Residents are welcome to observe the public portion of meetings and to address the Board during the 'Homeowner Forum' section of the meeting.

#### **BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

The following actions were taken by the Board of Directors at their meeting held on June 13, 2017

- Approved minutes of May 16, 2017 meeting
- Approved a tot lot application for two adjoining properties
- Approved a patio, seating wall, pergola, and shed in a 50' landscape buffer easement
- Directed the Modifications Subcommittee to review and decide on future applications where the deed requires both HOA and county approval due to an easement
- Postponed further removal of the Belmont Ridge Road fence until a meeting can be held with the county and affected owners.
- Reviewed a request regarding restricting parking on Village Drive and tabled pending further information from VDOT
- Approved a proposal from Sport Systems for tot lot surface refurbishment
- Approved a proposal from Sport Systems for Bayard Terrace tot lot replacement
- Reviewed the April financial statements
- Denied a request for a food business at the Southern Walk pool
- Agreed to wait to allow Potomac Tree and Shrub to get established, but may offer small work on an as needed basis
- Wrote off a pre-petition bankruptcy balance on an account
- Assessed violation charges on an account for a basketball goal violation

#### PARKING COURTESY

The three P's in community association management are the same hot button issues you'll find in nearly every community throughout the country, if not the world. People, pets, and parking. Storage of trash and other unsightly items are also commonplace in community associations since they have a propensity towards denser packed homes. It's no different in Broadlands. I hear complaints on a routine basis about all of the above. I'm frequently asked to include



reminders about things in the monthly newsletter about issues ranging from keeping recycling from blowing around to bringing barking dogs inside and we are typically able to do so. Unfortunately, the chances are that the people who need to read these reminders are not the ones likely to pick the magazine up. Nevertheless my column this month is dedicated to reminders about neighborhood parking courtesies. In Broadlands, we don't have many rules regulating the parking of passenger vehicles in common area parking spaces. (Recreational and commercial vehicles are another story).

Loudoun County requires builders provide a minimum number of spaces per unit, with the garage and driveway counting towards the minimum. In a townhome, at least half a space must be located off the lot to allow for surface parking in the vicinity. While we maintain and enforce regulations about derelict vehicles or those with expired plates or inspections, we don't have any designated reserved, handicapped, or visitor spots and we don't monitor how long a vehicle may be parked in a common area space without moving.

It is not uncommon to receive complaints that residents are using garages exclusively as storage and not for parking, as well as households owning more vehicles than parking spaces. We frequently hear that parking habits cause line of sight or safety issues with kids running into the street during rush hour. Sometimes we get complaints that owners park in such a way as to make it difficult for people to back out of their driveways or parking spaces or are blocking mailboxes, or frequently park in front of their neighbors home rather than their own. Less common but still heard are complaints about residents going on vacation and leaving empty driveways while parking vehicles in common area spaces, taking up valuable surface parking. *See Parking Courtesy on page 6*

## ARE YOU SELLING YOUR HOME?

By ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home, save yourself some stress. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, fence/deck repair, any staining touch up, or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidently placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

When you sell your home you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer. Once the request has been executed it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, structures that are not in compliance, and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the owner's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If the violations are not rectified before settlement then, the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, broadlandshoa.org, to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. #### **COVENANTS CORNER**

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors inspect the homes in the community for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in view to parking issues and unapproved modifications to leftover holiday decor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular violations that occur with high frequency.

During the month of August, the Inspectors will be focusing on **lawns in need** of weeding. Lot owners and residents are required to keep their properties free of excessive weeds, overgrown or unsightly shrubbery or other plant growth, with detailed guidelines outlined in the Procedures and Standards Relating to Yard and Lawn Maintenance (see For Homeowners>Rules and Regulations on the website). This resolution was adopted by the Board of Directors for the benefit and protection of all owners in order to ensure that all lot owners maintain their yards and lawns in a neat and orderly condition.

Lawn maintenance violations include:

- Excessive weeds, overgrown or unsightly
- shrubbery or other plant growth in turf areas and mulch beds
- Dead plants and shrubs
- Trees that overhang the sidewalk; these should be trimmed to provide a minimum height of eight (8) feet, measured above the sidewalk level, free
- of obstruction
- Grass height shall not exceed (6) inches

If these conditions are noted, a Warning and Hearing Opportunity letter will be issued to the property owner, providing **ten** days to correct the issue. If the violation is not corrected within ten days and a Hearing is not requested, the HOA or its contractor will enter the lot and correct the violation, and the resulting repair costs as well as an administrative fee will be charged back to the owners' account.

