- Approved the proposal from SportSystems to colorcoat and crackfill the tennis courts in Broadlands Station and the Villages
- Approved the draft Reserve Study provided by Miller + Dodson Associates, Inc.
- Approved the 2020 Budget and assessment levels
- Reviewed comments from the Arbors Apartments regarding the assessment increases
- Did not approve a request for donation from Hillside Elementary for tot lot improvements

The holidays are known not only for crisp winter weather, bringing families together, and shopping to your heart's content, but also as a great time to give back to those around you. Giving back comes in many forms. It can be volunteering hours for a nonprofit organization, it might be a donation of toys or clothing or personal hygiene items to those less fortunate or sick, it could be a monetary donation to buy food for those families who rely on school meals to help feed their children. It may be in the form of doing arts and crafts at a nursing home or even adopting a child in need. It could also be as simple as taking an extra moment to be kind to the cashier at the busy retail store who has been worn down by customers all day or allowing the person in line behind you at the grocery store with only one item

when you have a cart full to go in front of you.

Having just spent the weekend at the Comfort Cases packing party, I reflect back on my background of giving

back. As a child, my mother was always involved in our organizations. She gave hours of time to our Temple editing the newsletter; she was a girl scout troop leader; served as an officer for NCJW (National Council of Jewish Women); she was involved with the school PTA; she was the color guard mom; she served as an officer for many years with my pony club; she donated first blood and then platelets to Fairfax Hospital every two weeks; she assisted the polls on election day handing out sample ballots; she pretty much joined in on any volunteer activity when she was called upon and she was nice to strangers she encountered along the way, always greeting them with a smile. So it was instilled in me at a young age that giving back was just something you do.

Fast forward a few decades, I am extremely proud to have initiated the Broadlands Community Outreach, a multifaceted giving back program that has hosted donation drives such as partnering with Women Giving Back to collect prom dresses and to collect snacks to provides Snack Packs to low-income families who rely on school meals to feed their children. We have collected donations of pet food for

the Loudoun County Pet Pantry, hosted the Truck and Pony Day benefiting Sprout Therapeutic Riding Center, collected sneakers in partnership with Keep Loudoun Beautiful, and worked with Briar Woods Swim Teams to fundraise by hosting pool parties and Dive-In Movies at Southern Walk pool. We have recently launched the Plastic Bag Recycling Program, which takes plastic bags that are not otherwise recyclable in single stream recycling and turns them into benches in partnership with Trex which will be donated to local schools. Finally, our largest outreach event is in its third year, Comfort Cases, where Broadlands was proud to partner with Briar Woods FBLA and Willowsford Cares with a goal of packing 1,000 Comfort Cases, showing children in the foster care system that they matter. We collect donations

of various personal items to be packed into a backpack and given to children and teens entering the foster care program.

If you or perhaps

your children had the opportunity to attend any of the speaking events with Comfort Cases founder, Rob Scheer, you know that he preaches empathy and kindness and giving back to the community – the community of mankind. Because we are all in this together. So whether you chose to give back by quietly cleaning up some trash that has blown around the community or you show up to a 250 person packing party, you volunteer at one of our wonderful community events serving thousands of residents or you give an extra smile to the cashier in the checkout line or a few extra dollars in tip to the overworked waitress the next time you eat out, we are all in this together.

We all came into this world the same way and we will all go out some day. In the spirit of this holiday season, please remember to be kind and give back.

Plastic Bag Recycling Program

Drop off plastic materials at the Nature Center. Plastics that can be collected for this program are:

- · grocery bags
- bread bags
- case overwrap (like the plastic over a case of water)
- dry cleaning bags
- produce bags
- ice and wood pellet bags
- newspaper sleeves
- salt bags
- cereal bags (inside of cardboard boxes only)
- Ziploc bags
- other single-use polyethylene plastics with type 2 and 4 symbols.

Swing by the Nature Center to pick up a free Plastic Bag Recycling Program Tote Bag. Supplies are limited.

The plastic bag recycling program will be ongoing and collected daily at the Nature Center at 21907 Claiborne Parkway. Collection bins are located outside and to the right of the front doors of the Nature Center. Please be sure to include **only** the plastic bags referenced and **no trash**. Adding trash will contaminate the containers and therefore making the bin ineligible for recycling.

