Challenging Pool Season

As I write this column, we have just closed down the community pools after one of the most unique and challenging seasons in history. Safety measures to slow the spread of the COVID19 pandemic levied stringent constraints on our ability to operate our recreational facilities in any sort of a normal manner. Between collecting waivers, pre-screening, physical distancing requirements, additional cleaning personnel and supplies, occupancy limits, staff and patron safety concerns, and guidelines closing certain parts of the amenities, it was no simple feat to open. Many communities across the country opted to simply keep their aquatic facilities closed for the summer season. However, the Broadlands Board, staff, and contractors were extremely dedicated to doing everything possible to open and, we worked to identify and tackle all of the obstacles to offer as much access to the pools as feasible. We are thrilled we were able to open two of our three aquatic facilities for more than half of the summer, and we did so without breaking the budget.

I know there are residents who would have liked to have seen Summerbrooke Pool open and I absolutely would have as well. Unfortunately, several factors hindered our ability to do so. Staffing shortages

were a very big component and we found it necessary to keep one of our three pools closed. Between travel restrictions from outside countries and quarantines, the availability of local workforce necessary to adequately staff three facilities was limited. In addition to the few dozen lifeguards on rotating schedules provided by High Sierra Pools, the HOA was compelled to hire eight pool assistants to collect waivers, screen patrons, and assist with physical distancing and cleaning between shifts. As it was, when the college students returned to school in August, we were left short staffed on guards and assistants and opted to close the Community Center pool rather than run it on a shoestring staff.

The extra expenses incurred from hiring additional guards and assistants, cleaners, cleaning products, and purchase required signage were offset partially by the delayed opening of Southern Walk and Community Center but largely by keeping Summerbrooke closed for the duration of the season. We pushed to open Southern Walk first, being the largest of the facilities and thereby offering the highest occupancy potential both in the water

It also offered the most lanes for lap swimming when it opened on June 27th under Phase Two Guidelines, which prohibited free swim and allowed for lap swimming only. Since the Virginia Forward Phase Three Guidelines mandates that

splash pads, spray pools, and interactive play features must be closed, the fountains and hoops at Summerbrooke would have remained off had the facility opened. The Community Center has a higher facility load, lap swim capability (in the event we had been dialed back to Phase Two), and offered the recreation pool for sports play, making it the better value for opening.

We are all extremely hopeful that the 2021 season will look much more normal than this one, but who knows what the future will bring. Regardless of what happens, thank you to all who complied with the stringent regulations that allowed us to open at all and I truly hope you enjoyed the opportunity to swim!

Scoop the Poop...



Residents frequently express concern that not everyone is taking the time to pick up their pet's waste in the neighborhood. Please ensure that your family members realize how important it is to be a responsible pet owner:

Dog poop is not organic, especially in the quantities that are generated by pets. It harms the environment and threatens public health.

Forgot your waste bag? No worries! The Broadlands HOA has 80 mutt mitt stations to offer residents. Don't want to carry it with you? No problem, most of our mutt mitt stations have trash cans attached. *Please be a good neighbor and do not dispose of dog waste in your neighbors' trash cans during your walks.*

Even if your dog poops in the woods, you still need to clean it up. Not only is it unsightly, it can get into streams and into the water supply.

It's the law! Is it a violation of the Association Declaration, Article 8, Section 8.2(q) to not pick up your pet's waste, it is also a county ordinance violation. Please reference Loudoun County Ordinance, Chapter 612.19, Section a (9) Dog waste.

Feeling Political?

Per Broadlands guidelines, no more than three political campaign election signs are allowed and each sign shall not exceed a maximum of four (4) square feet.

These signs may be placed no more than 60 days prior to an election date and must be removed 5 days following the election. No application is required for these signs.

Residents Must Apply for Tree Removal!

It has been reported that tree companies are driving through Broadlands looking for trees to remove from resident properties claiming that their company was referenced on the HOA website as an approved company for executing tree removal. The HOA does not endorse or give blanket approval for tree removal companies.

Approval is required to remove any tree either dead or alive whose trunk measures 4" or more in diameter when measured at the height of 4' from the ground.

Covenants Corner Violations

In March, we suspended the issuance of routine covenants violation letters due to the COVID19 pandemic. Financial hardship, economic insecurity, job instability, school uncertainty, and safety unpredictability all made for several months of facing an unknown future. While routine inspections continued and the issuance of health and egregious issues were addressed, routine violations were postponed until further notice.

