

Vandalism in Our Community

While vandalism isn't my favorite subject to discuss, we've seen our fair share recently and it becomes necessary to address once again. We notice spikes in vandalism every time there is a break from school. We got hit hard over Columbus Day weekend, but have continued to have issues throughout October and expect it to continue over the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

These acts of vandalism cost the association valuable resources, from staff time contacting the sheriff's department and filing police reports to paying contractors to clean up the mess.

We see everything from spray painting on overpasses, streets, sidewalks, tunnels, and tot lots, to the breaking of light fixtures in the tunnels and tennis courts, setting fire to things, knocking over light poles on the walking trails, breaking into the pools and throwing the deck furniture into the deep end, burning holes in the pool covers with cigarettes, putting firecrackers into and smashing mailboxes, tipping over or stealing portable restrooms, and stealing fire extinguishers from Broadlands Live tents. We've even had instances of people breaking into the pools and walking on the pool covers and falling through.

These acts of vandalism cost the association valuable resources, from staff time contacting the sheriff's department and filing police reports to paying contractors to clean up the mess. These efforts take resources away from other association funded activities and improvements. Nobody wants to take their young child to a tot lot for a play outing, only to find the slide covered in phallic symbols. The association has and will continue to press charges against those caught in the act and will cooperate with the sheriff's department in



these cases. I have been subpoenaed as a witness for hate crimes that have taken place on association property. I have called parents who thought their children were safe at a sleepover but snuck out and have been caught trespassing in the middle of the night. I have taken calls from residents who have heard the teens yelping when jumping off the diving board into the chilly waters of the Southern Walk pool in the fall after the pools have been partially drained, which could easily lead to a broken neck or back.

The association contracts with an independent security company to help patrol the community and they have helped to catch vandals; however, they cannot be omnipresent. We rely on our residents to help keep an eye on our precious assets and speak to and know the whereabouts of children. If we make ourselves aware of the issues affecting our surroundings, we can keep Broadlands a vibrant and safe community. To report suspicious activity, contact the Loudoun County non-emergency number at 703-777-1021.

Revised Design Guidelines

Basketball Goals

Before purchasing a portable or fixed basketball goal it is strongly recommended to read the general and specific design guidelines first.

Portable and fixed basketball goals do not need an application as long as they meet the following requirements:

- Basketball goal must be located above the driveway apron and out of the VDOT right-ofway which extends approximately ten feet from the street towards your home.
- For single family homes, no part of the base can be closer than 3 feet from the property line and must be at least 20 feet from the nearest neighboring house wall.

Please be aware; any basketball goals that include lighting, side post netting or any other accessories etc., require an application.

Due to the proximity of units, the permanent

(in ground) installation of basketball goals are not permitted in attached housing.

Landscaping

Any planting bed or vegetables garden borders taller than 10" requires an application.

Mulch in front or rear fenced yards of townhouse properties does not require an application. However, mulching a townhouse rear yard without a fence is not permitted.

Thanksgiving Holiday Trash and Recycling Schedule

On Thanksgiving Day, there will be no pickup that day. Trash collection will resume on the Monday following the holiday and recycling collection will resume the following Thursday. Both services will be suspended for the day and then resume on the next regularly-scheduled pickup day for each type of waste.

When using a snow blower, please blow your driveway snow onto your own lawn. Do not blow onto your neighbor's property, the street or the sidewalk.

Feeling Political?

Per Broadlands guidelines no more than three political campaign election signs are allowed and each sign shall not exceed a maximum of four (4) square feet. These signs may be placed no more than 60 days prior to an election date and must be removed 5 days following the election. No application is required for these signs.

Scoop the Poop...

Residents frequently express concern that not everyone is taking the time to pick up their pet's waste in the neighborhood. Please ensure that your family members realize how important it is to be a responsible pet owner:

Dog poop is not natural, especially in the quantities that are generated by pets. It harms the environment and threatens public health.

