Text Messages from Your Bank? Sounds "Phishy"

The text message that claims to be from your bank warns about a problem with your account, and urges you to call a phone number or visit a website right away. According to the Federal Trade Commission, the nation's consumer protection agency, it's very likely another attempt by a crook to steal your personal information.

Many people have gotten wise to "phishing" emails messages meant to trick recipients into sharing personal information, like bank account numbers and login passwords. But scammers use new tools to play old tricks. And now, they're hoping to win trust - and get access to personal information - by sending text messages to your personal cell phone.

If you receive a text message about problems with your bank or credit card account, call your wireless provider immediately and let them know about the message. Then, file a complaint with the FTC at <u>ftc.gov</u> or by calling 1-877-FTC-HELP.

If you think your bank or credit card account has been compromised, call your bank or card issuer directly using the number on your statement or on the back of your card. Never give personal information on the phone, in a text message, or online unless you know exactly who you're dealing with.

The FTC enters consumer complaints into the <u>Consumer Sentinel</u> <u>Network</u>, a secure online database and investigative tool used by hundreds of civil and criminal law enforcement agencies in the U.S. and abroad.

Crossroads United Methodist Church Sponsors 16th Annual Ashburn Farm Thanksgiving 10K, 5K, 2K to Benefit Ugandan Orphans

Crossroads United Methodist Church has a heart for disadvantaged Ugandan children. The church also has a fierce tradition of sponsoring Loudoun County's largest footrace - the Ashburn Farm Thanksgiving 10K, 5K. and 2K Fun Run.

This year's 16th race is set for Thanksgiving Day, November 26, at Crossroads United Methodist Church. The 10K starts at 8:15a.m. sharp; the 5K at 8:25a.m. sharp; and the 2K Fun Run at 8:35 a.m. sharp. All races will be held rain or shine.

More than 1500 participants are expected to participate. The 10K and 5K are USATF-sanctioned footraces. Cash prizes of \$300, \$200 and \$100 will be awarded to the top three male and female 10K finishers. The top male and female 5K finishers will receive \$150, \$100 and \$50. The top male and female age category finishers will receive medals. Local merchants have donated many prizes for a random drawing to be held after the races (You must be present to win). A generous assortment of post-race foods and refreshments will also be served.

Registration is \$25 for the 10K on or before November 8 and \$30 after. The 5K is \$20 on or before November 8 and \$25 after. The 2K Fun Run is \$17 and does not increase. All proceeds from this event directly benefit The HUMBLE United Methodist School, an orphanage and school founded by Crossroads UMC in Lukojjo Village, Uganda. Now in its 6th year, the school provides education, shelter, food, clothing, medical care and

loving attention to 231 children, most orphaned from

The Critter Corner By Dr. Steve Velling Ashburn Village Animal Hospital "Dinosaurs in Ashburn!"

Okay, not exactly dinosaurs, but all reptiles are distant relatives to the giant creatures that roamed the earth millions of years ago (birds are as well, by the way). And if you have any interest in owning an iguana, here are some tips for you:

1. **Picking your pet** - Green iguanas, the type sold in pet stores here in the U.S., have a brilliant green color to their skin. They start out small (about the size of your hand), but will grow up to 6 feet long (about a foot a year), and can live up to 12-15 years. Signs of a healthy lizard include bright skin, a plump tail, a round belly, and an alert disposition. There shouldn't be any broken toes or nails, or discharge around the eyes or nose.

2. A happy home - When they are small, iguanas can fit well into a 20-55 gallon tank, but after a year, they'll need more room to roam. Serious iguanamaniacs should consider having a room dedicated to Iggy. If that isn't possible, then either try a big ferret cage, or you can build your own (details at <u>www.iguanaden.com</u>). It should be about 8 feet tall, and roughly twice as wide and deep as Iggy is long. It needs to have branches to climb on, and should be at 94 degrees near the wood and 72 degrees elsewhere.

3. Food for thought - Iguanas are vegetarians, so don't feed them dog or cat food. Their diet should consist of 45% root vegetables (like carrots and parsnips), 45% leafy greens, 5% fruit, and 5% grains. Make sure they get reptilian vitamins (including calcium), too. Serve it in a shallow bowl in bite-size pieces, as iguana's can't chew.

4. It's personal - Iguana's have a range of personalities – from curious wanderers to "lounge lizards". They don't like other iguanas, but tolerate cats and dogs. Handle Iggy as much as you can to get him used to it, and put him in your tub for weekly baths (luke-warm water) to make him really happy. You can even put him on a leash and walk him around the block. Expect some amazed looks from your neighbors!

Iguanas take some serious commitment to own, but they are also truly amazing creatures that can provide you with lots of entertainment. If you have one or want one and would like some advice, give us a call.