As we enter month eight of the pandemic's impact on our area, the HOA has deemed it necessary to cautiously reinstate our violations process for routine violations. We will return to following our Policies and Procedures Regarding Violations of the Governing Documents for items such as mailboxes needing replacement, shutters missing, trim needing paint touch up, mildew on siding and stairs, and we will be pursuing trash cans stored in view and holding Hearings before the Board of Directors. In addition, now that the Department of Motor Vehicles has reopened, we will now resume ticketing for expired tags and expired inspection stickers. Please make every effort to make sure that your tags and inspections are current.

We are keenly aware that many residents remain economically distressed by this unprecedented pandemic. If you receive a violation letter and are facing circumstances that prevent you from addressing the violation, we ask that you reach out to our office so that we may work with you on a mutually agreeable resolution, which may be in the form of a delay of enforcement. We are acutely aware of the perception that enforcement procedures have under these circumstances, but also have a duty to preserve

property values by enforcing standards of maintenance.

We appreciate your patience and thank you all for your understanding as we work through these difficult times.

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Are You Selling Your Home?

Save yourself time and aggravation by ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, fence/ deck repair, any staining touch up, or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidentally placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

When you sell your home you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer. Once the request has been executed, it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, that are not in compliance and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the owner's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If the violations are not rectified before settlement, then the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, broadlandshoa.org, to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. A Note from Supervisor Glass

Dear Broadlands Residents,

Over the summer I received many inquiries regarding pedestrian safety while crossing roadways such as Claiborne Parkway, Broadlands Boulevard, Wynridge Drive, Waxpool Road, and Truro Parish Drive. On July 1, a new Virginia law came into effect governing how vehicles should respond when a pedestrian is trying to cross a roadway. Below is a portion of the written law and a Q&A format to answer some commonly asked questions about pedestrian and vehicular movements.

Code of Virginia § 46.2-924. *Drivers to stop for pedestrians; installation of certain signs:*

A. The driver of any vehicle on a highway shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian crossing such highway by stopping and remaining stopped until such pedestrian has passed the lane in which the vehicle is stopped:

- 1. At any clearly marked crosswalk, whether at midblock or at the end of any block;
- 2. At any regular pedestrian crossing included in the prolongation of the lateral boundary lines of the adjacent sidewalk at the end of a block; or
- 3. At any intersection when the driver is approaching on a highway where the speed limit is not more than 35 miles per hour.

B. When a vehicle is stopped pursuant to subsection A, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from an adjacent lane or from behind the stopped vehicle shall not overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.

C. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection A, at intersections or crosswalks where the movement of traffic is being regulated by law-enforcement officers or traffic control devices, the driver shall yield according to the direction of the law-enforcement officer or device.

- No pedestrian shall enter or cross an intersection in disregard of approaching traffic.
- The drivers of vehicles entering, crossing, or turning at intersections shall change their course, slow down, or stop if necessary to permit pedestrians to cross such intersections safely and expeditiously.
- Pedestrians crossing highways at intersections shall at all times have the right-of-way over vehicles making turns into the highways being crossed by the pedestrians.

Do pedestrians always have the right-of-way over vehicles?

No. Pedestrians only have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks and at intersections on a roadway that has a speed limit less than 35 mph. If a crosswalk is signalized or pedestrian movements are controlled by "stop" and/



or "walk" signs, then pedestrians must follow the controls of the signal.

Does every intersection have a de facto crosswalk? Partially. Every intersection acts as if there is a painted crosswalk and is a desired location for pedestrians to cross. However, vehicles are only required to stop for pedestrians at an intersection if the roadway has a speed limit of 35 mph or less.

Do cars have to stop for me when I am crossing at a crosswalk?

Yes. However, that does not mean all cars will stop for you, so you should check your surroundings before crossing.

Can I "make traffic stop for me" when crossing at an intersection or crosswalk?

No. You cannot cross while disregarding oncoming traffic; you must wait for vehicles to stop or for a safe break in the traffic flow.

Do I have to stop for pedestrians and cyclists at the W&OD Trail crossing on Ashburn Road?

No. The users of the bike path are required to stop and wait for traffic to clear since the bike path has the stop signs, not the vehicles.