If you have questions regarding this process, or if you receive one of these letters and are unable to correct in the time allotted, you may contact the covenants inspectors at *covenants@broadlandshoa.com* to request a reasonable extension to rectify the issue.

Covenant Inspectors regularly canvass our neighborhood to help preserve the property values for home ownership, to promote community harmony and to ensure the high standards of living that our residents have come to expect are maintained.

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors routinely inspect homes for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in open view, parking issues, architectural modifications, and leftover holiday décor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular inspections where violations may occur with high frequency.

#### UPCOMING CHANGES TO COMMUNITY CENTER HOURLY RENTAL FEES

The hourly Community Center rental rate will increase to \$75.00/hour plus a cleaning fee of \$65.00. Renting the facility for 8 hours or longer will be \$600 plus the cleaning fee, \$65.00. Currently the Community Center is being renovated but the HOA can accept reservations for parties that will take place after October 13<sup>th</sup>.

The security deposit will remain the same at \$500. The lost key fee is \$25.

Broadlands Association reserves the right to deduct from the security deposit any amount necessary to cover any costs of excessive cleanup, and shall also deduct the costs of repairs or replacements of any property damaged during the use of the Community Center. If the security deposit does not fully cover these costs, the Contract Holder shall be billed for the difference and any future use of the Community Center shall be denied until these costs are paid. Any contract Holder using the Community Center shall be responsible for any and all damages that occur due to their use of the Community Center.

- **Dog poop is not natural,** especially in the quantities that are generated by pets. It harms the environment and threatens public health.
- Forgot your waste bag? No worries! The Broadlands HOA has more mutt mitt stations to offer residents than any other surrounding community currently 82.
- Don't want to carry it with you? No problem, most of our mutt mitt stations have trash cans attached.
- Even if your dog poops in the woods, you still need to clean it up. Unless your dog goes poop deep into the woods, clean it up. Not only is it unsightly, it can get into streams and into the water supply.

**It's the law!** Not only is it a violation of the Association Declaration, Article 8, Section 8.2(q) to not pick up your pet's waste, it is also a county ordinance violation. Please reference **Loudoun County Ordinance, Chapter 612.19, Section a** (9) **Dog waste.**

### NATURE CENTER RULES

The animals that call the Nature Center home are sensitive to loud noises and sudden movement. We have had injured and frightened animals at times due to some choices of guests. Additionally, the Nature Center shares space with the

Broadlands Association office and provides services to residents both in person and over the phone which require a quiet office atmosphere. Additionally, a pleasant work environment is necessary for the staff to continue to carry out the day-to-day operations of the association. The primary purpose of the Broadlands Nature Center is to serve as an educational classroom. We offer a wide variety of programming in order to educate visitors of all ages. The Broadlands Community Newsletter also lists many of these events.
- IF YOU ARE A GROUP OF TEN OR MORE—playgroup, meeting as a group of friends with multiple families, homeschool group, preschool group, or other entity that would be considered a group—you must have scheduled a <u>PAID</u> program with the Naturalist at least <u>two-days in advance</u>. Individual families coming at the same time as other individual families and forming a group are, by definition, an intentional group and must have a scheduled visiting time. We apologize for the inconvenience and want you to feel welcomed and come often to the Nature Center while at the same time maintaining a safe home for many life forms. Please contact the Naturalist to schedule a time at Naturalist@BroadlandsHOA.com.
- Individuals and individual families who are not participating in a scheduled activity do not need to make a reservation, but must sign in the log book upon entering the Nature Center.
- **NO RUNNING**—particularly not over the magical wooden bridge. This may cause our bunny to have a panic attack.
- QUIET PLEASE—For the benefit of other visitors, animals, and staff, please maintain respectful noise levels at all times. No screaming, screeching, or other loud noises to disturb the animals or fellow humans. ALL CHILDREN MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT.

