### **Fall Projects**

Fall is a busy season in Broadlands with back to school, sports, travel, and holiday preparations for Thanksgiving, Chanukah, Diwali, Ramadan, Kwanzaa, Christmas, Winter Solstice, Santa Lucia Day, Three Kings Day, New Year's Eve, New Year's Day, Chinese New Year, and perhaps others.

Shorter days mean cramming in more outdoor activities during fewer daytime hours and this bustle is no different for your HOA office. While the pools have closed and been winterized and the long days and nights filled with summer concerts and float nights are now dark and crisp, we still keep occupied with events, inspections, rentals, and lots of special projects. We haven't quite hunkered down for snow just yet, but we've got plenty to stay busy wrapping up everything before year end.

The trail system in Broadlands is extensive and requires much maintenance and upkeep. Several portions of trail were moved up on the reserve schedule so that they could be repaired from damage from tree roots, settling, flooding, and other elements. The county and Loudoun Water even suffered damage to one of their storm and water sewers under a section of trail, and we've been waiting patiently for those repairs to be completed. We are hopeful that they are done before our paving work early this month so that we can combine that area into our existing contract.

Fall also brings budget season, which finds the staff hustling to put together an accurate budget to present to the Board for approval. We track down everything from projected utility costs for our various facilities to changes in maintenance contracts and needs. From projecting staffing needs for the upcoming year to anticipating both capital and reserve projects. Increases in minimum wage, fuel prices, vehicles, labor shortages, parts shortages and inflation have led to significant increases all over the board these past few years. This year we bid out major contracts like grounds maintenance and renegotiated our financial management contract to ensure we continue to receive the best value for your assessments. Staff ruthlessly analyzes the operations and works to locate cost savings to make better use out of your hard-earned money and the Board thoroughly reviews the details to be sure we are protecting your most valuable asset: your home. *The budget process takes months of planning and research, but in the end, I am confident that all parties involved have put together the best and most realistic budget in anticipation of expenses for the following year.* 

As we prepare for winter, I hope you all take a moment to stop and take in a breath of the crisp air, clear dark skies, and enjoy the beauty of the fall colors. The holidays will be upon us before we know it.

Per Article 7, Section 7.5 (a) Additions, Alterations, or Improvements by the Owners - "No person shall make any addition, alteration, or improvement in or to any Lot or any portion of the Property... which is visible from the exterior of the Lot or such portion of the Property, without the prior written consent of the Covenants Committee."

If you are unsure if approval is required for your project, contact Robin Crews, Modifications/Resale Manager at rcrews@broadlandshoa.com or 703-729-9704, option 3. The Committee meets virtually at 7:00pm on the first and third Wednesdays of the month March-October and the third week of the month November-February. *If you wish to attend a meeting, contact Robin Crew, rcrews@ broadlandshoa.com.* Applications must be submitted by noon on the Wednesday before the meeting by emailing them to rcrews@broadlandshoa.com or delivering them to the Nature Center drop box at 21907 Claiborne Parkway.

Please review the Design Guidelines and submission requirements at broadlandshoa.org/ design-guidelines. Failure to include all required information will delay review of your application. Once the Committee has reached a decision, the results will be delivered via email. If an email address is not provided, results will be mailed. Emails will be sent from no-reply@smartwebs365.com should you wish to add this email address to your contact list to ensure prompt delivery. Please check your inbox and junk/spam folders or contact the HOA office at 703-729-9704, option 3 if you have not received your results within 10 days following the meeting.

### Are You Selling Your Home?

Save yourself time and aggravation by ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, fence/ deck repair, any staining touch up, or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidentally placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

When you sell your home you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer. Once the request has been executed, it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, that are not in compliance and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the seller's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If the violations are not rectified before settlement, then the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, broadlandshoa.org, to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. 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### An Application is Required for Exterior Light Fixtures

Approval is required for any lighting fixtures or replacements that differ in style, size or color from the original builder installed fixtures.

