




Our Neck of the Woods

Board of Directors Meetings

Monthly meetings are held in the conference room of the Clubhouse on the second Tuesday of the month at 6:00pm.

Residents are welcome to observe the public portion of meetings and to address the Board during the 'Homeowner Forum' section of the meeting.

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The following actions were taken by the Board of Directors at their meeting held on August 8, 2017

- Approved the amended minutes of July 11, 2017 meeting
- Discussed design guidelines for String Lights, appointed a subcommittee to review
- Tabled the replacement of the Summerbrooke Pool Fountain feature motor until pool season ends
- Adjusted the rental fee to for profit organizations renting the community center to 15% of profits or \$20/hour, whichever is greater
- Supported the use of radar speed limit signs on Glebe View Drive to determine if a traffic study is necessary, provided the residents submitting the complaint obtain signatures for the petition
- Approved the revised Window Design Guidelines
- Approved the stump removal proposal from HLS
- Approved the Sandhust Modification Application for patio/ deck in a landscape buffer easement
- Approved the SWHOA to use the Clubhouse for fall meetings if the CC is not available, with the stipulation that a BHOA board member attend the SWHOA meetings to provide entry control to the building
- Approved the proposal from Finley asphalt for tennis court refurbishment, at the Stone House only as a test
- Approved the proposals from HLS for stream valley
- Approved the grounds maintenance contract from HLS
- Denied the lawn remediation proposal for Bankbarn Terrace for tree removal and turf restoration
- Reconsidered the prior month's decision regarding the Modification Subcommittee reviewing applications where the deed requires both HOA and county approval due to an easement
- Reviewed the June financial statements
- Assessed violation charges on an account for failure to submit an application for a shed, basketball goal, and failure to repair a fence

Broadlands is home to two elementary schools and one middle school, plus an array daycares, churches, and after school programs. Drivers must be aware of the increased child pedestrian traffic throughout the county and aware that school children often aren't as visible as adults due to their smaller statures. For those dropping their children off at the schools or waiting at bus stops, please be aware that double parking, parking in fire lanes, blocking of intersections, as well as making u-turns in the middle of the road are all illegal. Please also be mindful of your neighbors and do not use their driveways to turn around.

Broadlands has three underground tunnels to help keep our residents safe; one on Claiborne Parkway connecting Hillside Elementary with Harvest Green Terrace, another on Claiborne Parkway which connects the Nature Center with Village Drive (close to Mill Run and Eagle Ridge), and a third on See Goodbye Summer on page 6

A response to your application is generally sent within one week of the meeting.

Waxpool connecting the Community Center with the LeFevre Stone House (close to Eagle Ridge). We encourage all bicycle and pedestrian traffic to utilize the tunnels rather than cross these main roads. Heritage Landscape Services sweeps each tunnel for debris and graffiti every Monday in conjunction with their trash can services to help keep these tunnels clean and safe for school children as well as the walkers, runners, and bikers who regularly use the path. However; accidents, vandalism, and spills can happen in an instant and we are not always aware of them. If you are aware of an unsafe or vulgar condition in the tunnels, please report them to the HOA office at 703-729-9704.

If you have a child attending school this year, please be sure to check out the article on page 18 all about back to school safety. The HOA has agreed that the Nature Center can be used as an official safe house for the schools in case of an emergency. We are open Monday through Friday from 9:00am-5:00pm, with staff members available to assist in contacting the police in case of an emergency.

Please stop by to ensure that your child knows where we are located. They may want to stop by regularly on their way home from school just to visit our friendly animals! Cheers.

HOW AM I NOTIFIED OF MY RESULTS?

The Modifications Subcommittee is using new software to process applications in order to increase efficiency and provide quicker response time to residents regarding the status of their modification applications. Once the Subcommittee has reached a decision, the results letter will be delivered via email. If an email is not provided, then the results letter will be mailed. There have been reports that some emails are being delivered to residents' junk/spam folder. Therefore, please check your inbox and junk/spam folders for your results letter or contact the HOA office at 703-729-9704.