#### Make-Ahead Peach Breakfast Bake

#### Pancake

2 tablespoons butter SAVE \$ 2 peaches, peeled, sliced 2 tablespoons packed brown sugar 2 teaspoons vanilla 1 ½ cups Original Bisquick™ mix 2/3 cup heavy whipping cream 4 eggs ½ teaspoon cinnamon **Toppings** 1 cup heavy whipping cream 2 tablespoons powdered sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 peaches, peeled, sliced Real maple syrup

Heat 10-12" ovenproof skillet over medium heat; add 1 tablespoon of the butter. Add 2 sliced peaches, and sprinkle with brown sugar. Cook 3 minutes; stir peaches, and cook another 2 to 3 minutes or until caramelized and soft. Remove from the heat; add 1 teaspoon of the vanilla and 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon. Toss well, then remove and slide the peaches onto a plate. Rub remaining 1 tablespoon butter in warm skillet. Let skillet cool. in medium bowl, add Bisquick mix, 2/3 cup whipping cream, eggs and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix to just combine. Fold in caramelized peaches. Pour batter into buttered skillet or greased 13x9-inch pan. Cover the



skillet and place in the fridge overnight, or go bake. To bake, heat oven to 450°F. Bake at 450°F for 10 minutes, then reduce oven temperature to 350°F, and continue baking 10 to 15 minutes or until lightly golden on top. Meanwhile, beat 1 cup whipping cream with electric mixer on high speed until soft peaks form. Add powdered sugar and 1

teaspoon vanilla, and whip until combined. Cut into wedges, and serve hot with sliced peaches, a dollop of whipped cream and a drizzle of maple syrup. Servings 4. Bettycrocker.com

#### **Bacon Wrapped Grilled Peaches** with **Balsamic Glaze**

4 large peaches 12 ounces bacon 60 large basil leaves plus more for garnish olive oil balsamic glaze, store-bought or homemade



Set grill to low heat and preheat for 10 minutes or so, brush the grill grates with a paper towel dabbed in oil. I use grapeseed oil. Wash and dry peaches. Cut each peach in half and then each half into 4 quarters. Place one large basil leaf on each side of the peaches. Cut the bacon slices in half. Wrap each peach slice and basil leaves

with a slice of bacon. Pin the loose end of the bacon slice with a toothpick. Repeat with remaining peaches. Brush the bacon wrapped peaches lightly with olive oil so the bacon doesn't stick to the grill. Grill the peaches until the bacon is cooked, turning so all sides are evenly cooked, about 20 minutes. Transfer to a serving

#### Maple Peach Pork Chops

2 tablespoons butter 2 sweet potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced ½ large onion, chopped 1 or 2 cups sliced peaches 4 Pork loin chops ⅓ cup maple syrup 2 tablespoons bourbon salt and ground pepper Thyme fresh parsley



Preheat oven to 425 degrees. In deep skillet, melt butter over medium heat then add potatoes. Next, layer with onions and peaches. Season pork chops with salt and pepper then place on top of dish inserting between peaches. Next, stir together maple syrup and bourbon and pour over top of the dish and layer with thyme sprigs. Bake for 55 minutes or until pork chops are done. Remove from oven and place over stove for 15 minutes to reduce liquid then cool. Garnish with parsley and serve. Grandbaby-cakes.com

### FROM YOUR SUPERVISOR

#### **Dear Broadlands Residents,**

June and July have been very busy months. We have been out in the community -- at both large and small meetings. What I love about public meetings and town halls is the opportunity to build our «to-do» list. Broad Run residents have expressed their concerns and recommendations, and our office is taking this feedback and turning it into policy.

A perfect example is the Farmwell Road Project. Understandably, Ashburn Village and Cameron Chase residents would rather see the County build new roads instead of turning Farmwell Road into a six-lane road through a residential neighborhood. The County has planned this widening for some time, but after feedback from residents, we pushed for the stoppage of this widening in favor of fixing the intersections that are delaying traffic on Farmwell, installing pedestrian walkways so that students can safely walk to Broad Run High School, and focusing on getting Shellhorn Road extended to Route 28 to relieve congestion.

Ashburn District Supervisor Ralph Buona has agreed to the redesign of this project without the widening, and we are confident other supervisors will agree as well.