Speed Limit Concerns

Speeding on residential streets has been an on-going concern in Broadlands. Please note that the maximum speed limit in residential communities is 25 MPH, except on certain through streets. If you have speeding concerns, please contact the LCSO non-emergency number 703-777-1021 regarding speeding in your community.



Parking Reminders

All residents and visitors shall observe and abide by the Broadlands Association, Inc. Parking Regulations and those of State and Loudoun County authorities. Vehicles parked in violation of any such regulations may be towed at the owner's sole risk and expense. **The following are frequently observed violations:**

- Parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant.
- Parking within 10 feet on either side of a mailbox.
- Parking within 20 feet of the intersection of curb lines or, if none, within 15 feet of the intersection of property lines at an intersection.
- Parking along a yellow curb or no parking sign area.
- Vehicles with invalid or expired registration/tags/ inspections.
- Out-of-state vehicles parked, garaged or stored in Loudoun County for 30 days that are not registered with Loudoun County.
- Junk or derelict vehicles (i.e. flat tire, missing wheels, doors, wrecked or smashed body parts, etc.)
- Commercial or recreational vehicles (trucks, campers, boats, etc.) parked in open view.
- Displaying "For Sale" sign on the vehicle on any Private Streets, Roadways or Common Area.
- Parking vehicle without state license or state inspection.

New Events for 2020 at the Nature Center Focus on Community Gatherings Year-Round

For the last three years we have offered campouts every other Friday from May-October. We will still have four community campouts in 2020, but a majority of the community has turned out for the bonfires that occur during the campouts rather than overnighting in a tent. Bonfires can happen year-round even if camping isn't as welcomed in winter months.

For 2020 we will have bonfires with the traditional nature holidays: solstices, equinoxes, and full moons. Make a rhythm of your outdoor celebrations and meet your community gathered around a fire-pit with delicious eats and a sky full of stars:

February 9th - Full Snow Moon

March 9th - Full Worm Moon

March 21st - Spring Equinox

April 7th - Full Pink Moon

May 1st - Beltane/May Day Bonfire and Campout

May 7th - Full Flower Moon

June 5th - Full Strawberry Moon Bonfire and Campout

June 22nd - Summer Solstice

July 5th - Full Buck Moon

July 17th - Bonfire and Campout

August 1st - Autumn Eve/Lammas Bonfire and Campout

September 2nd - Full Corn Moon

September 21st - Autumn Equinox/Feast of Ingathering

October 1st - Full Hunter's Moon

October 31st - Samhain/Halloween and Full Blue Moon

November 30th - Full Beaver Moon

December 22nd - Winter Solstice/Yule

Covenants Corner

Throughout the year, the Covenants Manager routinely inspects homes for a variety of issues ranging from trash containers in open view, parking issues, architectural modifications to leftover holiday décor. In addition, certain seasons dictate the need to focus on particular inspections where violations may occur with high frequency.

This helps preserve the property values for home ownership, promotes community harmony and ensures the high standards of living that our residents have come to expect are maintained.

If any violations of these types are noted, the owner will be mailed a letter providing sixty days for the violation to be resolved. If the violation is not corrected, a second violation letter will be issued, providing an additional fifteen day extension. If the violation remains unresolved, a final notice will be sent, providing seven days to rectify before a Hearing Notice is sent, and a Hearing will be held in accordance with state law, where charges may be assessed, up to \$10/day for a maximum of ninety (90) days.