According to the lighting design guidelines: "All exterior lighting fixtures on the same elevation of the house must be of similar style, size and color." For example, front door fixtures, garage door fixtures including the pole light fixture must all match in style, size and color.

Please refer to the lighting design guidelines for more details and submission requirements at broadlandshoa.org. Click on "Design Guidelines" tab from the homepage.

### Revised Sign Design Guidelines

Sign design guidelines have been updated to allow for "No Dog Pooping" & "No Trespassing" signs each not exceeding a total of 64 square inches. These signs do not require an application:

• Security Signs, No Trespassing Signs, and Animal Control signs: Two signs, each not exceeding a total of sixtyfour (64) square inches may be posted on the property. No application is required for these signs.

• They must not be placed in the right of way.

### **Modification Guidelines**

Before you make any modification change or addition to the exterior of your home, an application is required for the Modifications Subcommittee to review. Please refer to Design Guidelines (Modifications), broadlandshoa. org/for-residents/design-guidelines/, for more details and submission requirements.

### **Feeling Political?**

Per Broadlands guidelines no more than three political campaign election signs are allowed and each sign shall not exceed a maximum of four (4) square feet. These signs may be placed no more than 60 days prior to an election date and must be removed 7 days following the election. No application is required for these signs.

Political signs or political flags shall not be displayed on Common Area. Lighted political signs or political flags shall not be displayed on any lot. Political signs or political flags that contain profane language or graphics shall not be displayed on any lot.

### Patriot Disposal Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste Collection Schedule

### Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste Collection:

- Place toters out the night before collection day after 6:00pm or before 6:00am the day of pick up.
- Containers should be out of sight by 9:00am on the day following collection.

### **Trash Collection:**

• Trash pick up days are Mondays and Thursdays.

### **Recycling Collection:**

- Recycling pick up day is Thursdays.
- Recyclable materials can be co-mingled.
- Plastic bags CANNOT be recycled. The Nature Center collects bags for proper recycling. Visit broadlandshoa.org, click on RESIDENTS then click on TRASH & RECYCLING for more information.
- Scrap metal Please call Patriot Disposal to set pick-up day 1-703-257-7100: i.e. foil, pie tins, trays, pots and pans, small car parts, grills, bicycles, swings, etc.

### **Yard Waste Collection:**

- Yard Waste Collection occurs on Mondays from March 1st through December 24th.
- During January & February, yard debris (leaves, grass clippings, brush) may be mixed with trash. Yard waste may not be mixed with recycling.
- Grass clippings and leaves must be set out for pickup in lawn paper bags or in a bin.
- Brush must be less than 4 inches in diameter, cut into 4 foot lengths, and tied in small bundles or bagged.
- Food waste mixed in with yard waste will be accepted, as it can be composted.

### **Special Pick-ups:**

- Please contact Patriot Disposal, 1-703-257-7100 or customerservice@patriotdisposalservices.com, to arrange pickup of special and/or bulk items.
- Special items will be collected weekly. Some items may incur an additional charge.
- Special items include appliances, mid to large furniture and other large items.

### **Covenants Corner** November Inspections

During this time of year, we are all feeling the autumnal coolness in the air and fall foliage is beginning to drop. Inside our homes, we are probably housecleaning in preparation for winter and a wonderful fall season. At this time of year, don't forget house cleaning on the outside of your homes is just as important as the inside.

To assist you with with your outside winter preparation, here are some tips to help keep your home looking as good on the outside and as in the inside:

- Cleanup your flower beds and trim back your bushes and trees.
- Leaves will be falling soon so please keep your yard tidy by raking and bagging them or lawn mowing them into mulch. Also, it is very important that you keep any storm drains in front of your home leaf and debris free.
- Make sure that your mailbox is in good shape. If your mailbox post needs a bit of TLC, give it a coat of fresh stain with an HOA approved color or replace the post with a new one. You may wish to use Main Street Mailboxes, 571-379-8454.
- Touch up paint and replace missing shutters and trim on your home.
- Clean mildew or dirt off of your siding.