Unfortunately, this spirit of cooperation didn't translate to another initiative we had to improve the safety of W&OD Trail crossings. I made motions at our last meeting to accelerate the construction of signage and other safety measures at the W&OD crossings at Smith Switch Rd. and Ashburn Rd. These intersections are dangerous for trail-goers and drivers alike. Both votes narrowly failed 4-to-5 (Buona, Buffington, Letourneau, Volpe, and Chair Randall opposing). We will now wait until a review of all the intersections in the County can be studied and judged in a bureaucratic process that will take significantly longer.

I also want to take a moment to express my sincere condolences to the family of Nabra Hassanen who was tragically killed outside of the ADAMS center last month. I had the opportunity to attend a vigil held for her with Supervisor Saines, and our community



stands united in support of her family and congregation in these challenging times.

#### **Transportation Project Updates**

#### W&OD Trail Crossings

As many of you know, our office has been working tirelessly to install additional safety measures at the W&OD trail crossings at Smith Switch Road and Ashburn Road. Last week, I brought forward two separate initiatives to begin the process of getting these safety measures installed. Unfortunately, five members of the Board (Buona, Buffington, Letourneau, Volpe, and Randall) opposed these measures.

#### Ashburn Village Blvd and Route 7 Interchange

Current work includes utility relocation on the north side of Route 7, completion of Ramp B (Ashburn Village Blvd. to eastbound Route 7) and the northbound lanes of Ashburn Boulevard; a traffic shift is anticipated for July 2017.

#### Farmwell Road Widening

On June 12, 2017, Supervisor Buona and I met with County Staff to discuss the redefining of the Farmwell Road Project and any corrections that should be made to help move traffic on Farmwell. We do not believe that the widening is necessary and directed Staff to come up with new plans.

On June 14, 2017, DTCI project staff met with our consultant for the design of Farmwell Road, Wallace Montgomery, to discuss the tasks that need to be performed to redefine the scope of the Farmwell Road project. We first outlined that Farmwell Road will remain four lanes and the road widening will not be part of this project scope. We then discussed the specific turning and through movement concerns at the Farmwell Road/Smith Switch Road/ Waxpool Road intersection, Farmwell Road/ Ashburn Village Boulevard intersection, and Farmwell Road/Ashburn Road intersection as well as the issue of extra volume on Smith Switch Road. We will meet again with our design consultants after they propose their intersection improvements to clarify the new scope and then have them develop cost estimates. Once we receive this information, we will be ready to meet again to go over the findings and the cost estimate.

#### Route 772 Connector Bridge

The right of way acquisition process is underway; plats are currently in the County Attorney's Office for deed preparation. The grading permit application process has begun.

#### Sterling Blvd Extension

DTCI has received feedback from the Property Owner and is proceeding with Board endorsement of an alignment. This is part of the Greenway Alternative that takes Shellhorn Road over to Route 28. We are hoping to see this item on the July 20th Board Meeting agenda.

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### IN THE GARDEN

#### **Surviving the Dog Days in the Summer Garden** *By Nancy Caldwell, Loudoun County Extension Master Gardener*

By late summer everything in the garden is looking a bit bedraggled, including the gardener. Hang in there! Cooler temperatures are just around the corner. In the meantime, here are some tips to keep the garden in tip top shape all the way into fall.

To keep perennial beds looking their best, trim back plants that are done blooming. Pinch off faded flowers and seed pods of annual flowers to encourage more blooms. And don't be afraid to give plants a haircut. Some annuals, like petunias and geraniums, can get a bit overgrown, or "leggy," from the heat. Trim them up and they'll not only look better, they'll produce more blooms.

Garden beds need about an inch of water per week. Use a rain gauge to determine how much has been supplied by Mother Nature and then supplement as needed. Be sure to water early in the morning. Plants will be protected from the midday heat and less stressed. Both flower and vegetable beds need a deep soaking, which is tough to do with an overhead sprinkler, and can lead to disease. A better bet is a soaker hose or drip emitter placed directly into beds.

It's not too late to plant fall season crops. Pull out spent vegetables, add two inches of compost or aged manure to the area and replant. Second sowings of turnips, carrots, beets, kale, and others will be ready for harvest in fall. Add a 2" layer of straw or mulch to help retain moisture and keep roots cool. When planting tender fall seedlings such as broccoli, Brussels sprouts or cabbage, plant them in the shade of other taller vegetables to protect them from the sun, or invest in a shade cloth. Finally, harvest in the early morning hours. It's easier on the gardener as well as the crops. Freshpicked veggies should be brought into cooler temperatures as quickly as possible, rinsed to reduce heat, or placed on top of ice in a cooler box.