Can crosswalks be installed at more intersections along Claiborne, Broadlands, Wynridge, Truro Parish, and Waxpool?

VDOT does not recommend installing crosswalks along roadways such as the ones listed because they historically have given pedestrians a false sense of security when crossing. Pedestrians tend to believe that if there is a crosswalk, traffic will always stop for *Supervisor Glass continued on page 16*

Canines-N-Kids' BARKE SALES Give Kids an Outdoor, Safer Way to Raise Funds to Beat Cancers Shared by Kids and Dogs Tool Kit with Social Distancing Tips Offered Submitted By: Shawn Flaherty

For kids and families looking for a fun and safer way to give back this year, the Canines-N-Kids Foundation (CNK), a nonprofit working to put an end to the cancers kids and man's best friend both develop, is encouraging them to host a BARKE SALE and is providing a tool kit with step-by-step instructions that include social distancing tips. Using the traditional bake sale model, a BARKE SALE enables kids anywhere to raise awareness and funds for cancer research that can speed up the development of better medicines and a cure for both by offering tasty treats.

"By organizing a BARKE SALE, kids are empowered to help other kids and their pet friends beat cancer," said Ulrike Szalay, executive director and founder of Canines-N-Kids. "During this COVID-19 era, we want to encourage kids to sell pet treats—using social distancing and masks-to help raise needed research funds as well as awareness about how dogs and children share many of the same cancers."

The Canines-N-Kids' BARKE SALE generally features goodies for people and pets; but given the pandemic, CNK is encouraging BARKE SALEs to only include pet treats this year and to conduct them in a driveway or sidewalk close to home, instead of at commercial areas. Also, masks and social distancing are encouraged. CNK offers a free online BARKE SALE kit containing flyers, postcards and a step-by-step instruction guide. Or, for a small fee, there is a "BARKE SALE in a Box," a turnkey toolkit which includes everything from the online kit as well as cookie cutters, a poster, recipes, stickers and more. Both versions of the kit also include tips for having a BARKE SALE during a pandemic as well as paw graphics that can be taped to the sidewalk to keep customers spaced six feet apart. Those interested in holding a BARKE SALE need to register on the CNK's website—CaninesNKids.org—to receive their supplies.

According to the American Cancer Society, cancer is the number one cause of disease-related death in children. Nearly 16,000 children in the US will be diagnosed with cancer this year and yet only four drugs have been approved for kids' cancers the past 40 years. For the six million canine patients diagnosed with cancer each year, the outlook is no better. Nearly half of all canines die from cancer. Several cancers develop in both kids and man's best friend such as bone cancer, brain cancer, lymphoma and leukemia. In many cases, these cancers are biologically similar or even indistinguishable between kids and dogs, and also far more prevalent in man's best friend.

Funds raised through a BARKE SALE will support the Foundation's work to promote the promising science

> of comparative oncology – studying and treating spontaneously developing cancer in canine patients when they get sick. The research can help doctors better understand and accelerate the development of better medicines and a cure for kids with those same cancers.

Asphalt Repaving Project in the Community

Resident cooperation is required during construction!

The Board of Directors for Broadlands Association has contracted with Finley Asphalt & Concrete to repave your street.

This work will require the cooperation of all residents. While we understand this will be an inconvenience, road maintenance is essential. This project will be phased and will take place according to the schedule listed below (weather permitting).

- 1) Your street will be closed daily from 7:30am to 6:30pm. You may walk on sidewalks during this time.
- 2) You may drive on the road between 6:30pm and 7:30am, but please be aware this is a construction zone and will be dusty.
- 3) Parking or driving on the road is prohibited during construction hours. If your vehicle is not removed from common area parking spaces by 7:30am each workday, your vehicle will be relocated by tow truck to a nearby parking lot within the association, most likely the Southern Walk Pool parking lot.
- 4) Please refer to the schedule and plan to park your vehicle on a road or common area parking space that is not being paved in the same phase as yours if you need your vehicle during paving hours.
- 5) If you store your vehicle in your garage/driveway, for the safety of you and the crews, you will not be permitted to remove your vehicle from the garage/driveway after the parking lot has been closed at 7:30am.

PLEASE REMOVE CARS FROM DRIVEWAYS OR GARAGES IF YOU ARE GOING TO NEED TO USE THEM WHILE YOUR STREET IS CLOSED.

