves that prey on them. Because of the ongoing campaigns to eliminate the wolf (we know better now), the coyotes have overtaken their and have made it to Virginia.

A little larger than the red fox, coyotes resemble wolves (though their feet are smaller than big-footed wolves as is their nose pad) so much that the Native Americans call them "little wolf". They howl and yip to communicate to each other just like wolves but don't live in packs nor do they usually hunt together.

Coyotes are very good predators with a keen sense of smell, sharp eye sight, long ears and the ability to run 25 miles an hour for an extended period of time. When needed, can run up to 40 miles an hour in short bursts. They also have a good sense of balance even allowing them to walk on fence railings.

They often hunt in pairs and will hunt for just about anything. Their superior hunting skills make them dangerous to your pets. Because of this, please make sure that you do not leave dog or cat food out. Bring in your pets from dusk to dawn as coyotes are primarily nocturnal. They are fearful of humans and, although you may never see one, you might receive a

"gift" in your garden like me.

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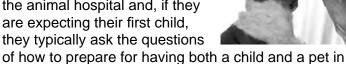

There must be something in the water here in Ashburn because I've been seeing a lot of expectant mothers coming into the animal hospital and, if they are expecting their first child, they typically ask the questions



While most dogs do fine with a new baby, don't count on it. Pets and babies both can be unpredictable, and accidents do happen. That's why people try to baby-proof and puppy-proof their homes, and even that isn't usually enough.

Before a baby is born, you can gradually put your dog on a schedule that you will be able to continue after birth, especially with petting and exercise. You may not notice how much you interact with your pet, but he is very aware and will notice if he is receiving less attention.

Once the baby is born, don't introduce her directly to the dog. Start by letting him sniff some of her clothes instead so he gets used to the smell. When you play with your dog, make sure the baby is near. That way he associates human interaction with the presence of the baby instead of dreading abandonment every time she is near. You can also drop little pieces of dog treats while you're holding the baby, as if the baby is doing so herself, to keep the dog interested in her in a good way.

Finally, never let the dog and child be together unsupervised. The cry of an infant is very stressful to a dog, and little hands can pinch and poke.

Let's Count Butterflies!

Join the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy on its 16th Annual Butterfly Count, centered in the Waterford area. No experience is necessary; novices will be teamed with experienced leaders in each segment of the count. Come out and have fun while contributing to butterfly conservation. Counters visit various locations that include butterfly gardens, sanctuaries, roadside wildflower and grassy areas and parks. We typically count over 2,000 butterflies in this single day and can get up to 50 different species. 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Your Family's Guide to Sunscreens

Choosing a safe and effective sunscreen can be a daunting process. Just this past June, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has issued new rules on labeling and effectiveness testing for sunscreens. They will ban the use of misleading claims like "sunblock," "waterproof" and "sweatproof" and define which sunscreens can claim

"broad spectrum" protection. The FDA recently granted a delay in the implementation of these rules, until mid-December 2012.

For the past few years using my background in Environmental Policy, I have relied on the **Environmental Working Group's (EWG) Sunscreen Guide** to find sunscreens with broad-spectrum (UVA and UVB) protection but with fewer hazardous chemicals that penetrate the skin. The 2012 Sunscreen Guide analyzed over 800 beach and sport sunscreens, and compiled a list of the best and worst affordable sunscreens available.

EWG recommends looking for the following:

- Active Ingredients zinc oxide, titanium dioxide, Mexoryl SX or avobenzone (3%)

- Lotions, not sprays or powder
- Water-resistant for the beach or pool

In addition to applying a safe and effective sunscreen, it is also important to take advantage of physical barriers such as sunglasses, hats, and protective clothing. This is especially important for children, since their skin is more vulnerable to sun damage.



Fall Gardening - Get ready for beautiful garden next summer!

- Rake up fallen leaves and remove plant debris from the garden and landscape. Dried plant debris provides energy for disease organisms to survive the winter.
- Check the roots of annual plants as you remove them and perennials as you divide them. Discard those with galls, rots, or other abnormalities that might indicate a root disease or nematode problem
- Check trees and shrubs for damaged or diseased areas and remove as recommended for the situation.
- Consider pruning trees and shrubs to increase air circulation in the landscape. This reduces the length of time moisture is present. The longer moisture is present the greater the chance of disease.
- Make a list of the problem plants. Use this list to choose disease resistance plants when you look through the garden catalogs this winter.
- Redesign your vegetable and flower gardens on paper to allow for good air circulation and plan to purchase stakes and cages to keep tall vine plants off the ground.
- Research the care of different plants including how to fertilize and prune. Properly cared for plants are the healthiest and most disease resistant.
- Properly start your compost of plant debris to ensure plant pathogens are destroyed.
- Add some compost to your garden to increase organic material in the soil and bolster natural disease suppression.
- Go bulb shopping for high quality and healthy bulbs.