Forgot your waste bag? No worries! The Broadlands HOA has more mutt mitt stations to offer residents than any other surrounding community - currently 78.

Don't want to carry it with you? No problem, most of our mutt mitt stations have trash cans attached.

Even if your dog poops in the woods, you still need to clean it up. Not only is it unsightly, it can get into streams and into the water supply.

It's the law! Is it a violation of the Association Declaration, Article 8, Section 8.2(q) to not pick up your pet's waste, it is also a county ordinance violation. Please reference Loudoun County Ordinance, Chapter 612.19, Section a (9) Dog waste.

Covenants Corner

Lawn Maintenance Violation Notices

Due to heavy rains, the lawn maintanence issues continue. We will continue to focus on both the front and rear lawns throughout November.

Light the Night

During the month of November, the covenants inspectors will focus on homes whose pole lights in their front yards are burned out. As winter rapidly approaches and the days get shorter, it is more important than ever to keep your exterior pole light functioning both for security and safety purposes.

In accordance with the Association Documents, should you fail to bring your lot into compliance, the Board of Directors may take action to enforce compliance. If a violation is noted, the owner will be mailed a letter providing thirty days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued,



providing an additional fourteen day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a Hearing Notice is sent and a Hearing will be held in accordance with state law, where charges may be assessed, up to \$10 per day for a maximum of 90 days.

Keeping these lights functional is the responsibility of the homeowner whether you own a single family, semi-attached or a town home. Should replacing the light bulb not resolve the problem, you may have a tripped circuit breaker in your home or you may need to replace the photoelectric cell. An electrician can help you. The HOA does not provide this service.

Keep your pole lights operational and keep your home and neighborhood safe.

Throughout the year, the Covenants Manager routinely inspects homes for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in open view, parking issues, architectural modifications to leftover holiday décor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular inspections where violations may occur with high frequency.

This helps preserve the property values for home ownership, promotes community harmony and ensures the high standards of living that our residents have come to expect are maintained.







Tips from the Conservation Landscaping Committee

I don't know about you, but I really enjoy watching the antics of the birds in my yard. They are so much fun! Coming from a conservation landscape perspective, I wanted to learn how to attract more and varied types of birds to my yard. There are so many resources available in print or online! One of the key points I kept reading about was the importance of sources of food and shelter. Native plants really are the best way to provide for the birds and pollinators that you want to attract to your conservation landscape.

What's the difference between conventional and conservation landscaping? A conservation landscape includes plants that are native to the area compared to ones that originally came from Europe or Asia. Native plants species are adapted to conditions right in your backyard and don't have the same need for extra water (after an establishment phase of course), fertilizer and pesticides that an import would. How is a bunch of native plants going to get more birds into my yard you ask? Invasive and non-native species are the uninvited party guests that no one knows or how to get rid of. These plants utilize the resources and space that our native plants need to provide for our local birds and insects. They don't have the natural predators in our own backyards and cost us many, many dollars to remove them.

If you plant them, they will come... Fill the garden with native trees, shrubs, grasses, flowering plants and ferns to feed the birds with seeds, berries and nuts. Feed the birds with insects - Birds need the protein from insects that live on theses native plants as well. Some of the caterpillars of the butterflies and moths that need the same plants the birds enjoy become baby bird food. Don't worry about the caterpillars eating all the leaves and flowers from the plant, because the amount that they chew is barely noticeable. All the birds that call your yard home pay their rent by eating those bugs and grubs that you don't want. Now you don't need to use pesticides!

