Save Yourself Time, Money and Aggravation

Before you make any modification, change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Don't be misled by well meaning friends, neighbors or contractors. It is the owner's responsibility to file an application for all exterior work. A county permit does not circumvent this requirement. The process is easy if you apply before work commences.

What can happen if you don't submit an application? You may be ordered to cease and desist, which might cause your contractor to charge additional money for delays in completion. You may have to appear before the Board of Directors at a violation hearing. You may be assessed a fee of up to \$900. which will be added to your account and to which late fees, attorney fees, and court costs can be charged if payment is not made. You may be taken to General District Court for a judge to hear the case and determine the penalty. You may lose your recreational and voting privileges. You might have difficulty selling your home if violations are noted in the resale package which you provide to your buyer.

Please consult the Design Guidelines on the website for detailed information. Submit a complete application package in order to obtain approval prior to beginning any work. The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality throughout the community, to promote sensitivity for the natural environment and to encourage consistency of design while allowing flexibility for achieving design solutions. October Covenants Corner

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors inspect the homes in the community for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in view to parking issues and unapproved modifications to leftover holiday decor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular violations that occur with high frequency.

During the month of October, the Inspectors will be focusing on homes with basketball goals, hockey nets, soccer goals, and other play equipment in the VDOT right of way or with play situated in the street. Play equipment in unsafe locations will not be permitted.

Basketball is a fabulous sport for kids! It increases aerobic capacity, improves agility, builds confidence and teaches team building skills. However, the Association does not endorse playing in the streets, nor can it approve the location of play equipment that encourages play on the streets. This is for the safety of the players as well as drivers. Streets are designed for vehicular traffic.

Prior to installing a portable basketball net, an application must be submitted to the Modifications Subcommittee. There are also specific guidelines as to the location where the net can be placed. Nets may not be placed in the VDOT right of way - which extends approximately 10 feet measured from the curb towards your home, but not less than the length of the driveway apron. They also may not be located on the sidewalk, on the street, or on the manhole covers over the storm water drains. On private streets, basketball goals must be located above the driveway apron. The same goes for hockey and soccer nets or other types of play equipment.

Additionally, basketball goals must be stabilized by filling the base with water or sand or by staking the base to the ground according to the manufacturer's direction. Using cinder blocks or bagged sand is not an acceptable method of stabilizing.

If the topography of your lot precludes the approvable installation of a portable goal, there are basketball facilities available to use at the Nature Center, the Southern Walk Pool, Eagle Ridge Middle School, Hillside Elementary School and Mill Run Elementary.

Please reference Virginia Code 46.2-932-Playing on highways:

No person shall play on a highway, ... or on any part of a highway... designated... exclusively for vehicular travel.

If a violation is noted, the owner will be mailed a letter providing thirty days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing a fifteen day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a final notice will be sent, providing seven days to rectify before a Hearing Notice is sent.

If you have questions regarding this process, or if you receive one of these letters and are unable to correct in the time allotted, you may contact the covenants inspectors covenants@broadlandshoa.com to request a reasonable extension to rectify the issue.

Metrorail Planning Update

On July 3rd, 2012, the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors agreed to extend the Metrorail Silver Line to the county on a close 5-4 vote.

As a strong advocate for Metrorail to Loudoun. I worked to formulate the financing plan for Loudoun's capital portion of the project that could garner the needed Board majority. The adopted financing plan includes the Metrorail Service Tax District, an additional property tax levy placed on the commercial land and new developments around the Metrorail stations. This district avoids established residential neighborhoods like Broadlands but ensures that new developments, which will benefit most from the Silver Line, will be paying the largest share. Fortunately, this plan was able to secure the necessary votes to bring Metrorail to Loudoun.

Phase I of Metrorail's Silver Line began service on July 26th, with service from Wiehle-Reston East station through Tysons Corner. To maximize this new transportation option, Loudoun Transit began new bus routes to the Silver Line from various park and ride lots over the summer. To learn more about Loudoun Transit options to get to the Wiehle-Reston East station, visit www.loudoun.gov/silverlinebuses. Phase II of the Silver Line to Loudoun is planned to open in 2018. While Phase I is now up and functioning, there is still work to be done here in Loudoun to usher in Phase II of the Silver Line, which will include two stations in the county at Route 606 and Route 772.