Emails will be sent from no-reply@smartwebs365.com should you wish to add this email address to your contact list to ensure prompt delivery. Beginning in August, the deadline for application submission requirements changed to noon on Wednesdays before the subcommittee meetings. This deadline change provides staff and subcommittee volunteers adequate time to process and review applications in advance of scheduled meetings. ARE YOU SELLING YOUR HOME?

By ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home, save yourself some stress. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, fence/deck repair, any staining touch up, or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidently placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

When you sell your home you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer. Once the request has been executed it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, structures that are not in compliance, and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the owner's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If the violations are not rectified before settlement then, the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, broadlandshoa.org, to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. UPCOMING CHANGES TO COMMUNITY CENTER PARTY RENTAL FEES



The hourly Community Center rental rate will be \$75.00/hour plus a cleaning fee of \$65.00 for parties. Renting the facility for 8 hours or longer will be \$600 plus the cleaning fee, \$65.00. Currently the Community

Center is being renovated but the HOA can accept reservations for parties that will take place after October 13th.

The security deposit will remain the same at \$500. The lost key fob fee is \$25.

Broadlands Association reserves the right to deduct from the security deposit any amount necessary to cover any costs of excessive cleanup, and shall also deduct the costs of repairs or replacements of any property damaged during the use of the Community Center. If the security deposit does not fully cover these costs, the Contract Holder shall be billed for the difference and

any future use of the Community Center shall be denied until these costs are paid. Any contract Holder using the Community Center shall be responsible for any and all damages that occur due to their use of the Community Center.

LAWN MAINTENANCE VIOLATION NOTICES

Your home is a valuable investment so take pride in your curb appeal. A beautiful home with poor lawn maintenance is aesthetically unappealing. Whether you are a tenant or homeowner, you are responsible for maintaining your lawn so that it meets the requirements of our covenants guidelines. If you are not physically able to keep up with your property or can't find the time, then please consider hiring a lawn service to preserve the quality of our neighborhood.

Primary reasons why you may receive a lawn violation letter from our Covenants Department:

- turf more than 6 inches;
- weeds and grass in beds; in need of edging and weeding around property
- overgrown or dead shrubbery or plant growth (including vines running along home)
- tree branches hanging over sidewalks or other properties
- yards with litter, trash, debris or other objects
- other unsightly conditions

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

- ✓ Please remember that lawn maintenance pertains to all parts of the property including FRONT, BACK, and SIDES.
- ✓ ALL violations stated in the notice must be corrected to prevent incurred charges.
- ✓ The initial violation notice sent will allow 10 days to correct the issue(s). If any issues still remain, a FINAL notice will be sent. IF REPEAT VIOLATIONS OCCUR WITHIN A YEAR OF THE INITIAL NOTICE, ONLY A FINAL NOTICE WILL BE SENT AT THAT TIME.
- ✓ Association staff, contractors, officers and authorized parties ARE PERMITTED TO ACCESS THE EXTERIOR OF YOUR PROPERTY - front, back and sides, for inspections and maintenance per the Declaration of **Broadlands Association, Inc.**
- If the violation is not corrected within 10 days and a hearing is not requested, THE HOA OR ITS CONTRACTOR WILL ENTER THE LOT AND CORRECT THE VIOLATION, AND THE RESULTING REPAIR COSTS AS WELLAS AN ADMINISTRATIVE FEE WILL BE CHARGED BACK TO THE OWNER'S ACCOUNT.

Covenant Inspectors regularly canvass our neighborhood to help preserve the property values for home ownership, to promote community harmony and to ensure the high standards of living that our residents have come to expect are maintained.

Throughout the year, the Covenants Inspectors routinely inspect homes for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in open view, parking issues, architectural modifications, and leftover holiday décor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular inspections where violations may occur with high frequency.

SCOOP THE POOP...