Plastic Bag Recycling Program FAQs

- * What type of plastic is recyclable under the Plastic Bag Recycling Program? Polyethylene plastic film type material is what we are looking for in this program. These items are generally a softer, somewhat "stretchy" plastic, usually with a less shiny finish. For example, if you were to try to tear a grocery bag or dry-cleaning bag, it would stretch and pull as it tears, giving it a ragged edge. If labeled, it would have a 2 or 4 recycling symbol.
- What type of plastic is not acceptable under the Plastic Bag Recycling Program? Plastics that are harder and "crinkly" that would give a straight finish when torn. Any plastics that have a 1,3,5,6, or 7 recycling symbols. These plastics are made with products that are not accepted in our program.
- * Are plastic bottles, caps and rings on six-pack beverages acceptable? No, these items are a different type of plastic and are not recyclable in this program.
- Cereal bags are included on the list. Does this mean the plastic bags from regular cardboard boxes of cereal and not the plastic bags that some bargain brand cereals come in? Yes, that's correct. Only the plastic bags inside the cardboard cereal bags are acceptable.
- * Are used FoodSaver bags, that have been adequately rinsed out, accepted? No, these bags are made from a polyethylene and nylon blend. The nylon makes them unacceptable.
- Some breads come in regular plastic bread bags but have a stiffer, sort of cellophane-like, inner bag. Are the inner wrappers accepted too? No, the inner cellophane type material is not accepted because it is a different type of plastic.
- Are plastic cat litter and pet food bags accepted? Pet food and cat litter bags are made of a different plastic polymer and are not recyclable in our program. Please do not put pet food and litter bags with the recyclable material in our collection bins. Pet and cat litter bags will contaminate all the other plastic materials that are collected.
- ❖ Can I include hard plastic material with a recycling code of 2 or 4? No, this program is for soft plastic materials only. No hard plastic materials will be accepted, even if they fall under recycling codes 2 and 4.
- ❖ I buy lots of food items at the grocery store in small plastic bags with resealable enclosures, such as the bags shredded cheese comes in. Are these bags acceptable? No, they are not because they do not contain polyethylene. We only accept soft plastic materials that contain polyethylene. Please do not include any plastic bags that are sold with food in them. We cannot accept them and they may contaminate the materials we are collecting.
- Are non-clear LDPE (recycle code 4) bags from new TVs and other electronic equipment accepted? Yes, type 4 plastics are the types we are looking for in this program.
- ❖ Are plastic bags from mulch, fertilizer, or other lawn materials accepted? Mulch bags are too dirty and contaminated to be recycled. It is possible that they could be included if the bags are washed and turned inside out to dry. Many people are not willing to put in the extra work. If you wish to include mulch bags, do not include them with your other plastic materials. Drop them off separately so we may inspect them prior to adding to our collection. Fertilizer and other lawn materials are not included and will contaminate collected materials. Please DO NOT include fertilizer and other lawn materials other than clean and dry mulch bags.
- Where are collection bins located to drop off plastic bag materials? Two collection bins are located on the front porch of the Nature Center at 21907 Claiborne Parkway, Ashburn VA 20148. You can drop materials off 24 hours a day, 7 days a week since the bins are outside.
- Who should I contact if I'm not sure my plastic material is acceptable in the Plastic Bag Recycling program? Call the Broadlands HOA office at 703-729-9704, email us at info@broadlandshoa.com, or reach out to the Community Outreach coordinator at julie@broadlandshoa.com, and we'll get an answer to your question as soon as possible.

Dear Homeowners,

The following pages present the approved 2020 Operating Budget for Broadlands Association, Inc. as approved at the November 2019 Board of Directors Meeting. All budgetary accounts are adjusted for inflation and based on historical precedent. The Board of Directors and Management work diligently to control expenses and generate income to keep assessments as low as possible, while continuing to provide quality services and amenities to the community. The Board of Directors approved a \$1.00 monthly increase in the general assessment, which all homeowners pay to cover all common expenses. The Board also approved a \$1.00 monthly increase for single family homes due to increases in the trash service contract, a \$1.00 monthly increase in single family private streets for road maintenance and snow plowing, and a \$2.00 monthly increase in the courtyard homes due to increases in landscape services.

Prior to the January 1, 2020 payment deadline, please review your payment system to be sure it reflects the correct amount in order to avoid late fees.

Assessment coupons will be mailed to all owners at the address on file with FirstService Residential. If you have not received your coupons by December 15, 2019, please contact Customer Care Call Center at 866-433-3187 or by email at AR.DCMetro@fsresidential.com. If you participate in ClickPay recurring payments (Auto Pay) through FirstService Residential, you will *NOT* receive a coupon booklet, and the 2020 assessments will be automatically deducted from your account.

Owners can make convenient and secure payments online through ClickPay. Payments can be made via e-Check (free) or Credit/Debit Card (fees apply) for a one-time payment or to set up automatic payments, eliminating a missed or late payment and the Association charging a late fee to your account.

To use ClickPay to pay assessments online or to sign up for automatic payments, please visit ClickPay.com/FirstService and create an account using the account number on the payment coupon. Please call 888-354-0135 (option 1) for assistance with ClickPay.

