#### **MODIFICATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE**

The Subcommittee meets at 7:00p.m. in the Nature Center conference room on the *first and third Wednesdays*, *March through October, and only the third Wednesday, November through February.* 

Applications must be submitted by noon on the Thursday before the meeting to the Secretary to the Modifications Subcommittee, Robin Crews. Submissions may be emailed to *rcrews@broadlandshoa.com* or delivered to the Association office in the Nature Center, 21907 Claiborne Parkway. For your convenience, there is a drop box available for after-hours submissions.

Please review these guidelines and the updated changes on our website. Visit *broadlandshoa.org/for-residents/ designguidelines/* for complete guidelines and information required to be submitted with your application, as failure to include all information will delay review of your application. A response to your application is generally sent within one week of the meeting.

#### AN APPLICATION IS REQUIRED FOR EXTERIOR LIGHT FIXTURES AND STORM DOORS

Approval is required for any additional lighting fixtures or replacements that differ in style, size or color from the original builder installed fixtures.

According to the lighting design guidelines: "All exterior lighting fixtures on the same elevation of the house must be of similar style, size and color." For example, front door fixtures, garage door fixtures including the pole light fixture must all match in style, size and color.

Approval is required for front and rear storm doors. Please refer to the door design guidelines for more details and submission requirements: broadlandshoa.org/for-residents/ design-guidelines/ and click on "021\_Doors" under the Type of Modifications section.

#### HOW AM I NOTIFIED OF MY RESULTS?

The Modifications Subcommittee is using new software to process applications in order to increase efficiency and provide quicker response time to residents regarding the status of their modification applications. Once the Subcommittee has reached a decision, the results letter will be delivered via email. If an email is not provided, then the results letter will be mailed. There have been reports that some emails are being delivered to residents' junk/spam folder. Therefore, please check your inbox and junk/spam folders for your results letter or contact the HOA office at 703-729-9704.

Emails will be sent from *no-reply@smartwebs365.com* should you wish to add this email address to your contact list to ensure prompt delivery. *Beginning in August, the deadline for application submission requirements changed to noon on Wednesdays before the subcommittee meetings. This deadline change provides staff and subcommittee volunteers adequate time to process and review applications in advance of scheduled meetings.* Please refer to the meeting dates and their submission requirement deadlines below:

## ARE YOU SELLING YOUR HOME?

By ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home, save yourself some stress. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, fence/deck repair, any staining touch up, or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidently placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

When you sell your home you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer. Once the request has been executed it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, structures that are not in compliance, and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the owner's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If the violations are not rectified before settlement then, the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, broadlandshoa.org, to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. #### MIND YOUR MODIFICATION – WINDOW DESIGN GUIDELINES UPDATE

Before you make any modification change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review.

Windows replaced on the same elevation of the house should be of the same or similar style, type, material, color and detailing. Specialty windows such as encasement, bay, slider, individual, etc. will be reviewed by the Modifications Subcommittee on a case by case basis.

#### **FEELING POLITICAL?**

Per Broadlands guidelines *no more than three political campaign election* signs are allowed and each sign *shall not exceed a maximum of four (4) square feet.* 

These signs may be placed **no more than 60 days prior to an election date** and must be removed 5 days following the election. No application is required for these signs.

## COVENANTS CORNER

#### LAWN MAINTENANCE VIOLATION NOTICES

Your home is a valuable investment so take pride in your curb appeal. A beautiful home with poor lawn maintenance is aesthetically unappealing. Whether you are a tenant or homeowner, you are responsible for maintaining your lawn so that it meets the requirements of our covenants guidelines. If you are not physically able to keep up with your property or can't find the time, then please consider hiring a lawn service to preserve the quality of our neighborhood.