Residents frequently express concern that not everyone is taking the time to pick up their pet's waste in the neighborhood. Please ensure that your family members realize how important it is to be a responsible pet owner:

- **Dog poop is not natural,** especially in the quantities that are generated by pets. It harms the environment and threatens public health.
- Forgot your waste bag? No worries! The Broadlands HOA has more mutt mitt stations to offer residents than any other surrounding community currently 82.
- Don't want to carry it with you? No problem, most of our mutt mitt stations have trash cans attached.
- Even if your dog poops in the woods, you still need to clean it up. Not only is it unsightly, it can get into streams and into the water supply.

It's the law! Not only is it a violation of the Association Declaration, Article 8, Section 8.2(q) to not pick up your pet's waste, it is also a county ordinance violation. Please reference Loudoun County Ordinance, Chapter 612.19, Section a (9) Dog waste.

But the reality is that rehabilitation centers throughout Virginia are overwhelmed with birds with broken wings, turtles that have wandered from their water source, and run-over but still fighting for life raccoons, foxes, and baby deer.

We are creating a league of experts for our community in animal rehabilitation response. You will be the first responders when an animal is lost or injured in our community. Dr. Burwell of Wildlife Veterinary Care is coming to provide the training for this work. To sign up visit: broadlandshoa.org/event/animalrehab

She will provide the emergency response training for animals in need and will give us checklists of whether the animal should be returned to the wild, taken to a care provider, or cared for locally.

Many of you contact us with care for the animals in our community. This is your chance to learn the skills needed to be a first responder, and to make our community more friendly to all the things that fly, swim, and creep upon the earth.

Monarchs are in Broadlands Now!

Beginning of the Fall Migration



In Broadlands, we have been sighting many Monarch butterflies looking for milkweeds to lay their eggs. This is the time in which the 3rd generation, great grand babies born in north, will lay eggs for the 4th generation, great-great grand babies, which will migrate to Mexico for overwintering.

Searching for Common Milkweed **Begins**

Female Monarchs are specialized butterflies and they will only lay their eggs on milkweed. They each lay an average of about 700 eggs over two to five weeks of egg laying, with a record in captivity of 1179 eggs.

How to Hunt, Gather, and Protect **Monarch Eggs-Raise the Migration**

- 1. Where to look:
- Milkweed with fresh leaves including common, swamp, butterfly
- Bright sun can make seeing the eggs difficult - search early mornings or when it's cloudy.
- Make sure to look on and under the leaves.

To get the egg, cut the stem that the leaf is on, if not just the leaf with a little stem if possible.

2. Start your nursery: (3-5 days)

- For eggs, all you need is a plastic container. For air, puncture some holes on the lid.
- Carefully and gently clean the leaves from other dirt or pest.
- Keep the leaves fresh to prevent dry-



ing by laying them on a moistened paper towel. In 3-5 days, they will hatch.

3. Welcoming the baby caterpillars: (9-14 days)

- Set up your cage.
- When eggs hatch the caterpillars will be very tiny and harder to see.
- Now they will eat, eat, eat, and eat some more for about 9-14 days.
- Provide them

with fresh milkweed and keep their cage clean.

Going into Chrysalis (8-13 days)



- Caterpillars will climb to the top of the cage and hang in "J" shape
- Now just wait for the magic to happen.

5. Hatching

When ready, the monarch will come out and slowly expand and flap its wings getting ready for the first flight.

TID BITS OF THIS AND THAT

We Can Make a Difference, One Backyard at a Time

As human populations grow, and millions more acres of land are developed each year, wildlife habitat is disappearing at an alarming rate. The result? Research shows that song birds, meadow birds and their food sources are in sharp decline. In fact, entomologist and University of Delaware professor Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of the acclaimed book "Bringing Nature Home," says there are 50% fewer birds today compared to 40 years ago.

Insect populations, too, have dropped by more than half, including the monarch

butterfly which has seen its numbers drop by 90%. Insects are essential to a healthy ecosystem, explains Tallamy. They're an important food source for birds and many other forms of wildlife. And don't forget the important role insects play in pollinating the crops that sustain us.