The HOA is doing our part. We have worked diligently to locate any limbs and branches blocking sidewalks and street signs and to notify homeowners of the outstanding issues. If you still see any of these issues, please contact our office at 703-520-9903 so that we may get them resolved.

Beginning November 7th, we will start night time inspections of homeowners' exterior pole lights to make sure they are in working order. Please check your lights and replace any burned out bulbs. If they still do not work, you may need to replace the light sensor on the pole or make sure the circuit breaker (dedicated switch) to the pole light is working. If all else fails, it may be time to call the electrician.

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### Please Keep Common Areas Clean

Under Article 8, Section 8.2: (e) of the Declarations "No person shall place or cause or permit anything to be placed on or in any of the Common Area. Nothing shall be altered or constructed in or removed from the Common Area..."

- Please do not leave any personal items or items not intended by the HOA in the common areas. Our landscapers have been directed to remove and discard debris of all kinds from the common areas including forts. If any items are removed by the HOA they cannot be recovered.
- Additionally, do not discard any yard debris in the common areas such as leaves, branches, grass clippings, etc. You will be responsible to remove any yard debris if placed in the common area.
- Do not dump rubbish, waste matter, refuse, garbage, trash, dead animals or other debris of any kind. You will be responsible to remove any debris if placed in the common area.

### **Broadlands Fitness Center**

Broadlands Residents are invited to join the Broadlands Fitness Center located at 43360 Rickenbacker Square.

The Fitness Center includes: 5 treadmills, 4 elliptical, 5 strength machines, 2 stationary bikes, 2 multifunctional weight trainers, and a row machine.

### Scoop the Poop...

Residents frequently express concern that not every pet owner is taking the time to pick up their pet's waste in the neighborhood. Please ensure that your family members realize how important it is to be a responsible pet owner:

**Pet poop is not organic**, especially in the quantities that are generated by pets. It harms the environment and threatens public health.

Forgot your waste bag? No worries! The Broadlands HOA has over 80 mutt mitt stations to offer residents. Don't want to carry it with you? No problem, most of our mutt mitt stations have trash cans attached. *Please be a good neighbor and do not dispose of pet waste in your neighbors' trash cans during your walks.* 

Even if your pet poops in the woods, you still need to clean it up. Not only is it unsightly, it can get into streams and into the water supply.

It's the law! Is it a violation of the Association Declaration, Article 8, Section 8.2(q) to not pick up your pet's waste, it is also a county ordinance violation. Please reference Loudoun County Ordinance, Chapter 612.19, Section a (9) Dog waste.



### **Renting - Important Information for Landlords**

If you are an owner who leases your unit, we'd like to make the leasing experience successful and positive for everyone by informing you of your responsibilities. This will help preserve your property value specifically and maintain property values in general.

Your tenants may not be familiar with common-interest community living. Please take a few minutes to explain to them that living in a community association is very different from living in a rental apartment community. Specifically, your tenants, like all residents, are subject to the rules and regulations of the association, and it's up to you to educate them and see that they comply. We recommend you provide your tenants with written copies of all policies and rules and advise them on the proper use of the association's facilities. You can obtain copies of these and other useful documents online. FirstService Connect has copies of the recorded documents (Bylaws, Articles of Incorporation, and Declaration). The Broadlands Association website has copies of all policies and Design Guidelines, but not the recorded documents.

We strongly recommend that you have a written lease agreement with your tenant. As a lessor (landlord) of a home in a community association, the lease you use should require tenants to comply with the association's governing documents. In the event your tenant fails to comply with these documents, including the bylaws, declaration, and rules and regulations, a representative of the association will contact you in an attempt to remedy the problem. Both you and your tenants will receive a copy of the notice. If the violation is not corrected, the process will be escalated with additional letters, and ultimately a charge could be placed on your account for failure to comply with association guidelines.

### Follow these simple steps and you, the tenants and the association will all have a positive community association living experience:

- Provide your tenants with copies of association rules.
- Educate tenants about the need to follow association rules, and see that they comply.
- Advise tenants on the proper use of association facilities.
- Use a written lease agreement.
- Make sure your lease requires tenants to comply with all association governing documents.
- Provide the association with contact information for you and your tenants. Complete an absentee owner statement (AOS) and submit with a copy of the lease to the HOA at info@broadlandshoa.com.