#### Primary reasons why you may receive a lawn violation letter from our Covenants Department:

- turf more than 6 inches;
- weeds and grass in beds; in need of edging and weeding around property
- overgrown or dead shrubbery or plant growth (including vines running along home)
- tree branches hanging over sidewalks or other properties
- yards with litter, trash, debris or other objects
- other unsightly conditions

#### **IMPORTANT INFORMATION:**

- ✓ Please remember that lawn maintenance pertains to all parts of the property including FRONT, BACK, and SIDES.
- ✓ ALL violations stated in the notice must be corrected to prevent incurred charges.
- ✓ The initial violation notice sent will allow 10 days to correct the issue(s). If any issues still remain, a FINAL notice will be sent. *IF REPEAT VIOLATIONS OCCUR WITHIN A YEAR OF THE INITIAL NOTICE, ONLY A FINAL NOTICE WILL BE SENT AT THAT TIME.*
- ✓ Association staff, contractors, officers and authorized parties ARE PERMITTED TO ACCESS THE EXTERIOR OF YOUR PROPERTY - front, back and sides, for inspections and maintenance per the Declaration of Broadlands Association, Inc.
- ✓ If the violation is not corrected within 10 days or a hearing is not requested, *THE HOA OR ITS CONTRACTOR* WILL ENTER THE LOT AND CORRECT THE VIOLATION, AND THE RESULTING REPAIR COSTS AS WELLAS AN ADMINISTRATIVE FEE WILL BE ASSESSED TO THE OWNER'S ACCOUNT.

Covenant Inspectors regularly canvass our neighborhood to help preserve the property values for home ownership, to promote community harmony and to ensure the high standards of living that our residents have come to expect are maintained.

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors routinely inspect homes for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in open view, parking issues, architectural modifications, and leftover holiday décor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular inspections where violations may occur with high frequency.

## SO LONG DEAR SWIMMY

I have never been a trained vet, a vet tech or attendant in a pet store. When I accepted the position at the Nature Center I was already an environmental educator for the Audubon Naturalist Society teaching the children in Loudoun County as part of GreenKids education. The reality was that I accepted the job because the former naturalist assured me that a lot of the animal care was covered by the Youth Naturalists from our community, these youth volunteers are the reason we still have a Nature Center. Their countless hours make it possible for these many animals to have a home. Many of the young adults in your community have years of experience in care for our animals-it's rather incredible their skills set and devotion.

I considered animal managing a side show to the community gathering and education goals of the Nature Center. And let me just be vivid in the realities of my job. What middle age human wants a profession that involves daily collecting of animal feces? A little cleaning out putrid bowls of water that the doves played target practice in over the evening? They have better aim than Hawkeye the Avenger and there's nothing heroic about it; it's just twisty curls of bird poop floating in water. This is not what I imagined in third grade when I drew pictures of my future profession. That was an astronaut wearing Olympic gymnastics medals while floating weightless.

Over the years and through many vet visits and instructions I've come to learn to respect the financial and knowledge burden that is on those caring for animals, especially exotic animals that have few vet options. But the animal care has been mainly just a thing I have to do for the job. The Youth Naturalists take the time to snuggle the animals and I make sure they have the supplies and enjoy finding new ways to improve the habitats and make them more like an outdoor home. I say this as a preface so there's no assumption that I'm an iguana whisperer. I've got hippie elements in me for sure, but I don't have a secret bunny tattoo carved into a nether corner and I don't identify with animal totems as my mystical strength. Animals for me have been a duty rather than a devotion for the last years. A job rather than a joy.

But this last month has changed my world vision as we've had a few animals make it very clear how connected our worlds are even if we (or more specifically, I) sometimes deny that. A co-worker lost a horse that had been in her family for almost four decades and what was a time of deep heartbreak was also a time of inexplicable happenings that made us all have to bow to the reality that the horse found ways of caring for the family that he had to leave. Then the following week our dear mother turtle, Swimmy, was egg-bound (unable to pass a few of her eggs). An infection set in that the veterinary staff mulled over for hours trying to find a solution (it turns out that turtle surgery is a little difficult as there are few possible entry sites with that shell). Ultimately they felt it was best to euthanize her rather than put her through many hours of surgery that may or may not be successful.

I dislike scooping poop and cleaning dirty water, but the only thing I hate about my work at the Nature Center is watching animals die. And in this case, I was signing on the dotted line giving permission to end the life of this turtle. It was such a ridiculous death. She was healthy and happy with the exception of this one tiny infection that was the result of laying eggs. It felt like a medieval account of another death of a young mother that was needless and all too common.