In accordance with the Virginia Property Owners Association Act, Broadlands
Association, Inc. is funding its reserve account at or above the levels recommended in
the November 7, 2019 Replacement Reserve Study completed by Miller + Dodson
Associates, Inc. As of January 1, 2020, the association is projected to hold a combined
\$4,860,052.56 in reserve accounts for common areas and private roads. Broadlands
has budgeted 2020 reserve allocations to be in line with the Reserve Study
recommendations of funding the reserves at a combined total of \$672,422 annually.
The Reserve Study identified 339 items that will require periodic replacement over 40
years that are to be funded from Replacement Reserves and uses the cash flow
funding method. Reserve contributions are made monthly and are administered by an
independent financial advisor who distributes funds into laddered Certificate of Deposits
in accordance with FDIC laws. There is sufficient cash in the accounts to cover the
current funding requirement outlined by the study.

Total Time: 3 Hours, Servings: 6-8

1 3 1/2- to 4-pound pork-loin roast 6 oz pitted dried prunes (about 1 cup)

1 Tbsp olive oil

6 garlic cloves, peeled

1 large onion, quartered

1 cup apple juice

¼ cup cider vinegar

3 Tbsp chili powder

1 Tbsp salt 1 tsp dried oregano

1 cinnamon stick

Make random 1 1/2-inch slits in the pork roast and stuff each with a prune. Heat the olive oil in a Dutch oven over medium-high heat and brown the pork on all sides. Remove the pork from the Dutch oven; set aside. Meanwhile, in a blender, process the garlic cloves until minced. Add the onion and pulse until minced. Heat oven to 325° F. Add the minced garlic and onion to the Dutch oven and sauté until tender but not browned. Add the apple juice, cider vinegar, chili powder, salt, oregano, and cinnamon. Return the pork to the Dutch oven. Over high heat, bring to a boil. Cover and place in oven. Cook 1 1/2 hours, basting occasionally. Remove the cover and cook 30 minutes longer. Remove the pork from the sauce. Set the sauce aside for 10 minutes until fat comes to the surface, skim and discard. Boil the sauce over high heat, stirring occasionally, until thickened and reduced to about 1 1/2 cups. Slice the pork roast and serve with the sauce. Realsimple.com



Cauliflower Gratin with Ham

Total Time: 50 mins, Servings: 6

1 large head cauliflower, cut into florets 1 tsp salt

1/4 cup unsalted butter

3 Tbsp all-purpose flour

1 1/2 cups whole milk

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/8 tsp fresh ground nutmeg

2 large egg yolks

6 ounces smoked ham, diced

1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese

Butter a 2-quart baking dish and sprinkle less than a Tbsp. in bottom. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Boil cauliflower florets for 3-4 minutes until barely softened. Do not overcook. Drain and make the bechamel sauce: Melt the butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add the flour and blend with butter using whisk. Whisk while bubbling for 2 minutes until barely lightly golden. While whisking gradually add milk until smooth. Simmer, whisking continually, until thickened. Add the Parmesan cheese, salt and nutmeg and whisk until smooth. Simmer for a couple of minutes while whisking. Remove from heat and cool for 5 minutes then whisk in the egg yolks followed by diced ham. Add salt and pepper to taste. Place the cauliflower florets in baking dish. Sprinkle with a little salt. Pour the sauce over the cauliflower then even sprinkle over the cheese. Bake uncovered for 30-40 min or until the top is golden and the mixture is bubbly. Let sit for 5 minutes before serving. Unsalted butter for the baking dish

Local Car Tax Is Your Car Registered with Loudoun County?

Loudoun County Commissioner of the Revenue, Robert S. Wertz Jr., wants Loudoun residents to know that Virginia is a personal property tax state where owners of vehicles are required to pay an annual tax based on the vehicle's January 1st value. Residents of Loudoun County are required to register their vehicles, including leased vehicles, with his office within 60 days of locating their motor vehicles, boats and trailers in the County or one of its incorporated towns.

Failure to timely register results in a 10% late filing penalty that is added to the base tax. Liability for taxes begins on the date the vehicle is brought into the County, not the date of registration. In addition to the tax, most vehicles are subject to an annual \$25 vehicle license fee. It is particularly important that residents properly declare their vehicles now since additional fees for failure to comply start next year.