- 6) Common area parking spaces will be re-striped following repaving.
- 7) Trash and recycling may be placed out for collection on a normal collection schedule, by 6:00am on pickup days. We will alert the trash company to early pickups needed on workdays and make every effort to have refuse picked up before paving activities commence.
- 8) Mail delivery can be completed if the carrier is able to walk in and drop the mail off, however, some carrier services may not be able to deliver mail and packages due to road closures unless they are willing to walk in. Please contact your carrier to inquire.
- 9) If the contractor is unable to complete the area as scheduled due to inclement weather, the area(s) will *Repaving continued on page 23*

Making Friends with the Hummingbirds Source: Plant NOVA Natives

Fall is a great time to work on the guest list for next year's garden party. Hummingbirds make some of the best guests of all, or to put it more accurately, we can make ourselves better guests of them by providing what they need around their homes, otherwise known as our yards. Our local Ruby-throated Hummingbirds are migratory, departing Virginia in September for Central America and returning to the place they were born in mid-April. It will not surprise anyone to know that what they need when they arrive back is not sugar water but an intact ecosystem that provides food and shelter for them and their offspring.

It is well known and indeed true that hummingbirds are attracted to bright colors, especially red, so for viewing opportunities, do plant Eastern Red Columbine and Coral Honeysuckle for spring blooms, Scarlet Beebalm for early summer and Cardinal Flower for late summer. It is fun to watch the hummingbirds make the rounds from plant to plant, timing it exactly to when the nectar has had a chance to re-accumulate. All of these plants co-evolved with hummingbirds and have the tubular-shaped red flowers that fit the bill – literally. Hummingbirds have incredible memories and know the location of individual flowers not only around their own homes but along the thousands of miles of their migration routes. They also recognize humans as individuals, learning to trust you and hovering in front of you when they are wondering when you are going to refill their feeder, if you have been in the habit of providing one.

Although we think of hummingbirds as nectar eaters, the great majority of their diet is made up of insects and spiders. We can provide them with insects by planting native plants. Because most insects can only eat the plants with which they evolved, a yard full of European and Asian plants such as turf grass and Japanese azaleas is largely an empty yard, devoid of food sources not only for hummingbirds but for songbirds in general. The redflowering plants that were named above are all native to our area, as are hundreds of other garden-worthy plants which are increasingly being planted in our yards as Virginians start to recognize the beauty of our own flora as well as its value for the non-human residents of our properties.

The ideal time to plant is in the fall, which gives the plants a chance to become well established before facing the heat and droughts of summer. To help you plan, the Plant NOVA Natives website has a plant finder function in which you can search specifically for plants that attract hummingbirds. There are also lists of local garden centers that specialize in native plants as well as lists of conventional garden centers where Plant NOVA Natives volunteers are labeling the natives with red stickers. Just for fun, check out our silly one minute video of local hummingbirds and other critters interacting with native plants. And when your neighbors stop by to gawk at the sight of hummingbirds in your yard, you can give them this pamphlet so they can learn about planting natives in their yards to attract hummingbird, too.

them and that the crosswalk's location is a safe place to cross; these are not always the case.

In short, on Broadlands Boulevard (45 mph), traffic is only required to stop for pedestrians if they are crossing at the Clyde's/Chickacoan Trail Drive crosswalk. On Wynridge Drive (35 mph), traffic is required to stop for pedestrians at all intersections and at the Stillwater/Southern Walk crosswalk. However, since Wynridge is such a wide and heavily travelled roadway, traffic most likely will not stop. At all other intersections on Broadlands, Claiborne, Truro Parish, and Waxpool, traffic is NOT required to stop to allow pedestrians to cross.

Even though vehicles are required to stop at certain locations to allow pedestrians to cross, it is still a hazard to have traffic slow down or stop on such major roadways as Broadlands and Wynridge. Rear-end collisions are common whenever leading vehicles come to an unexpected stop. In conclusion, when driving on Claiborne, Wynridge, Truro Parish, Waxpool, and Broadlands, make sure to keep an eye out for children and adults crossing the roadways and for other cars that may be stopped. If another driver is stopping or doing something unusual, there may be a reason for it. Additionally, when crossing these roadways as a pedestrian, make sure to only cross when it is safe and do not impede the flow of traffic.

Pedestrians and vehicles will always be in conflict on these roadways, but we as a community can work together to make sure we are all driving and crossing safely.