Prevention as the Best Year-Round Medicine by Shannon M. Pecora, M.A. Stream Valley Veterinary Hospital

It's fall, and there are so many things to look forward to this season! The leaves are turning beautiful colors at different times all over our area. Upcoming holidays give our kids a little vacation time from school. And cooler weather means new wardrobe choices!

However, cooler weather does NOT mean that it's time to stop using your pet's monthly heartworm and flea/ tick preventives. You may feel safer because your dog or outdoor cat is spending more time in the heated house. Maybe you haven't seen quite so many ticks during your daily walks on the community nature trails. Or perhaps you haven't suffered from any itchy mosquito bites in quite a while. Well, it may sound like pessimism or fear mongering, but the truth is, they're still out there.

Without at least a couple of weeks of uninterrupted solid freeze, fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes don't really "go away." And here in Northern Virginia, where we may have 70-degree temperatures in the middle of January, sustained solid freezes rarely occur. Therefore, fleas (which present infestation and tapeworm risks), ticks (Lyme, Ehrlichia, and other disease risks), and mosquitoes (heartworm risk) can still cause problems for our pets and families. Plus, we tend to keep our houses warm and cozy in the fall and winter, so our homes and pets may be even more appealing to pests when the weather turns. Maintaining monthly preventives is just as important in the winter as in the summer, as they can help protect your household from potentially dangerous pests, no matter where they may be. (Added bonus: some heartworm preventives can guard your pet against intestinal parasites like hookworms and roundworms, too!).

Even if your dog or outdoor cat spends 99.9% of his or her time inside once temperatures start to dip, that doesn't fully eliminate the chance for exposure to fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes. In fact, you may find that these bugs try to follow your family toward the indoor life. So make sure to protect your pet year-round and stay current with flea/tick and heartworm preventives.

Don't Just Do Something, Sit There!

I find this saying (and title of at least one book) amusing. It applies to so many things in our modern lives. I think it particularly applies to our interactions with the natural world. Sometimes the most effective thing to do is nothing.

Many well-meaning residents ask what they should do when they find wildlife, especially during the colder months. One concerned resident this fall found five black swallowtail caterpillars in her garden and wondered if they should overwinter somewhere warm. Others have asked if their box turtles should spend the winter in the Nature Center. The good news is that since these animals are native to this area, they are adapted to our winters. The ones that couldn't survive mid-Atlantic winters died out millions of years ago and no longer contribute to the gene pools of our local species.

It's usually preferable to leave an animal in the habitat where we find it, although it's harder to know what to do when we find an injured animal, such as the box turtle that is recuperating at the Nature Center. Stream Valley Veterinary Service cared for her minor injuries and she will be released again into the wild. Box turtles are often run over by cars and lawn mowers, and because there are fewer box turtles than there used to be and they don't reproduce in high numbers, it's important that we intervene to keep as many around as possible.

How much to intervene in nature is something that even biologists have more than one opinion on—after all, at this point, it's almost impossible to return to the "natural" habitat anywhere in the world.

Sometimes we can let nature help us out. Black snakes and vultures come to mind. Perhaps we'd rather not

have snakes around our homes—but snakes eat mice, and mice are the hosts to the tick nymphs that carry the Lyme disease bacterium. If we can tolerate the snakes, we are actually much healthier in the long run. When you think about it, we all know many people who have contracted Lyme disease—but how many people do we know who have been bitten by a snake? (Most snakes around here are nonpoisonous. The only poisonous snakes native to this area are copperheads and rattlesnakes.)

Vultures are another example of an animal that can help us out if we let it. Their niche in the ecosystem is to clean up carrion. Vultures have corrosive enzymes in their stomachs that kill a lot of dangerous bacteria, such as salmonella and anthrax.

In many cases there are no simple answers, because every action affects many other things.

How Much Screen Time Is Too Much For Our Children and Teens?

Between watching television and videos, Twittering, surfing the Internet, texting and playing computer or video games, it seems that our kids are spending more of their time than ever looking at some sort of screen, which begs the question - how much screen time is too much? As a psychologist, of course I've always been witness to the extreme cases. However, over the past few years, screen time concerns rank up there for why kids and teens are coming to therapy. This Summer I worked with several teenage boys who were spending the majority of their free time gaming in isolation with limited, and for some, no peer related social contact. I also see several teenagers who have great difficulty managing their texting time. More and more elementary aged children I work with can't seem to get enough of their handheld gaming devices - DS, Gameboy, PSP, etc.