I was given a few minutes in a private room to make a few decisions: if I wanted to be present for the euthanization, how the Nature Center would prefer to



receive her remains, and if we consented to exploratory surgery for education postmortem. I sat in that exam room and just cried. All I could think of was the vortex of all that was wrong in the universe: the news on the drive to the vet's was bad enough; there was traffic still to fight, a vet bill to pay, and I was taking home the animal carrying case empty. And Swimmy (who I have to tell you is the only animal in the Nature Center who has ever found an interest in biting people and is about as nonsnuggly as an animal can get) walked over to my hand and stroked it. She gave me a few seconds staring into her wise turtle eyes, then I swear she shook her head yes and leaned her legs so her shell would rest on my arm. We just sat there in the exam room. I don't know what it all meant. She forgave me for realizing she was egg-bound too late? She was okay with it being her time? I don't know the words, but her small actions made all of the bad turn into a type of good.

I just wanted to share how sometimes there is enchantment and connection that seems impossible in a dark time even if we don't think we can believe in such things. Even if we've never watched an episode on Animal Planet or feigned to consider adopting one in our home, the animal world can let us know they've got our back even while we're making a mess of this earth we share.

## Can't Get Enough Pumpkin? Try these smashing ideas...

#### **Baked Pumpkin Donuts**

1/2 cups white flour
 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/4 teaspoon allspice
 1 egg
 1/3 cup vegetable oil
 1/2 cup milk
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 3/4 cup pumpkin puree



...because what tells you it is fall more than apple cider and fresh pumpkin donuts?

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk together flours, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice in a medium bowl. Whisk together in a separate large mixing bowl the egg, oil, milk, vanilla, pumpkin puree and brown sugar. Then slowly add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients. Stir until blended. Make sure not to over stir. Fill greased Donut Pan and bake for 12-14 minutes. Let them cool in the pan for a couple of minutes, then transfer donuts to cooling rack. Brush on melted butter and cover with cinnamon and sugar. Makes 12-15 donuts *aliceandlois.com* 

#### **Pumpkin** Nog

8 eggs, separated
2/3 cup sugar
1 cup canned pumpkin puree
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
3 cups whole milk
2 cups heavy cream
2 cups dark rum or brandy
Whipped cream (optional)
Freshly grated nutmeg



It's never too early to get ready for the season!

Place egg whites in the bowl of a stand mixer and whisk on low speed until frothy, about 30 seconds. Increase speed to medium-high and, watching carefully, beat until they are about the consistency of shaving cream, about 90 seconds. Reduce speed to medium. With mixer running, add half of sugar and beat until incorporated, about 30 seconds. Transfer whites to a large bowl. Do not wash bowl. Add egg yolks and remaining sugar to now-empty stand mixer bowl and beat at medium-high speed until pale yellow and ribbony, shutting off machine and scraping down sides with a rubber spatula as necessary, about 2 minutes total. Add pumpkin puree, cinnamon, and allspice and mix on medium-low speed until homogenous, about 15 seconds. Add milk, cream, and alcohol and mix on low speed to combine. Using a rubber spatula or handheld whisk, fold the whipped whites into the egg yolk/milk mixture until completely incorporated. Serve by ladling into goblets and garnishing with whipped cream (if desired), grated nutmeg, and a cinnamon stick if desired. Serves: 12-16 seriouseats.com

Cancer is the leading cause of disease-related childhood death in the US and also claims the lives of 47 percent of dogs. Kids and dogs develop similar and even the same cancers such as brain cancer, osteosarcoma, lymphoma and leukemia. The problems inherent in designing and implementing pediatric oncology clinical trials coupled with scant resources makes finding a cure difficult. For dogs diagnosed with cancer, the outlook is no better.

Canines-N-Kids Foundation is a nonprofit committed to finding a cure to the devastating cancers that both get by advancing comparative oncology, the study of similar cancers that occur in animals and people. The Smashing Walnuts Foundation is a nonprofit started by 9 year old Gabriella Miller and her family to support childhood cancer research.