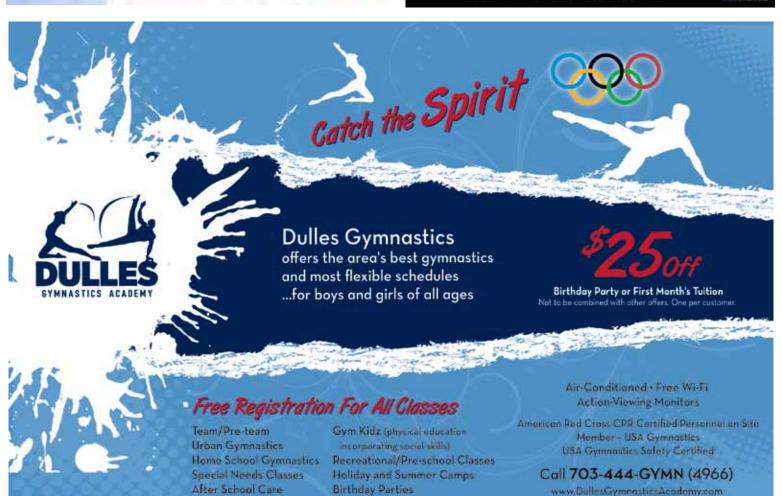

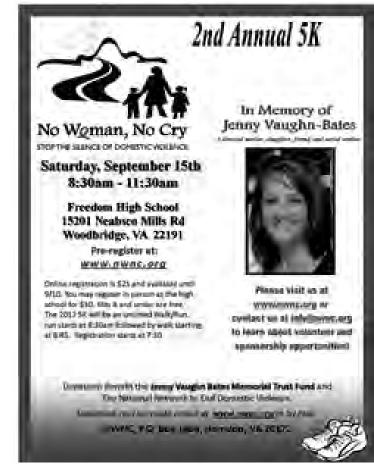
Inova Mobile Health is able to vaccinate children ages 4 and up. Minors must be accompanied by a

Slow Cooker Chicken Caesar Sandwiches

- 2 pounds boneless skinless chicken thighs
- 1 bottle of your favorite Caesar Dressing (I used Brianna's Asiago Caesar) OR 1 (10 oz) can cream of chicken soup plus one packet Caesar Dressing mix
- 1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup fresh chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon ground pepper
- 2 cups shredded romaine lettuce
- 12 french hamburger buns or buns of your choice (about 2 1/2 inch)



Place chicken in a 3-4 quart slow cooker, cover and cook on low heat for 6-7 hours. Remove chicken from cooker using a slotted spoon. Place on a cutting board and pull chicken into shreds. Place chicken back in the cooker and pour dressing (or cream of chicken plus dressing packet), Parmesan cheese, parsley, and pepper over the top. Use about 3/4 of the bottle of dressing. Stir until mixed evenly. Cover and cook on high heat for 30-35 minutes or until mixture is hot. Spoon 1/4 cup mixture onto lettuce in each bun and serve!

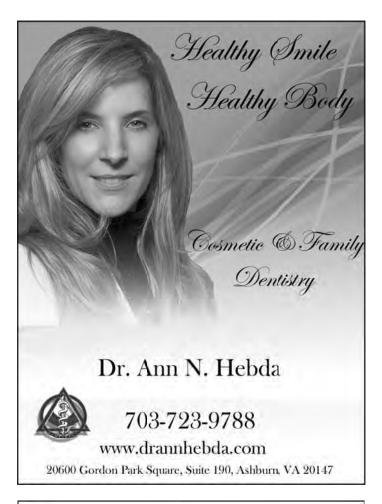
MEMBERS MUST COMPLY WITH ALL LIFEGUARD INSTRUCTIONS

GENERAL RULES

- NO glass containers or breakable objects
- NO food or drink except in designated areas
- NO profane language
- NO pets
- NO alcohol or drugs
- NO smoking
- NO chewing gum
- NO running, pushing, dunking, wrestling or rough play
- NO general swimming in diving area
- NO water toys or other equipment unless authorized by pool manager
- NO play equipment or wheeled vehicles, except wheel chairs and strollers
- NO diving in shallow area
- NO tape players, CD players or radios unless waterproof and used with personal headphones
- NO flotation devices except water wings, U.S.C.G. approved life vests and U.S.C.G. approved swimwear flotation devices
- NO DISPOSABLE DIAPERS. Children not yet toilet trained must wear plastic pants or "Swimmies" (swim diaper) under their bathing suit
- Children 5 and under must be accompanied and supervised by an adult 18 years old or over
- Children 6 to 11 years of age must be accompanied and supervised by an adult or care provider at least 15 years old
- Pool members are responsible for the conduct of their guests
- Children under 16 years must pass the Swim test to use the diving board and slide
- Parents are responsible for the safety and conduct of all children in their care
- Pool membership may be temporarily suspended or revoked for failing to comply with the pool rules
- Members using the pools do so at their own risk
- No Lifeguards are on duty at the wading pools

Teta Kain, who has been presenting nature shows around the state for many years, explores the world of the spider with a close-up investigation of this greatly maligned, often feared creature that lives in such close proximity to humans. Details of spiders' lives are caught by Teta's camera as she details their eating, mating, and predatory habits. Her talk is interlaced with folk lore, scientific facts, myths and mysteries of the spider along with a few funny stories of her frequent encounters with this very misunderstood animal.

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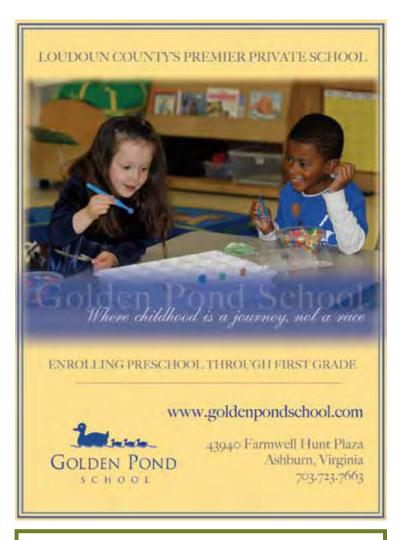


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