**Renters:** If you do not have a copy of the association rules or you'd like more information about the association, please contact the owner. Many policies can also be found on the association website at broadlandshoa.org.

### White Scale On Crepe Myrtles – How To Treat Crepe Myrtle Bark Scales By: Mary H. Dyer, Credentialed Garden Writer

What is bark scale on crepe myrtles? Crepe myrtle bark scale is a relatively recent pest that is affecting crepe myrtle trees in a growing area across the

southeastern United States. According to Texas AgriLife Extension, this harmful pest is newly introduced from the Far East.

#### White Scale on Crepe Myrtles

Adult white scale is a tiny gray or whitish pest easily identified by its waxy, crust-like covering. It can appear anywhere but is often seen on branch crotches or near pruning wounds. If you look closely under the waxy covering, you may notice clusters of pink eggs or tiny nymphs, which are known as "crawlers." Female pests exude a pinkish liquid when crushed.

#### How to Treat Crepe Myrtle Bark Scale

Crepe myrtle bark scale treatment may require several different techniques, and management of the pest requires persistence.

Scrub the pests away – It may sound odd but scrubbing the tree will remove many of the pests, thus making other treatment more effective. Scrubbing will also improve the appearance of the tree, especially if the scale has attracted black sooty mold. Mix a light solution of liquid dish soap and water, then use a soft brush to scrub the affected areas – as far as you can reach. Similarly, you may want to use a pressure washer, which will also remove loose bark that creates a handy hiding place for the pests.

**Apply a soil drench** – Drench the soil between the tree's drip line and the trunk, using a systemic insecticide such as Bayer Advanced Garden Tree and Shrub Insect Control, Bonide Annual Tree and Shrub Insect Control, or Greenlight Tree and Shrub Insect Control. This treatment works best between May and July; however, it may take several weeks for the substance to make its way throughout the tree. A soil drench will also control aphids, Japanese beetles, and other pests.

**Spray the tree with a dormant oil** – Apply dormant oil generously, using enough oil to reach cracks and crevices in the bark. You can use dormant oil between the time the tree loses its leaves in fall and before new foliage emerges in spring. Application of dormant oil can safely be repeated while the tree is still dormant.

#### **Crepe Myrtle Bark Diseases from Scale**

If your crepe myrtle is affected by white scale, it may develop black sooty mold (In fact, the sooty, black substance may be the first sign of white scale on crepe myrtles.). This fungal disease grows on the sweet substance excreted by white scale or other sap-sucking insects such as aphids, whiteflies [6], or mealybugs [7].

Although sooty mold is unsightly, it is generally harmless. Once the problem pests are controlled, the sooty mold problem should resolve.

For this Veterans Day we would like to thank CW4 Ray Echols for his unwavering dedication and faithful service to our country.


#### HONORING OUR HEROES

There's nothing like the crisp, cool air and colorful foliage to get you excited for fall! Your pet is probably enjoying the change too, but fall is also a time of lurking dangers for our four-legged friends. Please consider these safety tips that can arise in the season.

### Steer clear of mushrooms and mold.

These are more prevalent in the fall and can be quite harmful to pets! Keep a close eye on your pet while they're out in the yard or on a walk.

#### Watch out for snakes

Snakes may be out on the hunt to prepare for hibernation, increasing the risk of bites delivered to dogs and cats. Research the types of snakes in our area and whenever your pet is outside, look closely for signs that they may be around.



#### Take care with decorations!

If you plan to decorate for the upcoming holiday season, it's crucial to keep your pets in mind once you begin. Hide power cords where possible, put fragile decorations in hard-to-reach areas, and be extra careful with candles or other scented decorations.

#### Be Cautious of Rodenticides and Cold Weather Poisons

Rodenticides are highly toxic to pets and, if ingested, the results could be fatal. If you must use these products, please do so with extreme caution and put them in places inaccessible to your pets.