At least part of the answer, says Tallamy and other experts, is right in our own backyards. As Tallamy points out, there are nearly 46 million acres of lawn in the U.S. Mowed lawns are a monoculture that do little to support wildlife, and much of it can be converted to gardens and yards filled with native shrubs, trees, flowers, and ornamental grasses that are not only beautiful, but ecologically sustainable. Tallamy suggests that each of us determine how much lawn we need for kids, pets, picnics, etc., then gradually fill in the rest of our lawn with a variety of native plants. Loudoun Nonprofit Seeks Dog Lovers to Train Puppies Program Provides Service Dogs to Veterans



Veterans Moving Forward, Inc. (VMF), a Loudoun-based nonprofit that provides service dogs to veterans, is seeking local dog lovers to raise and train puppies for their program. The commitment is typically 20 to 24 months, and all equipment and veterinary care is provided by VMF. Volunteers provide their time as well as a good home environment and food for the dog.

"The idea of raising a puppy to become a service dog appeals to a lot of people, including moms with young children and teenagers, but we've found that our most successful volunteers are dog-loving women and men without young children," says VMF Director of Canine Operations Michele Khol.

Volunteers who commit to the program receive a puppy at eight weeks old, and work with the puppy both at home and five to seven times per month with VMF's trainers at the VMF Training Center in Dulles. In addition to socialization and behavior, the puppy is taught basic obedience and specialized skills, such as helping with laundry, fetching a water bottle from the fridge and also fetching medication. At 16-17 months of age, the puppy, who is at this point, a service dog in training, is ready to be matched with a veteran and begin advanced training that's tailored to meet their veteran's specific needs.

Most puppy raisers, when asked about their experience will talk about the impact of the moment when they see the veteran receive his service dog. It's a moment of high emotion, and pride for the raiser.

Jeanette Townsend can attest to that. as a four-time puppy raiser with VMF. She is currently raising 1-year old Albie, a Golden Retriever.

Jeanette decided to become a puppy raiser for VMF shortly after her family lost their own beloved dog, Scout. They weren't ready to have another pet, but Jeanette still felt a longing and desire to care for a dog. The two-year commitment of being a puppy raiser for VMF fit perfectly with her situation.

"It's fun to get to know the dog as a puppy and discover what motivates him and makes him happy. Then, to see him grow and mature and eventually serve a veteran is amazingly rewarding," says Jeanette.

Jeanette admits that raising a service dog can be challenging and take commitment. But as a dog lover with a desire to make a difference, it's an opportunity that's been extraordinarily fulfilling.

Optimal candidates to raise a puppy as a service dog are dog-loving women and men, who have no young children, have had a dog as an adult, have had some experience training a dog, are in good physical condition, and live within 30 miles of VMF's training center in Dulles.

Cheesy Hash Brown and Kale Torte



Heat the oven to 400 degrees F. Heat the oil in a 9-inch cast-iron skillet over medium heat.

2 tbsp. olive oil

1 large onion

kosher salt

Pepper

10 large eggs

2 c. frozen hash brown potatoes

2 red Fresno peppers

6 oz. extra-sharp Cheddar or Gruyère cheese

2 clove garlic

1 tbsp. fresh thyme leaves

1/2 small bunch kale or Swiss chard

Add the onion, season with 1/2 teaspoon salt, and cook, covered, stirring occasionally, until tender, 8 to 10 minutes. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Fold in the hash browns, peppers, and all but 1/2 cup of the cheddar. Stir the garlic and thyme into the onion and cook for 1 minute. Add the kale and

cook, covered, tossing occasionally, until beginning to wilt, 2 to 3 minutes. Transfer the egg mixture to the skillet and stir to distribute the ingredients. Sprinkle with the remaining 1/2 cup cheddar and bake until set, 20 to 25 minutes. (For a golden-brown top, broil for 1 to 2 minutes after baking.) 8 Servings Total Time: 0:40 *Womansday.com*