Beginning January 1, 2020, an additional annual license fee of \$100 will be charged to vehicle owners whose vehicles are displaying out-of-state license plates and are not otherwise exempt from obtaining Virginia license plates. An additional \$250 penalty may also be imposed on owners of vehicles that are not registered within 60 days of establishing residency in Virginia.

While the Commissioner receives information on a weekly basis about vehicles registered with the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), new residents and purchasers of new vehicles sometimes don't register their property for local taxes within the required 60-day timeframe or at all. This brief message is intended to let vehicle owners know about local requirements and help them avoid any penalties.

Vehicle owners may register their vehicles with the Commissioner of the Revenue several ways:

- online at loudoun.gov/vehicle-register
- fax a copy of the vehicle registration to 703-777-0263
- in person by providing a copy of the vehicle registration to the Commissioner's Leesburg or Sterling office
- mail a copy of the vehicle registration to the Office of the Commissioner of the Revenue at, P.O. Box 8000, Leesburg, VA 20177
- email an image of the vehicle registration to ppdcor@ loudoun.gov

Please include in the communication the date when the vehicle actually came to Loudoun County, not the date the vehicle was registered with the DMV.

Getting Through Holidays as a Family After a High Conflict Divorce: 4 Tips to Consider

Fall has arrived and so too has the holiday season. This is generally a time for families to come together; to be joyful and thankful and to celebrate with kindness and love. But for many divorced families, the holidays can be a stressful and challenging time. "I love Halloween, but I can't stand sharing it with my ex-husband" and "I don't like that my kids hate going to their father's for Thanksgiving, but what can I do, this is his year" and "Great, so now I am supposed to put a smile on my face for the kids with my ex-wife's new boyfriend at Christmas" are just a few of the comments stated by some the divorced patients I've helped.

And while I fully appreciate the difficult struggles many divorced couples deal with, I encourage my patients who remain in high conflict co-parenting relationships to remember that their children's adjustment and emotional wellbeing should be what is most important – and not just during holidays, but across the entire year.

I offer the following co-parenting tips for divorced parents this holiday season:

- Know your bandwidth: If you are currently in a high conflict relationship with your ex-husband or ex-wife, your capacity to get along over the holidays will be more limited more than if you were in a respectful and loving one. While some divorced couples are able to trick-or-treat together with their children or trade off midnight on Halloween, other divorced couples do not have enough respect and agreement to do so. Holidays for this latter group are oftentimes best managed separately to decrease or avoid problems for the involved children. Knowing what you can and cannot give of yourself in relation to your ex should dictate how actively you co-parent your children during holiday events and activities.
- Plan ahead and communicate things clearly: Planning ahead and communicating are essential ingredients for a strong and successful co-parenting relationship. This is important for divorced couples who are in a state of high conflict since strong, negative emotions can contribute to defensive communication that can escalate into bad moments. Planning ahead and communicating about things clearly is even important for divorced couples who get along well since living separate lives can lead to assumptions and misunderstandings. For example, a patient of mine from several years ago made very expensive travel arrangements for her children and herself for the Christmas week. Unfortunately, her ex-husband had done the same thing. In the end, there were several non-refundable tickets and hotel reservations for one parent, and all of this could have been avoided with better planning and communication.

- Keep or create new family traditions: Some families are able to continue their holiday traditions after divorce, and this can be very healthy. For instance, divorced couples of very young children may wish to be together on Christmas Morning when gifts are being opened under the tree. This co-parenting moment can serve to give younger children the predictability, consistency and closeness that they have always experienced and known with their parents. Thus, listening to your children, or at least considering their needs (developmental and emotional) is a good idea when planning for the holidays as a divorced couple. It is also important to create new family traditions, and this will help your children in redefining their family dynamic. Volunteering, running a 5K, visiting a specific destination annually or visiting extended family are some ideas that can feel good and become the new normal for your children over time.
- Practice Kindness: Children can be very aware of how their parents feel about each other so be mindful of what you say to your ex and how you behave with him or her in the presence of your children. For couples who co-parent actively and with little trouble, practicing kindness is easier to do than for couples who have a more complicated history and possibly ongoing struggles. Regardless of whether you coparent actively or you co-parent minimally due to your situation, remember that children learn some of their most important life lessons from their parents, including how to have a loving relationship with a significant other.