According to research done by Dr. Douglas Tallamy

(Bringing Nature Home, 2009) some top plant options to consider for developing a habitat garden for butterflies and pollinators are:

Trees: Oaks, Cherry, Willows, Birches, Crabapples, Blueberries, Maples, Elms

Perennial Flowers and Grasses: Goldenrods, Asters, Sunflowers, Pyeweeds, Bonesets, Morning Glories, Sedges, Honeysuckles (NOT the invasive Japanese Honeysuckle bushes & Vines!), Lupines, Violets, Geraniums, Coneflowers

According to Dr. Tallamy's studies listed in the Habitat Gardening for Wildlife guide (2015) for Virginia Master Gardeners, some of the best flowering plants to include in the garden are Clustered Mountain Mint, Coastal Plain Joe Pyeweed, Stiff Goldenrod, Swamp Milkweed, Grey Goldenrod, Rattlesnake Master, Blue Mistflower, Showy Aster and Dwarf Blazingstar.

What else can be done to attract the colorful birds? The plantings of shrubs and trees provide both protective cover and nesting locations. Arranging the plants in layers from high to low, attracts many different kinds of birds to the same spaces. Birds need water to drink and bathe in and protection from cats.

Not sure where to start with your design? That, my friends, is the topic of NEXT month's article! (If you want to jump ahead, here is a new-to-me website: http://lgnc.org/project/native-plants-for-the-small-yard/).



Bridging Broadlands with Eagle Ridge

An Eagle Scout rose to the challenge of creating a bridge and path to connect the north side of Broadlands to Eagle Ridge Middle School. What's the story behind it all?

In January of 2016, Robert Candland, a student at Eagle Ridge Middle School was walking home from school. Like many kids, Robert decided to take a dangerous short cut by running across Truro Parish, instead of backtracking to walk through the tunnel which goes under the road and connects the



So when it came time for Robert to determine an idea for his Boy Scout Eagle Scout Project, he proposed the idea of a path and bridge that would make an easier, safer and more direct route to Eagle Ridge from the tunnel to the north side of the neighborhood. The idea would require a path through the woods and a bridge over the small stream that cut through that part of the woods on Broadlands property to get to the school. It sounded like the ideal solution to 2 problems.

Robert went before the HOA board to present the idea. The board supported the idea and provided

guidelines and requirements. He appeared before the board 4 times, meeting specific requirements, getting their endorsement, then later their approval. He talked with the school principal, Scott Phillips who was eagerly in favor of the project because he himself was working with LCPS to put it on their project roadmap, which takes several years to happen. Then Robert made an important decision in reaching out to PTA member Diane Greene for help and direction on the project. Robert said this was his best decision because without Mrs. Greene, he probably would have given up on his idea and chosen a new Eagle Scout Project. Her encouragement and optimism kept the momentum going, even when it seemed like they were continually faced with herculean obstacles of every kind. Diane worked tirelessly with Robert to make the connections with a paving company, a metal fabricator, an engineering firm for Certified and Stamped Engineered plans for the bridge, helped solicit in kind donations and services exceeding \$35,000, and painstakingly working on every detail of the permitting and inspection, and building process contributing well over 300 hours into the project.

Robert organized the scouts to clear and prepare the area for the path and bridge, removing around 50 yards of underbrush, small trees, rocks, and being careful to stay clear of the poison ivy.

It was an enormous accomplishment to finish this project on time, on budget and open for the students going to and from school. No more running across traffic on Truro Parish. Now, students walk or ride their bike directly through the tunnel under Truro Parish, then cross the bridge and directly, and most importantly, safely to and home from school. For this, Mr. Phillips states that he is incredibly thankful that what was

an ongoing safety issue has been addressed.

ADHD: Why Does My Kid Do That?

Do you ever find yourself thinking:

Why does she wait until the last minute to complete her report?

No wonder he can't find his homework, his room is a disaster!

I can't find a way to motivate him to do his work, no matter what kind of reward I offer!

These behaviors are characteristic of kids with ADD/ADHD – with good reason. Kids with ADD/ADHD

typically lag behind their peers in the development of executive functions (EF) by about 30%. Many people like to imagine executive functions as an imaginary assistant who directs our thoughts, feelings and actions. That's a nice metaphor, however, executive functions are much more complex than that.