Metrorail represents Loudoun's greatest transportation and economic opportunity for the foreseeable future, so it's vital that development around the stations is done right. To encourage the highest and best development, as well as to maximize revenue in the Metrorail Tax District, the Board initiated a Comprehensive Plan Amendment (CPAM) last fall for the Metrorail Tax District. As the first step in this planning process, Loudoun engaged land use experts who specialize and transit oriented development from the Urban Land Institute (ULI). ULI suggested that each station contain a mix of residential and commercial usages, and I agree with this recommendation. Each station should create a sense of place and belonging. To maximize the growth around the stations, Loudoun must take a holistic view of the plan and consider how to creatively mix residential and commercial usages to create a desirable place to live, work and play.

One difficult issue is the proximity of the Route 606 station to Dulles Airport. Because of the aviation activity, more analysis needs to take place to determine if concentrated residential units are appropriate so close to the airport. While I do agree with ULI regarding the need for mixed use development, we also need to maintain a high quality of life for current Loudoun residents, especially on issues like school capacity and traffic. I'm looking forward to working with all community stakeholders to find creative solutions to these challenges that will benefit all Loudoun residents. This CPAM will continue to be a priority for the Board during the rest of our term.

I want to thank the Broadlands Association for the opportunity to write a monthly column. I'm looking forward to keeping you up-to-date on the activities of the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors and what I'm doing as your representative.

Furry Fashionistas

Stream Valley Veterinary Hospital By Shannon M. Pecora, MA

Fall and winter fashion has hit the newsstands and the storefront windows! What are your favorite new trends? All-weather booties? Collars with ribbons and rhinestones? Sweaters with openings for leashes and harnesses?

I'm referring to pet fashion trends, *of course*! Animal apparel can be so much fun, provided that your pet will tolerate the clothing. My dog, for example, pouts and scratches at her neck if we put so much as a bandanna on her. However, many pets are completely comfortable in any number of outfits.

Especially as the weather begins to turn colder, creature clothing items can actually be incredibly practical. Those dogs and cats without thick, fluffy, long fur might truly appreciate a sweater in chilly temperatures. You can also find rain jackets, complete with earaccommodating hoods, to keep fur clean and dry on wet weather walks. Booties can protect feet from ice, salt, and sand in the winter, and from mud, pesticides, and fertilizer in the spring. They're great year-round! And this time of year, we lose precious daylight for early morning, late afternoon, and evening walks, jogs, trips to the vet, and all those other errands that include our pets. Look for neon-colored and/or reflective materials on vests, collars, and leashes, or even sticker strips for carriers to make you and your companion animals more visible in low light. Such products can help you perfectly combine style and function!

If your pet has never been dressed to the "K-9's" before, start small. Try a bandanna or decorated harness for starters, slowly moving up to full outfits. Shoes in particular can take a lot of getting used to, so your pet's first boot test drive should not be on a day when two inches of ice decrease traction and already make a neighborhood walk more complicated. You'll also need to be careful of zipper pulls, small buttons, and decorative touches that might easily be chewed off and ingested. Additionally, lengthy ties, hanging strings, and loose fabrics can present snagging or strangulation hazards. Your pet probably doesn't need to be all dressed up outside of your supervision anyway, so be sure to keep a close eye out for irksome or dangerous "wardrobe malfunctions." As always, call your veterinarian right away if you suspect any illness or injury.

Your pet can look like he just stepped out of a magazine, whether that's *The Fashionable Ferret*, *The Kozy Kitty*, or *The Hiking Hound*. Pet clothes might seem like pure luxury, but they could be practical purchases as well. Just keep it fun, keep it safe, and take a ton of pictures!



Eliminating Snakes in Your Yard

As a National Wildlife Federation Naturalist, I frequently get questions from folks about "getting rid of" wildlife in their yards, especially snakes. Unfortunately, most of the advice you can find online on the subject is bad. Mothballs are often suggested, but they are toxic. Commercial snake "repellants" are usually made of the same chemical. Most importantly though, they don't work to repel snakes anyway, so don't waste your money. Mowing or cutting away all of the vegetation and brush in your yard removes important habitats for birds, butterflies and other backyard wildlife.