Savory Skillet Dishes

One Skillet French Onion Tater Tot Casserole

Total Time: 1 hour Servings: 6

2 tablespoons salted butter

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2-3 medium yellow onions, thinly sliced
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 1-pound lean ground turkey, chicken, or beef
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or grated
- 2 red bell peppers, chopped

2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves (or 2 tsp dried thyme)

2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley (or 2 tsp dried parsley) Kosher salt and black pepper

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour or gluten-free flour blend

1/4 cup low sodium soy sauce

1 tablespoon

Worcestershire sauce 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 cup shredded gruyere

cheese

2 pounds frozen tater tots 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Fresh chives, for topping (optional)

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees f. In a large oven safe skillet, melt the butter, olive oil, and onions together. Cook, stirring occasionally until softened, about 5 minutes. At this point, you want to slowly add 1/2 cup of the wine, 1/4 cup at a time, until the wine cooks into the onions. Continue to cook another 8-10 minutes until you've used the 1/2 cup of wine and the onions are deeply caramelized. Push the onions to the side of the pan and stir in the meat, bell pepper, garlic, thyme, parsley, cayenne, and season with salt and pepper. Cook, breaking up the meat as it cooks, another 5 minutes until the meat is browned. Stir in the flour and cook another minute. Add the remaining 1/2 cup wine, soy sauce, worcestershire sauce, and 1 cup of water. Bring to a boil and simmer until thickened 3-5 minutes. Remove from the heat and sprinkle the gruyere cheese overtop the meat. Arrange the tater tots on top of the cheese. Transfer to the oven and bake 20 minutes, until the tots are golden. Sprinkle the cheddar over the tater tots, return to the oven. Bake another 10-15 minutes, until the cheese is melted. Serve topped as desired with fresh thyme and chives. Side Notes: For crispier tater tots, cook ahead on baking sheet separately for about 15 minutes, then transfer to top of casserole dish and cook as directed. To make vegetarian: instead of using 1 pound of meat, use 3 cups of finely chopped mushrooms (can be any variety or a mix of varieties) plus 1 cup of finely chopped cauliflower (or use an additional cup of mushrooms). Sauté the vegetables as directed to do so for the meat. The cooking times should be very similar, if not the same. Halfbakedharvest.com

Cauliflower and Cheese with Spicy Breadcrumbs

Total Time: 30 minutes Servings: 6

- 1 large head cauliflower, cut into florets (about 3 cups)
- 4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- Kosher salt and black pepper
- 3 ounces prosciutto (omit if vegetarian)
- 1 cup finely torn ciabatta or sourdough bread
- 2 tablespoons fresh oregano leaves
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 2 tablespoons salted butter
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour (or all-purpose gf flour)
- 1/2-1 teaspoon chipotle chili powder to your taste
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 cup shredded gouda cheese
- 2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves

Preheat oven to 425 degrees f. On a baking sheet, toss the cauliflower, 2 tablespoons olive oil, paprika, and a pinch each of salt and pepper. Push the cauliflower to one side of the pan. On the other side, toss the bread, with 2 tablespoons olive oil, oregano, and a pinch of salt. Lay the prosciutto around the bread. Transfer to the oven and bake for 10 minutes, until the prosciutto is crisp. Remove from the oven, then remove the bread and prosciutto. Return the cauliflower to the oven and bake another 5-10 minutes, until just tender. Crumble the bread/prosciutto into fine crumbs using your fingers or pulse in a food processor. Toss with red pepper flakes. Set aside. Meanwhile, make the cheese sauce. Melt the butter in a medium skillet over medium heat. Whisk in the flour, chipotle chili powder, and onion powder. Cook 1 minute. Slowly add the milk, whisking until combined. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to a low boil. Stir in the cheeses. Add the cauliflower and toss. Cook another 3-5 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in the thyme. Serve the cauliflower topped with breadcrumbs. Halfbakedharvest.com

JK Community Farm Offers Field Trips to Enhance Distance Learnings

The JK Community Farm, a 150-acre farm in Purcellville, Virginia that grows crops and livestock and donates them to nonprofits to alleviate hunger, will supplement distance learning by providing a field trip program. Groups will be able to take self-guided tours with tailored programming tied to Virginia Standards of Learning to teach about farming and nutrition.