### A CAMPING GUIDE

#### Camping with Your Family By Jenny Holt, Freelance Writer, adapted from Parents Need to Know, January 18, 2017 article

When it comes to a budget holiday with the family there really isn't anything as much fun or as affordable as going camping (if you do it right! *Did you go camping as a child?* Do you have fond memories of being allowed to play football outside the tent until late, or toasting marshmallows to eat with hot chocolate? This article is all about helping you plan and enjoy a family camping trip so that you and your children may create new memories to hold dear.

#### **Modern Camping**

A large part of camping is getting back to basics. And, while once upon a time a camping trip either meant popping the tent up in the garden, finding a random grassy clearing in a forest or visiting a pretty basic camping site, these days camping retains all of the joy that comes with outdoor camping with some modern extras thrown in.

#### **Types of Pitch**

There are various pitches to choose from when camping and you have to decide which type is best for you.

#### Grass only

These are the most basic pitches. Generally speaking you are allocated a specific space or can pitch up in the next empty place on a row of your choice. Some pitches have size restrictions whereas some do not.

#### Grass with Hook Up

Many campsites offer grass pitches (as above) with the added benefit of an electric hook-up. This means you can use an electric kettle, charge your phone or take advantage of any other electrical gadgetry you want to take yet couldn't on a standard grass pitch.

#### **Glamping and Pods**

If you want to be more comfortable and generally want more room, it's worth seeing if your campsite offers pods, wig-wams or other structures for camping in. More expensive than a tent pitch, with some accommodations (such as pods) you need everything but the tent and with others beds (camping beds) and other amenities might be included. You'll have to do your research in advance to check what's included.

One of the main benefits, other than space,

electricity (for some, not all) and added luxuries of enjoying pods and similar is the fact that they are waterproof and already set up for you. Actual camping when it's wet is something of a rite of passage, you just get on with it. Setting up a tent without the inside getting wet through while looking after young and excited children is about as much fun as it sounds.

Which pitch type you'll go for will depend on where you want to go, your budget, availability and of course your own preferences. We love a humble tent but have to admit the idea of rocking up to a cheap and cheerful wooden cabin, putting up air beds and enjoying our holiday is an attractive option.

#### **Choosing the Right Campsite**

There are a vast number of campsites to choose from so how do you narrow down the options to find the right one for your family camping trip?

First of all, talk to others who have camped in your sought after area. Personal recommendations are worth their weight in gold. Then look at the site's website and online reviews. *TripAdvisor* is a brilliant place to start if you are searching for a camp site, its ratings and reviews.

Check out what the campsite offers and ensure this meets your needs. For example:

- Is there a shop and a café (a cheap and cheerful full breakfast that someone else cooked for you can be a great bonus)?
- Are there laundry facilities, how many toilet and shower blocks are there, where can you get water from, is there a pot washing place/station?
- Consider whether or not there is a children's play area, if there is a field away from the tents for frisbee throwing, football and kite flying.
- Is there a dedicated family pitch area and separate adult one?
- Does this campsite offer entertainment and swimming?
- Consider what is nearby, i.e. are there attractions, points of interest, other places to eat nearby?

• Having decided what services and extras you want (and those you don't), check out those reviews and prices. Once you've done your research you'll be ready to book the ideal place for your family trip.

#### Do a Dry Run

Before spending a small fortune on camping gear, borrow a tent and pitch it up in the garden for a couple of nights. Sleep out there with your little ones to see if camping is for you, and more to the point if it is for them. A dry run, if you haven't been with the kids before, might make you decide it would be best to wait another year or it might make you realize that this is the perfect way to holiday while working out what camping gear (etc.) you're going to need.

#### Talk to Those That Know

The best way to figure out the ins and outs of camping with kids before you go (and realize you really should have taken x, y and z, and done this and that first) is to talk to family and friends who have camped with kids before. This first-hand insight will smooth the road considerable!

### What Size and Sort of Tent Will You Need?

How big a tent you need depends on how many people are going with you and your sleeping arrangements! *When buying a tent*, the berth information gives you an indication of how many people fit in it. Some tents have a helpful "two children, two adults" or similar guide to give you an idea about space. Check out these details and specifications carefully. You don't want to spend a weekend or longer crammed like sardines in a very tight tin can!