#### Careful with Holiday candy!

Keep all candy stored away on a high shelf, cabinet, or in the fridge to prevent pets from eating it. Chocolate and candy with xylitol or other artificial sweeteners are especially dangerous. Put everything away and don't leave wrappers lying around either!





#### Pay attention to the weather

Make sure your pet is well prepared, no matter what the weather may be. Keep plenty of water available when it's warm, and bundle up if it becomes very cold. Consider investing in booties to protect their sensitive paw pads when the ground is wet or very cold!

### Keep Squirrels Away from Your Yard and Home

A squirrel may look cute and cuddly, but only from a distance. Once squirrels start getting into your yard, digging around and eating your plants or birdseed, they become much less precious and more of a pest. Not to mention, if one gets inside your home — now you've really got a problem on your hands! A squirrel can be a tough nut to crack (no pun intended). They're quick, and a bit sneaky, so keeping them away from your home and yard is usually much easier said than done. However, there are a few things you can do to protect your home and keep squirrels away from your property.

## What About My Yard is so Attractive to Squirrels?

There's a reason squirrels are camping out around your house. Below are the factors that attract squirrels to your property.

### **Thick Vegetation**

If you have lots of hedges and shrubs, you will probably notice squirrels running in and out of them. Squirrels don't enjoy open spaces, for fear of their safety (they don't want to be scooped up by a hawk). This is why they love the cover of thick vegetation or other areas around your home that provide shelter. To help prevent this, make sure to keep your hedges and bushes properly maintained. After all, a squirrel isn't the only pest who will enjoy a place to hide in your yard! Not only will keeping your shrubs maintained help prevent pests, but it's also an important part of yard maintenance.

### Food & Water

Maybe you want to have birds around your home, so you set up some bird feeders and a bird bath. While the birds will surely love it, unfortunately, so will the squirrels. A squirrel will do just about anything to get to the food in a bird feeder. More often than not, it's extremely entertaining and results in some pretty funny videos. Without a doubt, these food and water resources in your yard are one of the reasons squirrels keep coming back. If you do keep food and water out for other animals or birds, try to keep it in a place where only they can reach it. Or, use specific bird feeders that are squirrel-proof.

#### **Trees**

Squirrels are attracted to trees, especially tree varieties that produce nuts and fruit. If your yard has trees, especially large, acorn-filled ones with lots of branches, chances are you've already noticed squirrels in them.



There's probably even little patches of ground where they have tried to bury their findings! Unfortunately, there's no sure-fire way to keep squirrels, or any wildlife, out of your trees. However, there are a few methods you can try to deter them. Squirrels nesting in your trees isn't necessarily a bad thing — unless the trees are very close to your home. If the branches are close to or touching your home, squirrels could use them as a way to climb around on your roof or worse, get inside your attic.

### The Dangers of Having Squirrels in Your Yard

These little critters can cause more damage than you may think, which is why you should make it a priority to keep squirrels away from your home and yard.

#### **Tree Stress**

Squirrels will not only eat the fruits or buds on your trees, but they will gnaw on the bark, too. When done in excess, this can cause stress for your trees and result in damage, and possibly death. Sadly, younger trees and saplings won't develop if stripped of their bark.

### **Plant Destruction**

Once a squirrel has stolen the fruits or nuts from your trees, it will try to bury them throughout your lawn. Not only will this ruin the look of your grass, but it poses a threat to any plants or flowers that are trying to grow as well. If squirrels get into your garden, they could uproot the roots of your plants or flowers and eat them.

### **Food Theft**

As we mentioned, squirrels will steal any type of food they can find. While this isn't ideal for your lawn, it poses an even larger threat to commercial farms. - Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stovetop so you can keep an eye on the food.

- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.

#### Home Damage

Just like any other rodent, squirrels love to chew. If given the opportunity, their tiny teeth can do some serious damage to your home. They can chew through wires and cause fire hazards, and destroy your attic's insulation. What's worse, once squirrels are inside your home they can begin nesting and quickly multiplying.