So what's a person to do when snakes show up in their garden? The answer is, sit back and eniov it! There's no need to eliminate snakes in your yard. The only real problem is one of perception. Snakes are perceived as "bad" because of deep seated cultural traditions as well as psychological phobia. As a culture, we fear snakes and we reinforce that fear in our children. And yet as a group, snakes are some of the most harmless—and most important wildlife that we can attract to our gardens. In fact, the vast majority of snakes are 100% harmless to people. Yet, the most common reaction most people have when they see a snake is to want to kill or eliminate it.

At the National Wildlife Federation, we try to help people understand that if a snake shows up in their yard, they are doing something right. It's something to be celebrated. It means that the yard is a healthy ecosystem that is helping wildlife of all kinds to survive. And those are the exact kinds of yards that NWF certifies via our Garden for Wildlife program.

With that said, we don't encourage wildlife getting into our homes, so here are some tips to keep the

snakes outside and avoid any conflicts with them:

- Critter-proof your attic and basement or crawl-space areas by making sure all access entry points have tight fitting doors or windows. Caulk any cracks or crevices that might allow snakes to enter.
- Keep screens in windows and don't leave doors open.
- Keep brush or rock piles and dense vegetation away from the foundation of your house.
- Build brush or rock piles and plant dense vegetation on the outskirts of your property to attract snakes to those areas, away from your home.
- If you have rats or mice in your home, work to eliminate them as they can be viewed as a food source by snakes.
- Never use cruel glue traps—for rodents or for snakes.
- Encounters with venomous snakes in backyards are rare. Learn what

so you know which snakes are actually dangerous, and which are totally harmless.

- If you do encounter a venomous snake in your yard, don't try to move or kill it. Call a professional wildlife removal company with experience with venomous snakes, or just let it be if children and pets aren't present.
- Here are two good listings of all the snakes in North America to help you identify any snake that shows up in your yard: Snakes of North America and Discover Life's Snake Guide.
- Never deliberately approach any snake or try to touch or handle it, and you'll eliminate any chance of ever being bitten. This goes for all wildlife. Teach this rule to children.

Snakes are beautiful and important wildlife. Enjoy them!

Heirloom Recipes From Our Naturalist 👸



Jessica's Oatmeal Bars

Melt the following ingredients: 2 sticks butter *or* 1 stick butter and ½ cup coconut oil 1 1/2 cups brown sugar 2 teaspoons of baking soda

- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- ½ teaspoon salt



Bring to a boil, *(the longer you cook the more caramelized the flavor*), then remove from the heat and add 4 cups of old fashioned oats. To make gluten free bars, look for a brand that contains pure oats. Optional ingredients to add are ground nuts, seeds, and flax to taste. Spread evenly onto a baking sheet and cook at 350 degrees for about 10 minutes. Cut with a flat spatula while hot.



Jessica's Pumpkin Bread

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease loaf pan.

Mix together: 1 2/3 cup flour 1 ½ sugar ½ teaspoon cinnamon ½ teaspoon cloves ½ teaspoon nutmeg 1 teaspoon baking soda ¼ teaspoon baking powder

+ couspoort outers

½ teaspoon salt

Then add: 1 cup pureed pumpkin ½ cup oil of your choice ½ cup water 3 eggs *Optional:* ½-1 cup chopped walnuts or your favorite nut



Stir all of the ingredients. Baking could take 45–90 minutes, depending on your oven. Keep checking until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool before removing from pan.

Everyone Cheers For Enos At Upperville STORY AND PHOTOS BY KIMBERLY LOUSHIN

Each year in the leadline class at the Upperville Colt and Horse Show (Va.), parents gather around the ring with cameras ready to capture the early moments of their child's riding career. Sara and Mike Enos of Chantilly, Va., were no different; they beamed as their 4-year-old daughter, Olivia, sat proudly atop My Little Dreamboat, better known as "Cowboy." Until the end of the class, nobody knew Olivia was any different from the others. But when the announcer told Olivia's story as she received the "most improved" award, many spectators were reaching up to wipe tears from their eyes.