Research and common sense tell us that as the amount of time spent watching television and playing video games goes up, the amount of time devoted not only to homework and study, but other important aspects of development such as social skills and physical activities decreases. Moreover, there are studies that indicate it is not only the opportunity cost of lost time that could have been better spent on other activities that we should be concerned with, but that too much television during key developmental years is linked to subsequent problems later in life. Although most studies have focused on the impact of violence and sex and the influence of commercials, research now suggests that the amount of time children spend in front of the screen is an important predictor of cognitive, behavioral, and physical outcomes in children, including academic performance, bullying, attentional deficits and obesity. The impact of gaming has been so tremendous on our children and teens in the research that the Fifth edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-V) will reportedly have "Video Game Addiction" as a formal disorder when it's published in 2012.

The American Academy of Pediatrics currently holds the position that children two years and younger should watch NO television and should have NO screen time. Children three years and older should, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics, have very limited screen exposure. The Academy's position is supported by the research in this area, and this has been their position for parents for years now, yet we as parents do not appear to be listening. So many parents I work with want to believe in the Baby Einstein series, for example, even when the studies show no benefits in cognitive development for children who watch that show. In contrast, some of the research on the Baby Einstein series actually reveals a delay in language development for toddlers who watch the show. So why is Baby Einstein, Sponge Bob Square Pants, Disney, etc., winning out over the scientifically proven position of American Academy of Pediatrics? I think it comes down to time management and the mere fact that most of us are living very busy lives. Screens are wonderful distractions for our toddlers, especially at those times when we as parents have only two hands and way too much to manage. Just remember, while TV as a babysitter may seem like a good idea for you and your little one at the time, there may be consequences later.

Psychologist, Kenneth Gergen, a senior research professor at Swarthmore College, coined the terms "digital autism" and "absent yet present" to explain how technology is muting the quality of our social lives and our capacity to engage fully - not just for our kids and teens, but also for us as adults. Gergen points out that you could be physically present at a dinner date but mentally absent as you are texting away on your Blackberry *continued on page 23*

Roast Turkey with Lemon and Chives

¼ cup plus 2 tablespoons snipped chives
2 sticks unsalted butter, softened
Finely grated zest and juice of ½ lemon, plus 1 lemon, thinly sliced
Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
¼ cup all-purpose flour
One 18-pound turkey
1 carrot, cut into 1-inch pieces
1 onion, cut into 1-inch wedges
4-cups turkey stock

- Preheat oven 350°. In food processor, combine 1/4 cup chives with butter, lemon zest and juice, 1 tablespoon kosher salt, 1 teaspoon pepper and pulse until smooth. Transfer 1/4 cup of lemon-chive butter to small bowl and stir in flour; reserve.
- Beginning at neck, gently separate turkey skin from breast and legs using fingers. Season turkey cavity with salt. Rub half of lemonchive butter from food processor under skin, spread over breast and thighs.
- 3. Set turkey on rack in large roasting pan and scatter carrot, onion and lemon slices in pan; add 1 1/2 cups of water. Rub remaining lemonchive butter from food processor all over outside of turkey. Roast on bottom rack of oven for 3 1/2 to 4 hours, adding 1 1/2 cups of water to roasting pan and tenting turkey with foil halfway through roasting. Turkey is done when thermometer inserted deep in the thigh registers 170°. Uncover turkey and transfer to carving board; rest for 30 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, strain pan juices into large measuring cup; discard solids. Spoon off fat and discard it. (You should have about 2 cups of defatted pan juices.) In large saucepan, boil turkey stock until reduced to 3 cups, about 15 minutes. Set roasting pan over 2 burners on high heat; add reduced stock and scrape up any browned bits stuck to bottom and sides of pan. Strain stock into saucepan. Add pan juices and bring to simmer. Whisk in reserved butter-and-flour mixture and simmer over moderate heat, whisking constantly. Cook until thickened, about 4 minutes, and season gravy with salt. Add remaining 2 tablespoons of chives. Carve turkey and serve, passing gravy at the table. *Foodandwine.com*



Gorgonzola Mashed Potatoes

4 large russet potatoes, peeled, slices a half inch thick

- 4 cloves garlic, sliced
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1/3 cup crumbled Gorgonzola cheese
- sea salt and cracked pepper, to taste

In large pot combine 2 quarts water, sliced garlic, and potatoes. Boil on medium-high heat for 25 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Strain off water and add butter and cream. Mash until milk and butter are incorporated and mixture has a slightly chunky texture. Add salt, pepper, and Gorgonzola, stirring with a wooden spoon until incorporated. *cdkitchen.com*

Lemony Waldorf Salad

A lemon-walnut oil vinaigrette flavored with cumin replaces the traditional mayonnaise-based dressing

1/2 cup walnut halves (2 ounces)