Pimiento Cheese and Ham Scramble



In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, hot sauce, 1 tablespoon water, and 1/2 teaspoon each

BACK TO SCHOOL

BEFORE THE BELL RINGS: BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

As boys and girls throughout the community sharpen their pencils and get ready to head back to class, it's important to ensure they have a safe school year. Here are some tips on how your family can be proactive and avoid potentially harmful situations:

- Make sure your school has your child's updated emergency contact information. Write down any specific instructions that should be followed in case of an emergency, and have the school keep them in your
- Talk to your child's teachers before classes start and alert them to any medical issues your child has. Also, explain to the teacher what he or she should do if the medical issues arise—such as an allergic

reaction, asthma attack or seizure—and provide school personnel with emergency medication such as EpiPens® (Epinephrine Auto-Injectors) and inhalers.

- Help your children memorize important phone numbers so that they know how to get in touch with you and other trusted adults. Also, make sure those numbers are programmed into their cell phones, or provide them with a list of phone numbers that they can keep in their backpacks or wallets at all times.
- Let your children know exactly who they can go home with after school if their regular ride can't pick them up, and make sure they know not to accept rides from people who aren't on the list.
- If your children will be walking to school, walk the route with them several times before classes start to make sure they understand traffic laws and can walk the route on their own. Also, find a friend or sibling they can walk with, and make sure they always use the buddy system.
- Show your children which houses or offices in the neighborhood they can go to in case no one is at home after school. The HOA has agreed that the Nature Center can be used as an official safe house for the schools in case of an emergency.
- Report reckless drivers to the police to help make sure the neighborhood remains safe, particularly during times when kids are going to and returning from school.

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
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WORLD OF WINE

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

The kids are in full swing back to school now which means we are constantly preparing snacks and lunches for the kids. I struggle with coming up with healthy ideas that my kids will actually eat. I know my boys come home from school starving, and if I don't have some healthier snack options they immediately try and go for the cookies, fruit snacks, and chips. Kids are picky, especially mine if something looks foreign to them, they won't even try it. But I have learned if I am a little better prepared, then I can ensure that my kids are eating healthy the majority of the time.

I know we are all busy and want the quickest and easiest snacks possible. Here are a few of the easy snacks I like to prepare for my kids.

- 1. Dip and Veggies- The easiest thing that I started to do is to have some precut vegetables and a dip out on the kitchen table. I like to keep it simple and just have cut carrots, celery, and cucumber. My kids will devour a bowl of hummus that is out.
- 2. Zucchini Roll Ups- This one is for adults and kids both. Use a mandolin slicer and slice the zucchini length wise to create thin slices. Then spread hummus or your favorite dip and roll up into mini rolls. You can also add some high quality sliced cheese or organic sliced turkey for a more filling option.
- 3. Ants on a Log- This one has been around for a long time but it is such an easy way to get veggies into your kids. You just fill the celery stalks with an all-natural nut or seed butter and top with raisins or just top the celery and peanut butter with a few dark chocolate chips.
- 4. **Stuffed Dates-** This is such a delicious snack and one of the easiest to prepare.

Split a medjool date in half and remove the pit, then spread in nut or seed butter. You can use almond butter or sunflower butter. The nut butter is such a healthy fat, while the dates have so many vitamins and fiber in them.

- 5. Easy energy bites- I like to store some energy balls in the freezer to have on hand when we are all looking for a healthier snack option. The majority of the protein bars on the market are filled with so much sugar and unnecessary fillers. The great thing about making your own energy bites is you can customize them however you like. My favorite is adding 1 1/2 cups of pitted medjool dates, 1/3 cup of sunflower seed butter, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and ½ cup shredded unsweetened coconut or GF rolled oats. You process the dates into a food processor until they form a sticky ball. Then you add in the remaining ingredients and process until a sticky batter is formed. Roll into mini balls and store in your freezer or refrigerator.
- 6. Smoothies- Smoothies are so great with my kids because I can sneak in healthy fats and greens without them tasting anything green. I like to use coconut water or almond milk as my liquid, dates, 1 or 2 frozen fruits, ¼ avocado or 1 tablespoon of chia and flax seeds, and spinach or power greens. Blend and split into fun drinking cups for the kiddos!