Last October, the Enoses took Olivia to the hospital with flu-like symptoms. Ten days later, at Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C., she had a craniotomy to remove a portion of a brain tumor.

"It's been a remarkable journey from her surgery, which was debilitating," Mike said. "In six months, she's made remarkable progress, to the point that she walks independently. She had balance issues; that was one of the major consequences of the surgery. She could really only use her right arm in the motion to feed herself, and she couldn't speak."

Olivia's trip to Upperville started when she was at the library practicing with her rolling walker. Olivia and Sara met Brooke Waldron, founder and executive director of Sprout Therapeutic Riding and Education Center in Aldie, Va., who encouraged them to try equine therapy.

Sprout opened in 2011 and now serves around 70 students a week and relies on the help of 200 volunteers. The facility is home



to eight horses. Many, like the 18-year-old Welsh pony Cowboy, once had careers showing.

From the first time Olivia sat on a horse, the transformation was instantaneous. "She literally looked like she popped out of the womb into the saddle," said instructor Amy Perez. "After her first lesson, we were leaving, and she said, 'Mommy, when I grow up, can we all come live here?' " Sara said. Since Olivia started at Sprout, a mere eight weeks before Upperville, she has graduated to walking independently and speaking comfortably, and she no longer needs occupational therapy. "Sprout has been great for her memory, too," Sara said. "She remembers everything Mrs. Amy tells her about the horses. The different brushes-she can name them all.

"I think most of all it just gives her something to look forward to and feel confident about," she continued. "For us, it's more about a smile on her face, something for her to feel good about. It gives her confidence, and it's something that is normal. She can't do a lot of things her 4-year-old friends are doing. She can't do ballet anymore, she can't swim, but she can do this."

For Mike and Sara, the award Olivia

won at Upperville on June 7 is something else for her to hold on to during the bad days. "When we came here, we talked about what was going to happen, because we'd never done this. She said, 'Is everybody going to be cheering for me?' Of course we were like, 'Yes.' This opportunity means that everybody was cheering for her," said Sara.

Getting Olivia to Upperville was a group effort, with Waldron spearheading the operation to make sure that Olivia and Cowboy were outfitted for the day. Jill and Jessi Alder joined Anna Koopman, and they ensured Cowboy was clipped and braided, complete with a fake tail loaned by Chad Keenum and a saddle pad donated by Judy's Tack Shop.

"We are very incredibly blessed to have Sprout, Amy and Brooke as part of our care team for Olivia," Sara said. "They really are an integral part of it. It's been a really wonderful extension of our family."

Beyond the Garden for Loudoun's Leaves

Superb views of autumn foliage can be found along Loudoun's many scenic byways. One standout is Route 15 starting at Oatlands Plantation, north to Morven Park with a stop at Ball's Bluff Regional Park along the Potomac River.

For longer than I should admit, I thought that the colors of autumn leaves were random and changed from year to year depending on the

weather. I knew a red maple turned red in the fall, but I didn't know that beech and tulip poplar leaves dependably turn brilliant yellow or that our native sweet gum will display red, purple, orange and yellow leaves all at the same time! The fact is, certain autumn leaf colors are characteristic of particular species. Dogwood leaves reliably turn purplish red, oak leaves, depending on species, can be red, brown or russet, and the redbud's leaves are certain to turn golden every fall.

How does this happen? There are three pigments involved in autumn's color display. *Chlorophyll* gives leaves their green color. *Carotenoids* are the organic pigments that produce yellow, orange and brown leaf colors in leaves, as well as the color in carrots, corn and daffodils. And *anthocyanin* is the pigment that makes leaves appear red or purple, and gives color to cranberries, strawberries and red apples. With shorter days and longer and cooler nights, biochemical processes in the leaf activate the changing colors.

If you'd like to preserve autumn leaves, or some of the last remaining flowers and berries for dried flower arrangements, there are good directions on the Maryland Cooperative Extension site at https://extension. umd.edu., under "Preserving Flowers and Leaves."