In his book, Executive Functions, What They Are, How They Work and Why They Evolved, Russell Barkley bases his definition of executive functions (EF) on a person's ability to regulate him/herself. He explains that as our brain matures, there are various neuropsychological capacities that influence our behavior, or help us manage ourselves. He names eight capacities, four of which are time, space, motivation and the ability to inhibit behaviors.

Why does she wait until the last minute? People with ADHD live in the now. They have difficulty thinking and planning across time. Scientists have found that the part of the brain that controls starting and finishing tasks is not as active in those with ADHD, because there are fewer neurotransmitters to send those messages.

That messy room? Organizational skills are also part of executive functions. If you're wondering why it's so difficult for your 17-year-old to stay organized, remember that his brain is not as mature as other 17-year-olds without this disorder. He may not have the skills necessary to break down that task into smaller steps and approach it methodically. Looking at his

room, leads to overwhelm, and things shut down.

Motivation is affected by time. If the time between now and the reward seems too long, it will be difficult to motivate him. That's why offering rewards for smaller chunks of effort is effective. Research shows that we all have a limited pool of self-regulation. Each time we use a little, whether it's to solve a problem, remember instructions or control our impulses, that pool shrinks. You can see why people with ADHD struggle with motivation. They have to use that pool more often than most of us.

These struggles aren't character flaws. They're just a part of the disorder. ADD/ADHD are neurobiological in nature, so the behaviors you see aren't always willful. ADD/ADHD don't reflect a deficit in intellect. People with this disorder fall within the same parameters of intelligence as the rest

of us. Because their thoughts move quickly, and their emotions often run high, they can be extremely creative and dynamic thinkers and leaders. Their social nature can open doors to lots of opportunities. With the right support, people with ADHD can learn to address their challenges and discover the possibilities that await them.

Eat Like A Native American This Thanksgiving

Take your family back in time with recipes that touch on Native American cuisine

Recipes from the Chefs of the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian

Wild Rice Salad

1/2 cup pine nuts

1/4 cup pumpkin seeds

6 cups chicken stock

11/2 cup wild rice

1 carrot cut into 1/2-inch-long matchsticks

3 tablespoons dried cranberries

1 Roma tomato, finely diced

4-5 scallions finely chopped

3 bunches watercress

Vinaigrette:

3 tablespoons apple cider vinegar

1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons canola oil

2 tablespoons honey

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Spread the pine nuts and pumpkin seeds in a small baking pan and toast them in the oven for 10 minutes until golden brown. Let cool. Combine the chicken stock and wild rice in a stockpot. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, and simmer, covered, for about 45-55 minutes, until the grains are just opened up and tender. Spread the hot rice on a baking sheet and let cool. When rice is cool, scrape it into a large bowl and add carrots, dried cranberries, diced tomato, toasted pine nut pumpkin seed mixture, and scallions. Toss all ingredients together with the vinaigrette, refrigerate for at least one hour, and serve over watercress. Place cider vinegar in a bowl and slowly mix in oil. Sweeten with just a touch of honey and whisk. Pour vinaigrette on top of salad and chill. Serve chilled or room temperature.

4-6 servings

Grilled Apples with Walnuts, Dried Cherries & Sunflower Seeds

1/2 cup lightly crushed walnuts

3/4 cup dried cherries (unsweetened), chopped

1/4 cup hulled, unsalted sunflower seeds

3/4 cup loosely packed light brown sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 cup flour

Pinch kosher salt

8 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature

6 small to medium Macintosh apples

Prepare a gas grill to medium-high (350 to 400 degrees). For a medium fire, you should be able to hold your hand about 6 inches above the coals for 6 to 7 seconds. Have a spray water bottle at hand for taming any flames. Combine the walnuts, dried cherries, sunflower seeds, brown sugar, cinnamon, ginger, flour and salt in a large mixing bowl, then work in the butter to a damp-sand consistency. Use a paring knife to core each apple, cutting in from the top and making an opening 1 inch in diameter. Do not cut through all the way to the bottom, however, clear out enough space to hold a fair amount of filling. If you'd like, chop the excess apple and add it to the filling mixture. Divide the mixture among the apples, packing it in gently and mounding it on top. Place the apples on the grill. Close the lid and cook for 15 to 20 minutes, until the fruit has softened slightly, and the filling has warmed through. Serve warm. 6 servings