As well as the size of your tent, consider the quality. Anyone who has been camping before will advise you that the better quality the tent, the better the experience. Also, look for tents that allow you, or at least the kids, to stand up (this makes life a lot easier when it comes to moving about and getting dressed).

Also consider getting a tent with a communal *See Camping continued on page 26*

area. Often tents have "rooms" for sleeping in and another section that leads onto the exit door for playing, eating if it's wet and more. This allows you to zip up "bedrooms" and have a clear space for relaxing.

Do remember when buying a tent to go for one with the space you need and no more. First, you have to get it into your car along with everything else so a monster of a tent is going to take up a fair amount of room. Secondly, many campsites have size restrictions for their pitches so you could end up paying more for a "superpitch" if yours is larger than average.

**Top Tip:** Borrow a tent! A decent tent is not an inexpensive buy. It might be worthwhile borrowing a suitably sized tent the first time you go camping so that you can decide whether it's right for you, rather than paying out then having a tent you'll never use again.

#### **Essential Camping Kit**

We've covered the tent/accommodation aspect of a camping kit already. This list makes a great starting point for essential camping items however, remember that there may be other family-specific things you might want to pack.

**Camping Beds/Blow Up Beds:** Lying on the ground is harder than you might think, even with a groundsheet in place. Choose beds that are comfortable, easy to put up and if possible easy to shove to one side or stack when not in use to maximize space.

**Foot Activate / Electric Pumps:** If you have opted for blow up beds (these usually take up the smallest amount of room in your car!), don't forget to pack a pump to blow them up! A foot pump is fine however electrical ones (they run off your car or the mains) are much quicker and easier to use.

**Sleeping Bags:** It might be hot and sunny during the day but the temperature drops quite swiftly when night comes. Make sure that everyone has a suitable-sized sleeping bag to keep them warm and cozy.

**Cooking Equipment:** The chances are you'll be eating out for some of your meals while out and about however cooking your own food will save you a fortune (and is more convenient if you're feeling lazy and can't be bothered to get dressed and go off-site). Keep it simple with something like a camping stove

and a couple of pans, perhaps a disposable BBQ or two if allowed and, don't forget to pack the essential cookery tools, plates, cutlery and so on!

Let There Be Light: Remember to pack a flashlight and plenty of batteries. Finding your way around the tent in the dark is one thing, making it safely to the bathroom in the middle of the night without tripping over tent ropes is another!

**Tables and Chairs:** If you can, pack some fold up chairs at least (makes eating easier, less messy and if it's wet on the ground a much drier experience). A camping table can be great but isn't absolutely essential.

An Extension Cord: If you've opted for a tent with an electric pitch you might find it useful to have an extension cord so that you can plug in more than one item at a time and do it inside the tent rather than right next to the mains if it's wet out. Be aware that you might be sharing the electricity source with the pitch next door so be courteous.

**Top Tip:** Take Walkie Talkies with you as there is a chance you will not have any phone reception where you are. This way you can keep in touch with each other if separated on the camp (or off but fairly nearby) and otherwise the kids will love using them to play with.

**Water:** Take something that you can use to fill up with water and carry easily back to your pitch from the communal tap. This water will be used for cooking, cleaning, drinking, hand washing and more so choose the largest container you can comfortably carry.

A Kettle: Priorities! Make sure you have a kettle (stove or electric) and a way to power it. Besides cooking and washing you'll need it for that all-important first brew of the day! **Don't Forget the Can Opener:** The majority of families take canned foods with them on camping trips for convenience and because they aren't perishable. Beans and sausages and the like are the staple diet of many so don't remember the food and forget the can opener.

**Washing Up Gear:** Most campsites have either a dedicated washing up/pot washing area or at the very least free-running cold water. Make sure you take something to carry your dirty pots in as well as washing up cloths etc.

Bathroom Essentials: Take everything

with you that you'd need for toilet runs and showers that you'd use at home, including towels and wash cloths. It might be worthwhile taking a roll of toilet paper, just in case! **Medication:** If you or any of the children take regular medication, make sure you take enough with you and keep these in a lock-box somewhere safe and discreet.