"We are excited to provide an active, handson educational opportunity that exposes kids to farming, nutrition and philanthropy. It's especially rewarding that our field trips give parents and students an alternative 'classroom' that can expand kids' learning in a safe environment," explained Samantha Kuhn, Executive Director, JK Community Farm.

As part of the field trip program, the nation's largest nonprofit community farm is providing activity guides for each grade level and a food education workbook, designed by Jackson Walker Design Group and funded by the Junior League of Northern Virginia, that can be downloaded from the Farm's website. The field trips help parents get their students outside to learn and provide handson activities to help students make connections between what they are learning in school and the natural world.

The guides are tied into Virginia's math, science, health, PE, English, and history/social science Standards of Learning. Examples of activities include finding Farmer Mike to learn more about the farm, going to the greenhouse and identifying the parts of a plant, and using the Farm's sundial to learn about time. Activities will be updated for each season.

Field trips are offered on Mondays since Loudoun County Schools are closed on Mondays during the pandemic for independent learning. Parents and groups can sign-up on the Farm's website under the volunteer page. Thirty slots are available in hour increments from 9:00am-12:00pm. Social distancing is encouraged and masks are required when close to other people. A minimum donation of \$5.00 per student will help cover the cost of materials and support the Farm's work.

JK Community Farm, a 501(c)3 nonprofit started

in 2018 with the support of JK Moving Services, seeks to have a lasting and healthy impact on struggling families within the



DC region by growing and donating 100% of its chemical free, healthy produce and protein to those struggling with food insecurity. This year's harvest goal of 135,000 pounds will provide the equivalent of 108,000 meals to those in need. LC-CFRS Ramping Up Smoke Alarm Program to Protect Loudoun Residents

As our community deals with the new dangers posed by COVID-19, the Loudoun County Combined Fire and Rescue System reminds residents to stay protected from other hazards around your home including deadly home fires.

According to the National Fire Protection Agency, every 24 seconds, a fire department in the United States responds to a fire. These statistics demonstrate that fires continue to be a formidable threat and we must protect ourselves. Having working smoke alarms, properly located on each floor of your home, is the best way to alert you and your family to a fire and allow you time to get to safety. During a house fire, you have an average of *THREE* minutes to escape your home," said Fire Chief Keith Johnson. "Smoke Alarms are crucial to providing you that precious time to escape and actually reduce the risk of dying in a fire by half!"

Firefighters will be canvasing the Broadlands community on *Saturday October 3, 2020, between 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.* and offering free smoke alarm assessments and fire safety information. During the assessment, firefighters will test existing smoke alarms, assist with battery replacement, ensure the alarms are less than the ten year recommended lifespan, and provide valuable information about home escape planning and fire safety. To temper the risks associated with COVID-19, first responders will practice social distancing, wear face coverings, and will ensure no one in the home is suffering from any flu-like symptoms prior to entering a residence.

Loudoun residents can request a smoke alarm assessment at any time by completing the online smoke alarm assessment request form at loudoun.gov/ smokealarms or by calling the smoke alarms program hotline at 703-737-8093.

Not sure if you need a smoke alarm assessment? To ensure smoke alarms are operating properly, LC-CFRS recommends citizens follow these safety tips:

- Test the smoke alarm each month by pressing and holding the test button.
- Replace batteries based on manufacturer's recommendations or sooner if it begins to chirp. Some alarms need a battery replacement each year, other alarms have a long life battery that lasts several years.

- Replace smoke alarms after 10 years. Check the manufacture date on the back of the alarm, 10 years after that date they should be replaced.
- For the best protection, smoke alarms should be located on the ceiling on every level, outside sleeping areas and inside each bedroom.
- It is also recommended that smoke alarms are hardwired and interconnected, when possible.

Cooking Safety

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and offers relaxation. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries?

By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Never leave cooking food on the stovetop unattended, and keep a close eye on food cooking inside the oven.
- Keep children and pets away from cooking areas by creating a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the stove.
- Remove anything that can catch fire Oven mitts, dish towels, food packaging, or curtains away from your stovetop.

If you do have a fire...

- If you have a small grease fire in the pan, put on an oven mitt and smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- If it is in oven, turn off the heat and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you and your clothing.
- If it is in microwave, turn off the power and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you and your clothing.

And with any fire, Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 when safely outside the structure.