Fry Bread

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons sugar

3/4 cup milk, plus more if necessary

Corn or canola oil for deep-frying

Sugar mixed with ground cinnamon for topping

In a medium bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, salt, and 2 tablespoons of sugar. Stir in 3/4 cup milk to make a stiff dough, adding a bit more if necessary. On a lightly floured board, divide the dough into 6 pieces. Form each into a ball, then roll into a disk about ¼ inch thick. In a Dutch oven or deep fryer, heat 3 inches oil to 350°F. Using a sharp knife, cut an X in the center of each dough disk. Place one disk at a time in the hot oil and cook until golden brown, about 2 minutes on each side. Using tongs, transfer to a paper towel–lined plate to drain. Keep warm in a low oven while frying the remaining disks. Serve at once, either plain or sprinkled with cinnamon sugar. *Makes 6 round flat breads*





Comfort Cases: Bringing Dignity & Hope to Youth in Foster Care

Often when a child is removed from their home and enters the foster care system, they are left to carry and transport their belongings in a trash bag. Comfort Cases, Inc. was founded in 2013 with the vision to eliminate this indignity from the foster care system and to ensure no child is made to feel like they and their belongings are trash. Rob Scheer, founder of Comfort Cases, Inc., experienced the foster care system years ago in his youth and he, too, carried his possessions in a trash bag. Rob and his husband Reece would go on to have four children all

of whom they adopted from the foster care system. When their children arrived at their house, each one of them came to the door with their belongings in a trash bag. It was then that Rob vowed to do something about this indignity and thus Comfort Cases, Inc. was born.

Comfort Cases' mission is to inspire communities to bring dignity and hope to youth in foster care. The organization, based in Rockville, Maryland, works to achieve its mission by providing youth entering the foster care system with a Comfort Case and a Comfort XL. Since 2013, Comfort Cases, Inc. has impacted the lives of over 40,000 youth in foster care in 39 states plus DC and Puerto Rico.

A Comfort Case is a backpack or small duffel bag that provides comfort, hope and love to youth entering foster care. The case provides them with both essential and comfort items to ease their transition into a new environment. Items in a Comfort

Case include pajamas, stuffed animal, book, coloring book with crayons or a journal with pens/pencils, a blanket, a toiletry kit (shampoo, conditioner, lotion, soap/body wash, and deodorant (Ages 10+)), and a dental kit (toothpaste and toothbrush). In order to convey a message to youth in care that they are loved and valued, each Comfort Case is assembled with care and includes only brand new items. Comfort Cases come in nearly 50 possible gender and size (Newborn-3XL) combinations with each intended to be individual and unique, like each child who enters foster care.

A Comfort XL is a large capacity duffel bag that provides dignity to youth entering foster care by eliminating the need to place their belongings in a trash bag. Comfort XL's are approximately 32" bags that are collapsible and compact. Their size enables the person responsible for removing a child from a home to be able to keep these on hand in an accessible location - whether it is the trunk of their vehicle or a dedicated spot at their office. The key is for workers to reach for a Comfort XL as opposed to a trash bag. This seemingly simple intervention has a powerful impact on a child and brings that child a sense of dignity and hope during an uncertain and traumatic time.

Broadlands Association Community Outreach and Briar Woods High School Future Business Leaders of America Chapter (FBLA) will be collecting donations for Comfort Cases during the month of October and will host a packing party where Comfort Cases will be packed and prepared for use. Please refer to the flyer in this newsletter for details regarding requested donations and the specifics for the packing party venue location. Volunteers will be needed to help organize donations as well as help prepare Comfort Cases for youth entering the foster care system.