**Clothing:** Work out how many days and nights you'll be away and pack enough clothes for everyone for that time plus two more outfits each. When camping, people get wet, they get dirty and it isn't as easy to throw things in the washer. Don't forget to pack plenty of underwear, especially dry socks and, suitable footwear.

**Trash Bags:** It is your responsibility to leave your pitch as you found it so take trash bags with you and tidy up as you go. Make sure the kids do their part to keep the campsite clean and tidy too.

**Entertainment:** Hopefully the sun will shine, the grass will be dry and you'll be able to spent every day out and about, enjoying exploring the local area. If it rains though, you'll be wishing you had packed more to keep the little ones happy and entertained. Even if the sun does shine beautifully, you'll need activities to keep them occupied early in the morning and before bedtime.

**Food - Take Plenty of Food!** You'll no doubt have an idea about what meals you will have at the campsite and what meals you'll be eating back at the tent but also remember to pack plenty of drinks and snacks. All that fresh air makes people hungry!

**Pack the First Aid Kit:** Scrapes, stings and bruises are all part of the great outdoors adventure. Make sure that you have a wellstocked first aid kit handy, just in case.

**Top Tip:** Let each child take a backpack that is just for their favorite things. Pack teddy bears, favorite books, games and treats for those times when children might be missing home or simply want some of their own things to hand.

#### Summary

Camping can be a hugely enjoyable and relatively affordable way to take the kids away. The key to a successful trip is in the planning. Basically if you prepare for anything and everything you'll be absolutely fine.

### HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DATES

The next Loudoun County Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) event will be held *Saturday, September* 23, 2017, at Harmony Park and *Ride*, located at 39464 East Colonial Highway, Hamilton. All HHW events are held on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The 2017 Household Hazardous Waste collection schedule is as follows:

• **September 23**: Harmony Park and Ride, 39464 East Colonial Highway, Hamilton

• October 14: Leesburg Park and Ride, 19730 Sycolin Road, Leesburg

• **November 18**: Claude Moore Park, 46150 Loudoun Park Lane, Sterling

Loudoun residents are welcome to bring HHW from their homes to these events. Typical HHW includes: fluorescent light bulbs, dry-cell batteries (alkaline, Ni-Cad, Lithium, rechargeable, etc.), oil-based paint/ stain/varnish, paint thinner, mineral spirits, metal polish, rust remover, wood strippers and preservatives, furniture polish, waxes, sealants and solvents, bleach, pesticides, insecticides, herbicides, fertilizer, pool chemicals, muriatic acid, ammonia, mercury thermometers and thermostats, gasoline, gas-oil mixes, expired fuel, auto cleaners and flushes, brake and transmission fluid, windshield washer fluid, fire

extinguishers, moth balls, flea and tick powders and sprays, and other toxic chemicals.

The limit per household is 15 gallons of liquid HHW (container size not to exceed 5-gallon), and 40 pounds of solid HHW. Participants must have proof of Loudoun County residency such as a vehicle decal or applicable town sticker.

#### What is not accepted

Motor oil, antifreeze, automobile batteries, lead-acid batteries, propane tanks, and oil-based space heaters are not accepted at HHW collection events. These materials are accepted at the Loudoun County Solid Waste Management Facility, 21101 Evergreen Mills Road, Leesburg. Motor oil, antifreeze, automobile batteries and other lead-acid batteries are accepted at the landfill recycling center free of charge. Fees apply for disposal



at the landfill of and oil-based Visit loudoun. for more

Ammunition, fireworks, and will not be HHW collection information of those contact propane tanks space heaters. gov/landfill information.

explosives, gun powder accepted at the events. For about disposal items, t h e Loudoun County Fire Marshal's Office at 703-737-8600.

Electronics will not be accepted at the HHW collection events. Information on how to properly dispose of unwanted electronics is online at loudoun.gov/ electronics.

Medical waste, such as sharps and syringes, and unwanted medications are not accepted at HHW collection events. More information about disposing of those items is online at loudoun.gov/hhw.

Latex paint and water-based paint are not considered hazardous. Loudoun County asks residents not to bring latex or water-based paint to the HHW event and instead take it to the landfill. The paint may be disposed of for a fee at the landfill Monday through Saturday, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Businesses and organizations in Loudoun that generate small amounts of hazardous waste are encouraged to visit loudoun.gov/bhwp or call 703-771-5500 for information about the county's Business Hazardous Waste Collection Program.