Kids are exposed to unhealthy snacks every day and sometimes it is out of our control, but I always say if we build healthy habits in our home then the kids are more likely to make wiser food choices on their own. It's definitely about progress not perfection, so don't beat yourself up if your kids won't eat any of my suggested snacks, get creative and find different things that work for

your kids and family. I try and tell my kids it's all about fueling our bodies and giving them the nourishment they need to be strong and perform best, not to eat to lose weight or follow fad diets. I want my kids to see me as strong because I eat to fuel my body. The word "diet" has never been used in our home.

Another way to ensure your kids are getting the nutrients they need is to say goodbye to the processed foods and added sugars. Your entire family will see health benefits just by cutting back on the excess sugar in the processed foods. Don't replace the fat with "low-fat" cookies as snacks; these are just filled with sugar and other weird ingredients that should be avoided. Some other kid snacks that are often filled with so much sugar are flavored yogurt and fruit juices, which tend to have more sugar than a dessert.

Let your kids get involved with making their own snacks as they get old enough. My 7 year old loves to help make his smoothies! We tend to make a lot of grain free muffins that can be whipped up in about 5 minutes and they make quick snacks on the go. I have the most luck getting the kids to try something new if they helped make it themselves.

If you are looking for some store bought snack ideas, I like to have on hand Lara bars, they contain just a couple ingredients and are tasty! Apple squeezers and organic lightly salted nuts or sunflower seeds are easy to pack and carry well.

ROADS REJUVENATION

This fall. Broadlands has contracted with TRI Technologies out of Midland, VA to perform asphalt rejuvenation services on the HOA owned private roads within the community. The estimated dates of work as of the production deadline of this publication are September 6-19, weather pending. This schedule could fluctuate depending on weather leading up to those dates as that will effect prior jobs the contractor is working on. We will provide a detailed schedule of road work as quickly as possible, but wanted to advise residents of what the product is, what they can expect during the process, and what the end result will be.

What is asphalt rejuvenation?

A road surface consists of aggregate in a petroleum/asphalt binder. As asphalt ages, the petroleum elements of the binder oxidize and the asphalt loses its elastic properties and becomes brittle: when the road surface cracks. freeze-thaw cycles to destroy the road. Rejuvenation reverses the aging process by adding back the petroleum fractions needed for elasticity of the binder. The rejuvenator penetrates the asphalt surface, replenishing the oils and provides a seal on the surface to protect the underlying pavement from the oxidative effects of the air, sunlight, water, and fuel.



Why are we rejuvenating?

Rejuvenation extends the serviceable life of pavement for several years. It seals hairline cracks and its replenishing effects on the binder restores the flexibility that prevents cracking. Not only does it save money, it is also more environmentally friendly than milling and overlaying the pavement on a more frequent basis. TRI Technologies has provided a 5 year warranty that the rejuvenator will not flake, peel, or chip, that it will not exhibit functions failures, and that it is fuel resistant.



What can I expect on work days?

On the scheduled day your street is to be rejuvenated, TRI Technologies will start at 7:00am and close down the lot/street entrance with barricades and yellow caution tape. They will clean the roadways. Please remove all vehicles by 7:00am on your scheduled work day or they are subject to being towed at the owners' expense. You will not be able to access your driveway for up to 36 hours, so please be prepared by parking vehicles on alternative roads if you need to use them during this time. Foot traffic will be prohibited on the surface while the lots are closed in order to keep the material from tracking. Cracksealing and striping will be performed the following day and the areas will reopen to traffic when everything dries. Cracksealing includes the cleaning of all 1/4" or larger cracks with a hot air torch. They will be filled. Material will be over banned over the crack onto the surface of the asphalt to provide a seal on the surface as well as in the crack.