- 1 tablespoon minced shallot
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 tablespoons walnut oil
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

Salt and freshly ground pepper

- 2 cups shredded romaine lettuce (4 ounces)
- 4 large radishes, halved lengthwise, thinly sliced crosswise (1 cup) 1 cup thinly sliced celery hearts plus 1/4 cup chopped celery leaves
- 1 small head of frisée (6 ounces), coarsely chopped
- 1/4 cup golden raisins
- 1 Fuji apple-peeled, quartered, cored and thinly sliced crosswise

Preheat oven 350°. Spread walnuts in pie plate, toast for about 8 minutes until golden. Cool and break into pieces. In large bowl, combine shallot and lemon zest with lemon juice and vinegar. Whisk in canola and walnut oils and cumin. Add salt and pepper. Add shredded romaine lettuce to bowl along with toasted walnuts, radishes, sliced celery hearts, celery leaves, chopped frisée, raisins and apple. Toss well and serve right away. *Foodandwine.com*

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underneath the tablecloth. I had the most curious "absent yet present" moment the other day with a father and his son, in which the father expressed great frustration in his son's "X-Box 360 addiction" all the while clicking away on his Blackberry during the session. And we've all viewed in awe the teenager's "absent yet present" ability to text while doing just about anything within a given moment.

I agree with Gergen that there are fewer and fewer moments to be fully present and that technology is pushing us all as a society toward a faster pace. Screens are everywhere now - the back of our car, plane and taxi cab seats; they're in waiting rooms and on our phones. For our children and teens, the lure of the screen is always there, which is a problem when screen time interferes with what's really important, as it sometimes can. So what's the solution? In my opinion, It's really about finding that balance as parents in our screen time use for our children. Technology, if used in moderation, can and should inform and complement our children's lives. Gaming can assist in our children's hand-eye coordination, fine motor skills, spatial relations, and many games can be educational. Films and TV shows can be social and can serve as a tool to provide dialogue and greater meaning to an idea or moment as a family.

Here are a few tips to help you and your child/teen kick off the school year:

- Have a "getting back into a routine talk" with your child and teen. The talk should be positive and should focus on areas in which you as parents feel a need to reintroduce expectations and structure as our children and teens get back into the school year.
- There should be no TV in your child or teen's room. With an average of 4 TV's per household these days, your child or teen may already have a television in their room. If that's the case, closely monitor their use, as removing the TV will seem like undeserved punishment. But if your child or teen does not have a TV or gaming system in their bedroom, best to keep it that way.
- There should be no TV during meals. An alarming number of families eat their meals in front of the television, restricting the opportunity for family conversation. Exceptions can be made for special occasions.
- Pre-plan all television shows and tape programs when academic or other commitments are pressing. This reinforces the message that we work before we play and good work brings about a well earned reward (good life lessons to learn in childhood). Also, when your child or teen is watching a preplanned show of their choosing and of your approval, they are not aimlessly flipping through channels, but are using their allotted TV time to watch quality programs.
- Make screen time social. Screen time can compliment our time together as a family with a movie night, or with playing a video game together.
- Keep track of your child and teens screen time and stick to your agreed upon limits. Additionally, we as parents shouldn't forget that what we model to our children and teens has a powerful reinforcing impact on their learning and behavior. As parents, we may want to reassess our own screen time management in leading by example.

NOVEMBER GARDENING TIPS

- To protect an upright evergreen from snow damage, drive a strong stake into the ground near the trunk of the tree. Tie a rope to the bottom of the stake and, using the rope, wind up the branches in a circular pattern around the tree. This is a two-person job on large trees. At the top, secure the rope to the stake.
- Pinecones, sweet gum balls, and seedpods of many plants, such as redbud and milkweed, add a beautiful touch to holiday ornaments. You can still collect many of these, if you take a walk along a hedgerow or through a park or a weedy field.
- Twig arrangements are different and easy to make. Collect twigs with unusual features; for example, winged elm, corkscrew willow, redosier dogwood, and crepe myrtle.
- Leaf fall makes renovation of overgrown deciduous shrubs easier. Begin this year by removing all diseased or broken stems. Next, remove 1/3 of all remaining shoots, eliminating the oldest and tallest. If the bush is still too tall, cut the remaining stems to a side bud or branch. Repeat the process a second or third year to complete renovation.
- Trim hollies and other evergreens, such as magnolia, aucuba, boxwood, and pyracantha, to furnish material for Thanksgiving decorations.
- If you are planning on having a live, balled and burlapped Christmas tree, dig a planting hole now before the ground freezes. Fill the hole with straw or hay to keep it from freezing. Store the soil in a garage or shed so you will have workable soil when you need it for planting the tree.