#### Diseases

Aside from making your home their own, these pests are threatening because of the number of diseases they carry. They can spread typhus, tularemia, plague, and ringworm to humans. Squirrels have a relatively short lifespan, and much of this is due to diseases — along with their poor decision-making skills when it comes to crossing the road. If you, your family members, or household pets contract one of these diseases, it could be extremely detrimental to your health! Please note: If you find a squirrel in your home, always consult a specialist. Squirrels are quick and can lash out if they feel trapped or cornered. Never try to capture or remove a wild animal on your own!

### **Tips to Keep Squirrels Away**

*So, how can you keep squirrels away from your home? Here are a few tips and tricks that should help!* 

#### **Plant a Variety of Squirrel-Proof Flowers**

Surprisingly enough, there are a few plants a squirrel will steer clear from. While a squirrel isn't generally picky, try planting some of these to keep them moving on from your yard:

Daffodils Fritillaries Geraniums Hyacinth Galanthus Lily-of-the-Valley

All of these flowers are either bright in color or produce a strong odor that squirrels don't particularly enjoy. Plant these around your garden or trees to help protect them from squirrel damage and add to the beauty of your landscape.

#### **Use Strong Odors**

Scents like white pepper, black pepper, and garlic are naturally unpleasant to a squirrel. The same goes for sweet smells such as peppermint. Try spraying your plants and flowers with water and then sprinkling on pepper or peppermint oil to deter squirrels. If this technique seems to be keeping your yard or garden safe, reapply as frequently as needed! Don't forget to sprinkle these scents on again after storms too.

#### **Spray Squirrel Deterrents**

The urine of predators will also keep squirrels away. If they can smell a predator in your lawn, they're not going to be as willing to stick around. Commercial repellants mimic the odor and are easy to apply. Coyote and red fox urine seem to work the best, so consider purchasing sprays or liquids that either contain or mimic these odors. In your attic, use towels doused in apple cider vinegar to deter squirrels. The strong odor should deter squirrels for a while, but the towels will need to be refreshed and replaced periodically to keep the deterrent effective.

#### **Remove Sources of Food & Water**


You can't help if the trees in your yard bear fruit and nuts for squirrels to squander. Plus, there's no sense in cutting down a perfectly healthy tree just to keep squirrels away! However, you now know food and water sources like birdseed and bird feeders will attract squirrels. The best option would be to remove these food sources completely, so a squirrel has no reason to stay. But, if removing them isn't an option, try squirrel-proofing your bird feeders to keep them from eating what's not meant for them.

#### **Scare Them Away**

Keep squirrels away by adding a statue or figurine of a predator into your space. While this might not be the aesthetic you were going for, the mere silhouette of an owl could send squirrels scurrying. A squirrel is naturally skittish, so the fear of being injured or eaten could keep them away from your lawn for good. Got more than just squirrels roaming around your home? ### Common Household Product is Magic

Most of us already know that a teaspoon of baking soda in the batter will make the muffins rise, but who knew that a pinch of it mixed with scrambled eggs will make them fluffier or added to water will make steamed vegetables stay green?

Aside from cooking, however, everyone knows that an open box of baking soda in the fridge will absorb strong odors. But did you also know that baking soda in the bath water can relieve itchy skin caused by bug bites or poison ivy? And that pouring a cup of baking soda followed by a cup of hot vinegar down a stopped up drain will unclog it? Baking soda also can be used to polish tarnished silver, remove rust stains, extinguish a grease fire, freshen toothbrushes and clean dishwashers and coffee makers. Add it to kitty litter and the laundry to help freshen and deodorize. Sprinkle baking soda on a wet sponge to scrub residue off a cast-iron skillet. Or use it on sidewalk and driveway cracks as a non-toxic weed killer. A dusting of it around pet food bowls will keep ants away too.

A couple of cautions about baking soda, though: Its magic powers fade with time, so check the expiration date on the box. Most important, don't mix it with other cleaning products. The chemical reaction could be toxic.