TRI Technologies will try to limit the impact on the homeowners, but roadways will need to be closed and limited to pedestrian traffic walking along sidewalk or turf areas until it is repainted and reopened the following day. There will be no trash pickup on work days. Mail delivery can be completed if the carrier is able to walk in and drop the mail off. We will communicate with the post office, trash contractor, FedEx, UPS, and schools in order to coordinate alternative plans for bus stops, mail service, and trash pickup on work days, but we ask for your understanding as this two day inconvenience is necessary in order for the work to be performed. 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



FROM YOUR SUPERVISOR

Hello Broadlands.

Summer passed by very quickly and we have kept busy addressing the needs of the residents of the Broad Run District. We have held community meetings where very good ideas have been raised which we are trying to turn into reality. Please continue to keep in touch by calling 571-442-1088 or emailing Ron. Meyer@loudoun.gov.

As we move into fall, we will continue to work on improving intersections of Farmwell Road instead of planning for a full widening between Smith Switch and Ashburn Road. We are also working on maintaining progress on Shellhorn Road and securing funding for that project.

We will also be working on projects in your neighborhoods, many of which were raised by your neighbors. They are as follows:

Signal at Demott Drive and Waxpool Road

VDOT has approved the warrant for this signal which means that VDOT has found that it is necessary. It is now up to the County to design how the signal will be constructed and that is the next step that we will be pursuing.

Speed Study on Truro Parish

This is an issue that has been raised many times. I have asked VDOT to do the study to determine if the posted speed limit is appropriate for a neighborhood road. We were able to have VDOT install signage at the curve on Truro Parish to lower the speed limit at the curve. We now want to look at the road in its entirety.

Speed Study on Glebe View Drive

This is another neighborhood road with many young children. I am asking



VDOT to look at options to slow up traffic and alert drivers to the fact that there are many children in this neighborhood.

Quail Pond

I am working with this community and the County to make sure that their streets are paved for acceptance by VDOT and their pond meets County code.

Sturman Place

I met with the neighbors on this street which backs up to the Ashburn Recreation Center property. The neighbors want to be sure that there is a good buffer between their backyards and the Rec Center. I am coordinating with the County.

Updates on some of the Transportation **Projects in the Broadlands Community** are listed below:

Belmont Ridge Road Widening (Gloucester Parkway to Hay Road

Project construction continues. Current work includes utility relocation, storm water and grading work, and work on the northbound Belmont Ridge Road bridge over the Washington & Old Dominion Railroad Regional Park. The traffic shift on Belmont Ridge Road placing traffic onto the new northbound bridge over W&OD occured on or about July 17, 2017.

Route 7/Route 659 Interchange

Work to prepare for the concrete deck pours continues; the first of six deck pours was completed on June 27, 2017. The new Belmont Ridge Road tie in north of the interchange at Promenade Drive was expected to be completed by late June/early July 2017. Asphalt placement at Ramp A (southwest quadrant) was expected to be completed in July. The two jack and bore operations for the Loudoun Water betterment were completed in June along with the 20" waterline wet tap tie-in at Ramp B (southeast quadrant). The pedestrian trails have been completed south of the interchange to the future Russel Branch intersection along with the guardrail. Work continues on installation of storm sewer along Ramp C (northeast quadrant) and embankment fill at Ramp D (northwest quadrant). Additional Dominion Virginia Power (DVP) and Comcast utilities between existing Belmont Ridge Road and the Belmont Country Club adjacent and west of Baltusrol Terrace were uncovered. These utilities appear to be conflict with the installation of the Loudoun Water relocation and betterment portion of the project.

Belmont Ridge Road - Truro Parish **Drive to Croson Lane**

The 100% Plans have been approved by the County. The land acquisition process will begin when the appraisals have been received.