Although children of divorced parents live in two separate homes, it should always be the goal of divorced parents to create two happy homes. And children should always experience their parents as being together for them as mom and dad – especially during important moments. When working with divorced parents in high conflict relationships, I remind them to keep things in perspective; that they will be attending the same graduations and weddings for their children and their children need them to successfully manage those moments – as well as smaller day to day ones – in a respectful and loving way.

The holidays can be an especially challenging time for divorced couples with emotional pain and upset in their past. And, the challenge can be even greater when problems continue. Planning ahead, knowing your limitations, honoring old traditions (and creating new ones) and practicing kindness likely will not make the longstanding struggles you experience in relation to your ex disappear all at once, but these efforts will hopefully make things better for your children in the present and in moving forward.

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Winter Pet Safety

We love our pets, so keeping them safe in the wintertime should be a top priority. See below for some friendly reminders detailing how you can ensure your pet stays warm, happy and out of harm's way even on the dreariest of winter days.

Beware of sidewalk salt and de-icer. Pets' paws are extremely sensitive, so prolonged exposure to sidewalk salt can be problematic. If you walk your dog regularly in areas where sidewalk salt is used during inclement weather, wipe the underside of paws with warm water and a clean towel when you go back inside. Doing so also eliminates risk of ingestion if your pup licks its paws often. Keep an eye on your pet's toe pads for severe dryness, cracking or bleeding. The HOA uses a flat de-icer in order to cut down on the risk to pets, but we cannot control what individual owners put on their sidewalks.

Bring pets indoors. Just as in summer months when temperatures reach extreme highs, pets should be brought inside during extreme wintertime lows. This applies for daytime and nighttime temperatures, so check weather forecasts daily and limit your pup's outside time if the forecast is looking chilly. And remember—if you're uncomfortable with the outside air temperature, chances are your pet is too.

Bundle them up! When pets do go outside during the cold winter months, those with thinner fur coats may need extra warmth. Our local pet stores should have an assortment of extra layers for your dog—even winter boots for pups who need extra paw protection from the cold and ice. Only add layers if your pet can truly benefit. If you're unsure, ask your veterinarian.

Keep your pet active and out of trouble. During inclement weather when you can't make it outside with your pup, set aside some extra time during the day to make sure they have some exercise—even 15 minutes of playtime helps. Paying attention to your pup keeps them engaged and happy, and ensures no bad behavior caused by boredom.



Peventing Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide, or CO, is a poisonous gas that can be particularly dangerous because it is colorless and odorless. Headache, nausea, dizziness and even permanent brain damage or death can occur. Hundreds of people die each year from accidental CO poisoning, many of them while using portable generators during severe weather.

A byproduct of burning fuels such as gasoline, propane, kerosene, natural gas, oil, wood or coal, carbon monoxide is emitted from internal combustion made by engines, like those that power lawn mowers, portable generators, cars, power washers and many household appliances such as furnaces, ranges, fireplaces, water heaters and room heaters. To prevent CO poisoning in your home, be sure to take the following precautions:

- Educate your family about the causes of CO poisoning and how to prevent exposure to this deadly gas.
- Do not use portable generators indoors, including in garages, carports, storage sheds and the like, even with doors and windows open. CO can quickly build to lethal levels in even partially enclosed spaces.
- Do not place pressure washer engines indoors, and, when using pressure washers outdoors, keep engines away from open windows, doors or vents during use, as CO can seep inside through the openings.
- Hire qualified professionals to install new furnaces and appliances and to inspect and service your HVAC system, chimneys and flues.
- Never service fuel-burning appliances without proper knowledge, skills and tools. Always refer to the owners' manual when performing minor adjustments or performing maintenance on fuel-burning equipment.
- Never use portable fuel-burning camping equipment or burn charcoal indoors.
- Never leave a car running in a garage, even with the garage door open.
- Never use your gas oven or clothes dryer to heat your home.
- Never operate unvented fuel-burning appliances in any room where people are sleeping.
- Do not cover the bottom of natural gas or propane ovens with aluminum foil. Doing so blocks the air flow through the appliance and can produce CO.
- Install CO detectors throughout your home, especially in hallways near sleeping areas, and follow the manufacturers' instructions for testing and replacing. Keep detectors unobstructed by furniture or draperies.

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


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
